### Palmer Hoyt to Edit, Publish Denver Post

DENVER, Feb. 5—(AP)—William C. Shepherd, who started work on the Denver Post more than 40 years ago as a reporter and has been its editor and publisher for the last 13 years, is retiring and will be succeeded by Palmer Hoyt, former editor and publisher of the Portland Oregonian. Shepherd will continue to serve in an advisory capacity.

The report said Hoyt will take over his new work "in the near future." The veteran Oregon newspaperman advanced from copyreader in 1923 to editor-publisher of the Oregonian in 1939. He is a director of the Associated Press. His successor at Portland was not announced.

### May Rye Hits Limit Low in Grain Market

CHICAGO, Feb. 5—(AP)—May rye was under pressure from several sides today, and right at the opening dropped the full 5 cent daily limit. After considerable floundering around, short covering lifted the price a cent or two, but at the finish it was tight against the permissible drop.

Washington news was the chief factor in the weakness of rye. Secretary of Agriculture Clinton P. Anderson, who last fall advocated permitting subsidies to expire June 30, told the National Canners association at Atlantic City that the danger of inflation has become so great that it is necessary to maintain both price controls and subsidies.

Wheat, corn, and barley held steadily at ceilings and oats breaking in sympathy with rye recovered most of the half cent loss at the finish.

The closing bell found wheat and corn at ceilings in all deliveries, May \$1.80 1/4 for wheat and \$1.18 1/4 for corn. Oats were 1/4 lower to 1/2 higher, May 81. Rye was unchanged to 5 cent lower, May \$2.12 and Barley unchanged at ceiling, May \$1.22 1/2.
