Recital Is Success

One of the most delightful musical events of the season was the voice-piano recital given on Monday night by Mrs. Frank Burlingham, mezzo soprano and Mrs. Gwendolyn Mines Remy of Seattle in the First Presbyterian church.

Mrs. Burlingham's rich voice was at its best. Her interpretations were convincing, her tones full and warm and her manner gracious. She chose a program beginning with earlier classics, by Peri and Handel, then a group of later German numbers, and concluded with several modern pieces including nursery pieces which especially caught the audience's fancy.

Mrs. Remy's technique is notable for its brilliance. She has beautiful quality with full resonant tones. Her compositions were difficult and particularly well done were the Chopin sonata, opus 35, her first number. Evident was the singing quality which she gave the melody tones in "On Wings of Song." The Campanella" by Paganini Liszt, played more slowly than usual, was given especially interesting interpretation.

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
