Death Claims Hubbard Man

WOODBURN, Feb. 5.—(Special) James Clamont Spatz, 31, a retired carpenter and resident of Hubbard for 34 years, died in his home there Tuesday morning. He was born in Indiana Dec. 8, 1864. Funeral services will be held at 2 p.m. Thursday in Ringo chapel with the Rev. M. Wesley Skinner officiating. Burial will be made in Hubbard cemetery.

Surviving are his widow, Anna Catherine Platz, and step-daughter Minnie Knight of Hubbard, eight grandchildren and a brother Niles P. Platz of California.

Heavier Fines Are Favored In Silverton

SILVERTON, Feb. 5 (Special) That higher fines for Silverton traffic offenders are needed was the sentiment expressed at the Monday night meeting of the city by council members, city police and visitors.

Considerable complaint of using "South Water street as a speedway" was voiced by all three groups. The council members asked City Manager Robert Borland to convey to the city police judge, John Hoblitt, the sentiments of the meeting. Heavy fines have been looked at askance in former years, it was pointed out, and the police judge has been following this former policy. Officers felt that if heavier fines were assessed much of the reckless driving might be curbed.

Classes Suggested

Mayor George Christenson suggested the possibility of getting school authorities to cooperate by giving driving classes in schools.

M. B. Ford, grade school principal, appeared at the request of council members to discuss the closing of A street between Water and First. A petition from businessmen in this section indicated this closing, which has been carried on for several months, was creating difficulties for them. Ford explained that children, during school hours, used this street to cross from their class rooms to the playgrounds. With ball played on the grounds there was also some danger from children dashing onto the street after the balls. Some carelessness in removing the closing barriers at 4 o'clock was reported. After lengthy discussion the council agreed to close the street from 8:30 a.m. to 4 p.m., provided that the school authorities would be responsible for placing and removing the barriers at these hours.

Club Shows Interest

Appearing for the Lions club in the interest of traffic safety were Bill Bloch, Ted Burian and Olum Larson.

George Marolais and Paul Reiling were at the council in the interest of the proposed five mill levy for Silverton recreation. The council favored putting this on the spring ballot if possible, and Rex Albright, city attorney, promised to make investigation and draw up necessary plans.

Silverton's dance ordinance passed on its final reading, providing for no dancing between midnight Saturday and midnight Sunday nights. The ordinance also provides that those giving dances at Silverton must have applications in to the city manager prior to the dance and that these must state the time of opening and closing the dance.
