

### Hess Flew to 'Save England From America'

NUERNBERG, Feb. 7 (AP)—Rudolf Hess made his sensational flight to Scotland in 1941 to browbeat the British into acceptance of peace terms to escape what he described as "evil designs of the United States" on the British empire, the British prosecutors told the international military tribunal today.

Hess brought with him on May 10, 1941, the prosecution said, demands for the overthrow of the Churchill war government and for a free Nazi hand in Europe. During the interrogations Hess did his best to frighten Britons with talk of devastating new methods of warfare, and with assertions that "savagistic Americans" hoped to incorporate Canada into the United States.

Captured documents introduced by the British quoted Foreign Minister Joachim von Ribbentrop as telling Mussolini that Hitler was so furious with Hess because of the flight that he ordered his deputy and one-time closest friend shot immediately if he returned.

But "Ribbentrop, we know, was a liar," the British prosecutor said, charging that Hess' real mission was to remove Britain as a fighting force so that Hitler would be free to launch his Russian invasion, the date of which already was set.

### Truman Asks Publicity Fund

WASHINGTON, Feb. 7 (AP)—President Truman asked congress today to raise his budget request for the state department approximately \$30,000,000 with about a third of the money to finance an informational program abroad.

The request, as contained in a letter from the budget bureau and endorsed by the president, asked for authority for the state department to conduct:

"An information program designed to disseminate abroad through press, publications, radio, motion pictures, and other media, information about the United States, its people and its policies."

### Dover Rails Against Snell

PORTLAND, Feb. 7 (AP)—The republican administration in Oregon has failed to meet veterans' housing and job problems, Floyd K. Dover, Grants Pass, declared today in an address before the Willamette democratic society.

"For four years," Dover said, "you've heard that Oregon veterans are not going to come back without homes and without jobs. Now they're coming back and they are without homes and they are without jobs."

He flayed Governor Snell for what he called a "lack of leadership."

Dover, mentioned as a possible candidate for the democratic nomination for governor, was introduced by Austin Fleigel, jr., Portland, also frequently mentioned.

### Navy Announces Post-War Fleet

WASHINGTON, Feb. 7 (AP)—The navy plans to carry out its post-war patrol of the nation's sea frontiers by allocating 60 per cent of the fleet to the Pacific and 40 per cent to the Atlantic with two striking forces in each ocean.

This set-up became evident in a study of the annual report of Secretary Forrestal, which contains a listing of the ships assigned to the active and ready reserve fleets.

The list accounts for 176 combatant ships in the active fleet for the Pacific, 143 in the Atlantic.

### Bomb 'Immunized' In St. James Park

LONDON, Feb. 7 (AP)—A 1000-pound bomb dropped five years ago in the royal family's front yard was "immunized" tonight.

Two engineer officers worked five hours steaming the explosive out of the bottom of a 28-foot shaft in a drained lake in St. James park, just a few hundred feet from Buckingham palace.

During the danger period, at nearby Marlborough House, Queen Mary moved from her regular quarters to a room considered safe.

### CROWN PRINCESS ILL

NEW YORK, Feb. 7 (AP)—The Dutch news agency Aneta said today that Crown Princess Juliana of The Netherlands had developed pneumonia, but was making favorable progress toward recovery.

### Franklin Buford Morris Dies in Portland

BAKER, Feb. 7 (AP)—The death of Franklin Buford Morris, 42, in a Portland hospital was reported here today.

He had been a Baker resident for nine years, coming here after drug store work at Halsey, Bend and Klamath Falls.

He was born at Albany and attended public schools there. Survivors include a son and a daughter here, his mother in Eugene and a sister in Salem.

### Housewives Dash for Flour

PORTLAND, Feb. 7 (AP)—Housewives started a run on retail flour stocks today, and the manager of one chain store group said weevils would spoil supplies before the bottom of the bin was reached.

Moderate supplies on the shelves melted today from housewives' fears on the president's action in limiting domestic wheat supplies to make more available to war-stricken countries.

B. R. Pooley, Crown Mills sales manager, said he foresaw no flour shortage if the flow of wheat from grower areas is maintained.

### English Dean Urges Socialism for U. S.

LONDON, Feb. 7 (AP)—The Dean of Canterbury, Dr. Hewlett Johnson, told a rally for the London daily workers Jan. 6 that a former Canterbury dean, the late H. R. L. (Dick) Sheppard, had said America was 100 years behind the rest of the world and 150 behind in religion.

Reporters at the rally understood Dean Johnson to have added his own comment: "I agree with him completely."

Subsequently in an interview Dean Johnson explained he had quoted Dr. Sheppard "in a jocular way" and observed that if America had socialism "I believe she would be more advanced than she is today."

### Rationing of Oregon Liquor Rumor Denied

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 7 (AP)—Taking note of rumors growing out of the ban on wheat for making whiskey and the whiskey shortage on store shelves, the liquor commission chairman denied today that rationing was planned in Oregon.

Chairman George P. Lilley said additional supplies were made available in state stores starting Feb. 2 and no indication had been received that supplies to the state would change.

### PERON OPPOSITION QUELLED

BUENOS AIRES, Feb. 7 (AP)—Several persons were injured today when saber-wielding mounted police charged a crowd beginning a demonstration for Jose P. Tamborini, democratic union presidential candidate who is opposing Col. Juan Peron in the Feb. 24 election.

### Jap Vets Get Cold Shoulder

TOKYO, Friday, Feb. 8 (AP)—Premier Kijuro Shidehara appealed to Japanese in a radio broadcast last night to give a warmer welcome to their returning servicemen. Many have reached their homes to find their "funerals" long since held and the public stolidly indifferent to their problems.

Shidehara promised an intensive government effort to relieve the plight of such men, who know "the sorrow of disillusionment."

Officers at the demobilization ministry told the Associated Press that repatriated servicemen are growing increasingly bitter because the people, worried over their own affairs, ignore the ex-soldiers' "present situation and past sacrifices."

### Leg Fractured in Auto Accident

Edgar W. Myers, 75, of 1320 Chemekeeta st., suffered a right leg fracture and head cuts Thursday afternoon when he was struck by an automobile at 2100 S. Commercial st. He was rushed by the city first aid truck to Salem Deaconess hospital where he was reported in "fair condition" early Friday morning.

The driver of the car, William Seth Hunter of Aumsville, and another driver who witnessed the accident told investigating police that Myers became confused while crossing the street diagonally in the path of the approaching car and darted in front of it.

### Solons Delay Answer on Tidelands Controversy

WASHINGTON, Feb. 7 (AP)—The senate judiciary committee today concluded a three day hearing on the federal-state controversy over ownership of tidelands.

Chairman McCarran (D-Nev) said the committee will not vote on the question until members have had a chance for thorough study of the printed record, embodying maps illustrating thousands of words of oral and written testimony.
