War Workers Given Benefits

Of the \$1,218,523 in unemployment benefits paid in Oregon during December, 70.7 per cent was paid to workers laid off by shipyards and aircraft plants, according to an analysis released Thursday by the Oregon unemployment compensation commission.

Those eligible to draw benefits in the lumbering industry took the next largest amount, \$130,750, or about 10.7 per cent. Those involved in labor disputes were disqualified for benefits. Construction and canning workers also showed considerable increase in unemployment during December.

The proportion of women among those drawing unemployment insurance was reduced to 34 per cent in December as against 64 per cent in September when the war ended.
