

Marion County American Red Cross Recounts Activities

Continuing the study of achievements of Marion county chapter, American Red Cross, statistics reveal some outstanding records.

In an article last week, the reviewed. This week, the nutrition, first aid, life saving, and camp and hospital divisions are considered.

From start of 1942 to the end of 1945, 564 persons were certified in class work in nutrition. Special emphasis was made during the war on balanced and proper foods because of ration-

ing and shortages. However, the nutrition program, with its stress on right foods for all homes, continues as vital in peace-times as in war, and this department is one of the Red Cross promotes as a valuable and needed service.

First Aid
A total of 7975 persons was certified in first aid during the four-year stretch ending with 1945. Records in this department show 87 volunteer instructors certified and 21 first aid squads organized. Wayne Kuhl is chairman of the first aid committee for the local Red Cross chapter.

Life Saving
Mrs. Gordon Black headed this committee until 1944. In life saving, 710 persons were certified within the four years by the local Red Cross chapter, 258 of them in 1945. Hollis Huntington is chairman of the life saving committee for the chapter.

Service Committee
The camp and hospital committee has sponsored a comprehensive program throughout the four years of war, giving assistance for soldiers at Camp Adair and later for the men at the U. S. naval hospital at Corvallis, this latter work still going on. The Rev. S. Raynor Smith is now chairman of the camp and hospital committee for Marion county chapter and is a member of the nine-county council.

In 1942, the Marion county Red Cross chapter supervised the work to secure furniture for 65 day rooms at Camp Adair, the project getting the cooperation of many service and community groups. In 1943, 30 more day rooms were furnished. In 1944, 1250 gifts for the hospital were furnished.

The telephone fund is maintained to give the men at the hospital opportunity to call their homes, and the cake fund is carried on to supply cakes for the hospitalized men on their birthday anniversaries.

17,482 Vets to Debark at 7 Ports Today

War veterans from Pacific and European theatres totaling 17,482 aboard 26 vessels were expected today to debark at seven U. S. ports.

At west coast points 20 ships are due to arrive bringing 14,956 personnel to four ports.
