Stories of Portland in pre-civil war days as revealed in newspaper stories carried by the two newspapers then published, "The Oregon Statesman and Oregonian" were the basis for the historical novel, "From Out This House," its author, Alice Wheeler Greve, told members of the Salem AAUW Saturday. Mrs. Greve was the principal speaker at the luncheon meeting held at the Marion hotel.

For the purpose of fictionalizing history for her book, Mrs. Greve combined the characters of three founders of Portland into her hero. The research work was done for the novel and how she combined fact and fiction were outlined by the author.

Women to Hear Miss Dingle

The Woman's Society of Christian service of the First Methodist church will meet Wednesday, February 20 all day. The business session will begin at 10:45 a. m., sack lunch at the noon hour and coffee will be served by the hostess circle No. 2.

The afternoon session begins at 1:30 with devotions led by Mrs. Vern Bain. The speaker for the afternoon is to be Miss Leila Dingle, a missionary to the Philippines, who will speak on the subject, "Confirming Our Faith in the Isles of the Sea."

Miss Dingle has been a district evangelistic missionary in the Philippines since 1928, and principal of the Memorial Deaconess school in Manila since 1940. The Harris school was the home of the Methodist Missionaries during the first two and a half years of the war, where they voluntarily interned themselves when they knew the Japanese occupation was imminent.

The last eight months were spent in Los Santos internment camp. She was interned from January 10, 1942 until January 7, 1945, when they were rescued just in time by paratroopers. Miss Dingle will return after some months of rest and study.

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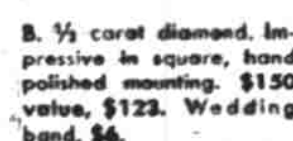
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
