The big cat stopped several times to fight off the dogs but was always too far ahead for a shot. Ball stayed on the trail until 3 a. m., then gave up to return for a few hours rest and a meal or two.

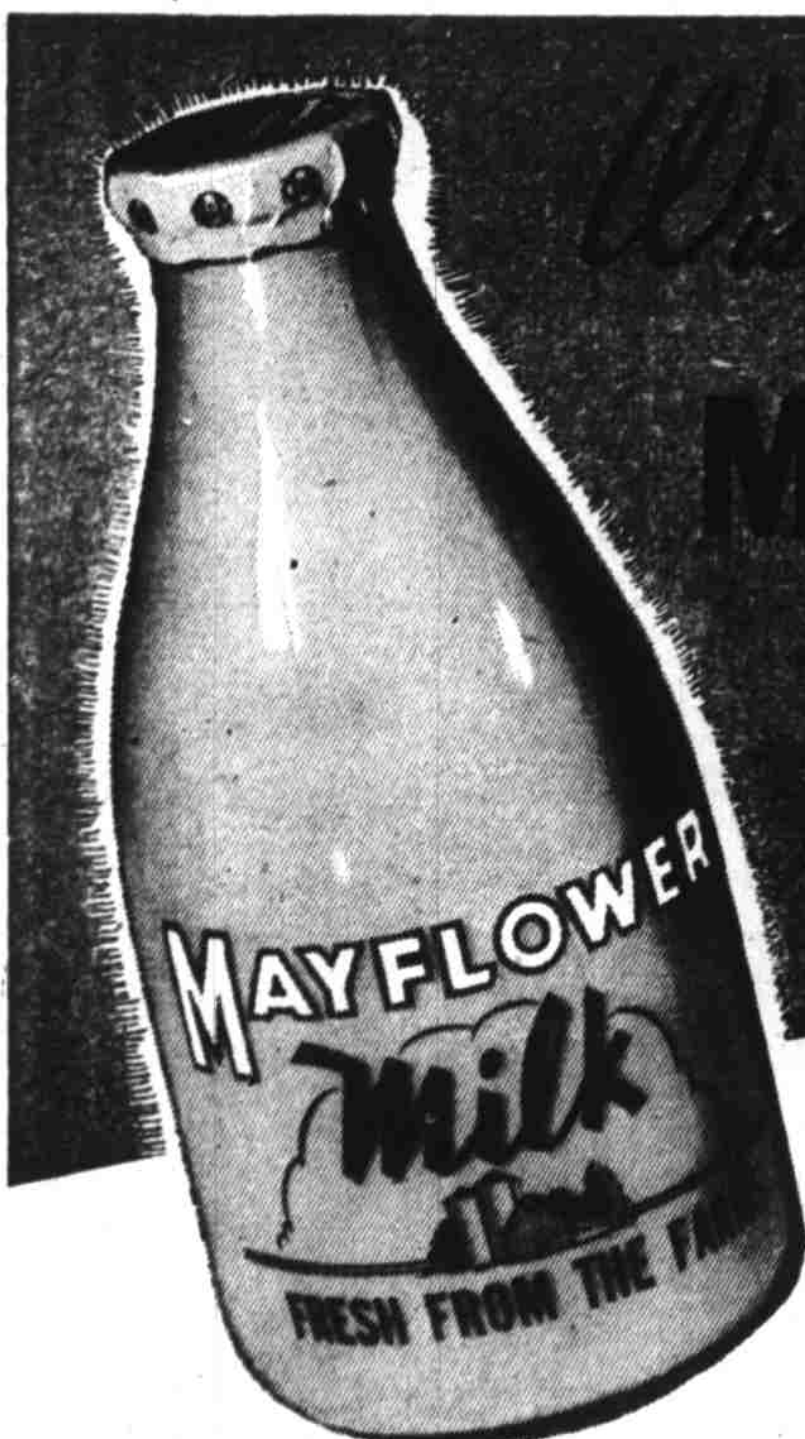
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
