

'What Helps West Helps Us All,' Portland Leader Tells C. of C.

"What helps the west helps all of us" was the theme of Chester A. Moores, Portland Chamber of Commerce president, as he spoke Monday before the noon luncheon forum of the Salem chamber.

Portland is "too big, lopsided, in fact," when compared with the rest of the state, he declared. The city would thrive still more if other cities in Oregon were larger.

Improved production methods in agriculture and the new food processing systems will be reflected in better living and larger incomes for Portlanders, he maintained. Forest products are important to the city's welfare, he declared, praising lumbermen of the state for the successful sustained yield program, under which the state is growing as much lumber annually as it is cutting.

The tourist business, Moores said, is one of considerable prospect for the entire state. The Portland chamber has set aside

\$80,000 to be expended this year for encouragement of the tourist business to all of Oregon; \$100,000 to attract new industries.

Moores pointed out that the Portland chamber is interested in seeing industry come anywhere on the west coast, would rejoice to see Los Angeles become the largest city in the nation, and feels that Portland prospers when industry is established in the west. It has helped the Salem chamber secure such industry as the alumina plant, he said, and, in turn, Salem has helped other parts of the valley and of Oregon obtain industry.

Years ago, Moores declared, it was said that "Portland will never be an industrial city," but it now has 888 manufacturers. The largest industrial payroll before the war was 1100, and the largest in one industry during the war was 96,000.

Recalling that Salem was a "city" of 2500 residents when he was born here, and pointing to the fact that it now has some 38,000 persons as residents, he expressed the belief that he would live to see it with 50,000-60,000 population. Holland, the size of the Willamette valley, has 8 1/2 million residents, he declared.
