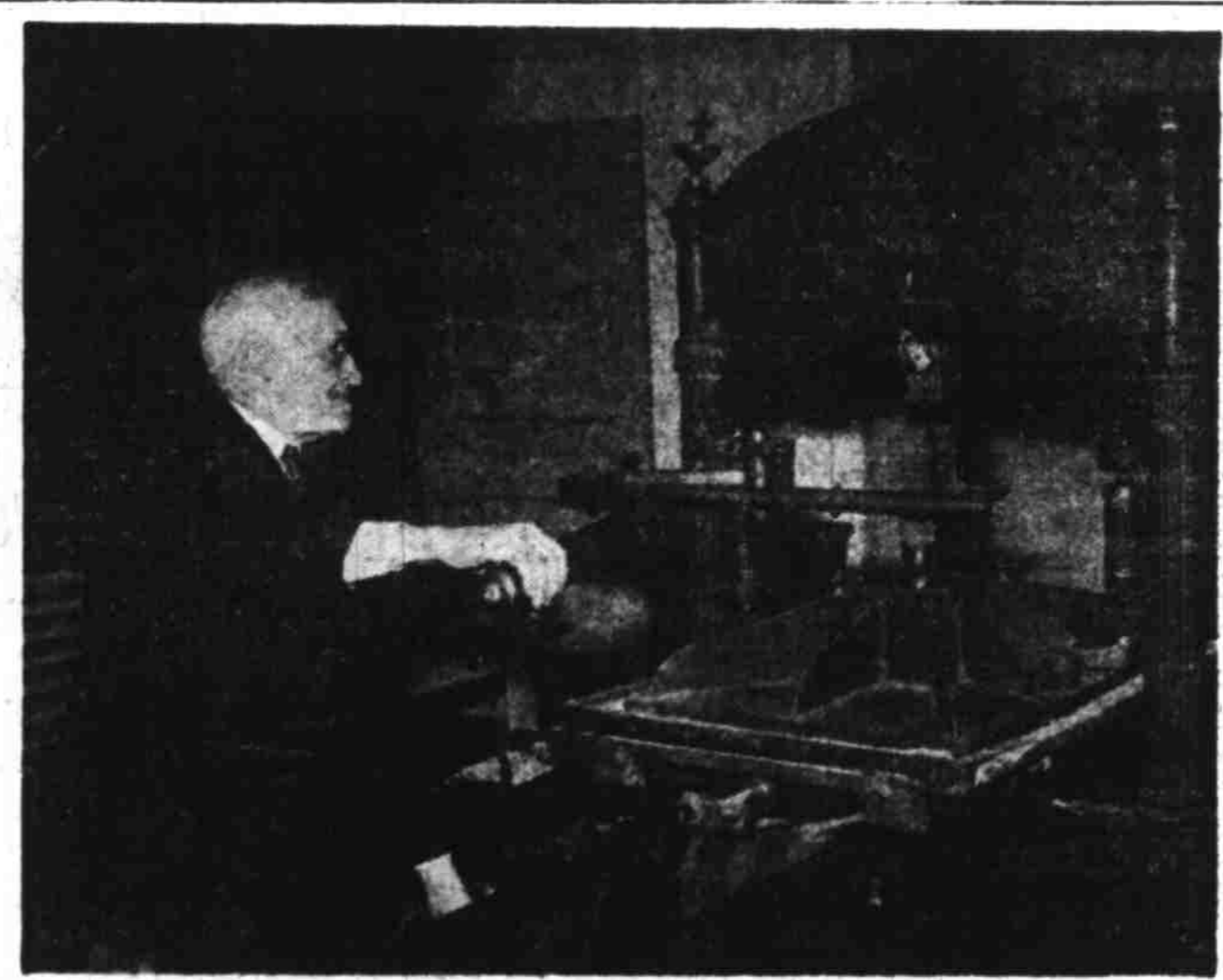

Voorhies, publisher of the Grants Pass Daily Courier, who has been active in newspaper business for almost 60 years, reenacted the printing of the Spectator as a feature of the recent Oregon Press conference here.

Indian School To Celebrate 66th Birthday

Chemawa Indian school will celebrate its 66th birthday Monday, February 25, with a big birthday party in the school gym. The festivities will include a ball, Indian dances, the cutting of a giant birthday cake, and the crowning of a birthday queen. The queen's identity will not be disclosed until the night of coronation. The birthday cake, made in the school bakery, will be five layers high and have 66 candles burning at its top. It will be large enough to provide a generous piece for each of the 550 students together with the staff members and many guests.

The Chemawa school was founded Feb. 25, 1880, only a few months after the famous Carlisle Indian school so that it is now—since the closing of Carlisle—the oldest school in the Indian service. First established at Forest Grove, Chemawa was moved to its present site, five miles north of Salem, in 1885.

Myrthus W. Evans is superintendent of the school and will be the principal speaker at the program. Coquette Thompson, boys' adviser, will be the master of ceremonies.

Water Usage Rule Decided by Neumer

Water cannot be appropriated from the Rogue river for operation of a swimming tank to be situated outside the city limits, for private gain, despite that the public would be served, Attorney General George Neumer held here Wednesday.

Neumer declared that the swimming tank in question was not to be operated by or on behalf of any city and there is no connection between the project and any municipality.

In the area involved in the opinion the waters of Rogue river can be appropriated only for domestic, stock, irrigation and municipal purposes.

Medical, Dental Student Vets Top Education Benefit Rolls

Medical and dental students predominate among the 180 Oregon war veterans now drawing state educational benefits to attend schools and colleges in the state, it was disclosed Wednesday by Hugh E. Rosson, director of the state department of Veterans' affairs.

Sixty of the veterans are in high schools, the others in colleges and universities.

The benefits, provided by the 1945 legislature, amount to \$35 a month straight payment for 60 hours of classroom attendance for veterans who resided in Oregon for one year before entering service and who served more than 90 days. The benefits are for 36 calendar months.

Because the state and GI aid cannot be taken at the same time, Rosson said the Oregon program is proving especially beneficial to high school students and others who plan to save the GI benefits for further schooling.

Cities in which high school students are receiving state aid include Portland, Salem, Canby, Myrtle Creek, Cottage Grove and Philomath.

College students under the program are enrolled at the state institutions, and at Linfield, University of Portland, Willamette, Reed, Multnomah college and Clark college.

Witnesses in Wilson Trial Reports Vary

Opening statements in the trial of Glenn Wilson, state prison inmate, charged with assault with intent to kill a fellow convict January 2, were made Wednesday morning by Deputy District Attorney Lawrence Osterman and defense counsel Irvin Goodman, Portland attorney.

An array of witnesses, all of them prison inmates, were brought in by both sides during the day. Defendant's counsel sought to prove that Glenn Wilson was not even near Louis (Nig) Francis when the latter was tripped and stabbed, and ten witnesses so testified.

District Attorney Miller B. Hayden and Deputy Osterman brought in witnesses who stated they saw Wilson trip Francis while Byron Dyson, another convict indicted jointly with Wilson and convicted last week, slashed Francis twice about the neck with a knife.

The case was continued until this morning at which time the defendant, Glenn Wilson, will take the stand.

Ex-Salem Resident, Elvira Frohmader, Dies in Portland

Elvira Frohmader, 67, wife of Bert Frohmader and resident of Salem for many years, died Wednesday, February 20, in Portland. She had gone there a month ago to be with a daughter.

Born at Eagle Grove, Ia., Nov. 30, 1879, she came to Oregon when she was seven years old.

Survivors include five children, Leah Nell Scott, Lena Mae Hulshoff and Letitia Stillwagon of Portland; Ora Scott of Joseph, Ore.; and Gordon Evans of Southwick, Mass.; one brother, Ellsworth Hubbard of Silverton; seven grandchildren and seven great grandchildren.
