

East Oregon Utility District Held Feasible

Feasibility of a 563-square-mile people's utility district in Malheur county, including Ontario, Vale and Nyssa, was assured Thursday by the state hydroelectric commission here.

With a population of 19,263 and assessed valuation of \$10,527,933, the proposed district has 4937 electrical consumers now served almost entirely by the Idaho Power company, with a small number served by the Malheur Cooperative Electric Association.

The commission estimated the annual electric revenue from the district at \$362,920, and costs of \$191,352, leaving a balance of \$171,568 available for debt retirement. This latter amount would enable the district to buy the \$2,000,000 electric system in 30 years as well as paying interest.

The commission added that it also might be possible for the proposed PUD to reduce rates while paying off its debt.

The district would use Bonneville power. An election on whether to create the district probably will be held in the next few months.

APPLE PANCAKES—To 2 cups of prepared pancake flour, add 2 eggs and 1 1/2 cups milk beaten together. Blend well. Stir in 1 cup finely chopped apples and 2 tablespoons melted shortening. Drop by table-spoonfuls onto greased griddle or frying pan. Bake until bubbles break; turn and bake until golden brown. Wrap each pancake around a well-cooked sausage link. Serve hot with warm syrup. Serves 6.

SAUTEED KIDNEYS—Skin, split in half lengthwise, and remove white tubes and tissues from 6 to 12 veal or lamb kidneys. Wash thoroughly. Cut into thin slices and cover with flour, salt and pepper. Sauté in drippings about 3 minutes or until browned. Add 1 cup hot water and cook about 5 minutes, or until thickened, stirring constantly. Serve hot. Serves 6.

Broiled Lamb Chops and Hashed Brown Potatoes

HASHED BROWN POTATOES—Melt 3 tablespoons shortening in a heavy frying pan; add 3 cups chopped or finely cut cooked potatoes, heaping them toward the center and away from the edges of the pan; season to taste. Cover with a lid or heavy plate; press down so that cover is right on top of the potatoes. Place a box of salt or rock on top to give pressure. Cook slowly and without turning for 15 to 20 minutes, or until crusty brown. Turn out onto a warm plate. Cut into 4 or 6 pie-shaped wedges to serve.
