

27 Cardinals Given Ring at Secret Session

VATICAN CITY, Feb. 22 (AP)—Twenty-seven of the 32 new cardinals of the Roman Catholic church received the final symbol of their new dignity—the great topaz-set cardinal's ring—at a secret consistory today.

Assignment of Roman and suburban churches from which the new princes of the church will take their cardinalatial titles was also announced at the consistory, which capped five days of religious pageantry.

Three new Latin American cardinals were too ill to attend the ceremonies, held in the consistorial hall of the vatican apostolic palace.

Latin American Cardinals

They were Juan Cardinal Guervara of Peru, Jose Cardinal Caro Rodriguez of Chile and Manuel Cardinal Arteaga Y Betancourt of Cuba, for whom Pope Pius XII will hold a secret consistory, probably next week. John Cardinal De Jong of the Netherlands and Jules Cardinal Saliège of France were unable to make the trip to Rome because of poor health.

The pope has also scheduled for Monday a mass reception for diplomats accredited to the Holy See.

Today also brought the assignment of new cardinals to the congregations, the department of the vatican organization which transacts all its business.

State Office Vacant

There was no designation of a new papal secretary of state, the post held by the present pontiff before his elevation from cardinal to pope.

Francis Cardinal Spellman of New York City, oft-rumored as a candidate for the position, was not assigned to the congregation of ecclesiastical affairs, connected directly with the secretary of state. Two veteran papal diplomats, both Italians and also regarded with Spellman as possible choices for the key vatican post, were assigned to that congregation.

Hal Newhouser Signs Contract

LAKELAND, Fla., Feb. 22 (AP)—Hal Newhouser, Detroit Tigers' left-hand pitching ace who won 26 American league games in 1944 and 25 last year, ended his two-day holdout today by accepting the 1946 terms believed to make the 24-year-old blonde the highest paid pitcher in baseball history.

Although no salary details of Newhouser's contract were announced, Hal, who had been reportedly to top the \$42,500 per year, was paid to Bob Feller by the Cleveland Indians, said after a telephone conversation with general manager George M. Troutman that he was "completely satisfied" with his 1946 terms.

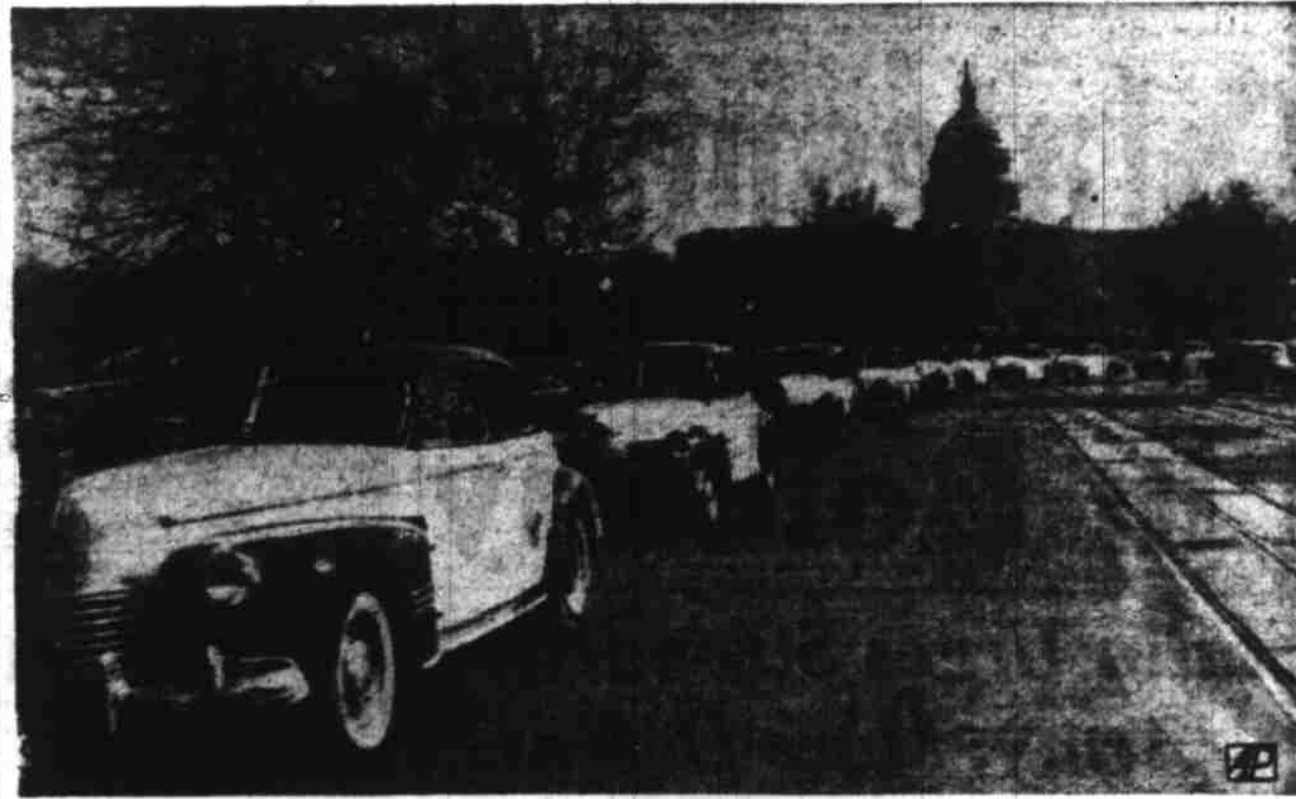

GOP Gathers To Plan Coming Election Stand

SALT LAKE CITY, Feb. 22 (AP)—Speakers at a western regional republican conference urged party leaders today to express themselves "boldly" on controversial problems and to carry on a "constructive" election campaign.

Delegates from 11 western states and Alaska attended. The plea for a "boldly" stated policy was made by Clarence Budington Kelland, author and national republican committeeman from Arizona.

"The duty of the minority party," Kelland said, "is to force the voters to decide between the principles of the party in power and the party out of power."

"The duty of the minority party is to lay down a definite, specific line of battle, so that the people may see what each party stands for, so that they can decide which banner they want to follow."

He asserted that the democratic party "borrowed its ideas from decadent Europe" and had degenerated to follow "the line of extreme, wild-eyed, unbridled radicalism."

Kelland called upon the republican party to "announce its intentions with respect to labor legislation" and advised enactment of laws "which will contain definite provisions" on labor responsibility and privilege.

Nation Slows Business to Honor G. W.

A nation become the mightiest in the world slowed its activities yesterday to commemorate the 214th birthday of the man who led its fight for independence and first assumed its presidency, George Washington.

Banks, markets, post offices, many stores and other businesses were closed. Some workers who also had Saturday off embarked on a three-day holiday.

The tomb of Washington at Mt. Vernon, Va., was visited by public officials and representatives of patriotic organizations who laid wreaths. In nearby Alexandria, soldiers, sailors, marines, WACS and WAVES paraded with war veterans.

At the capitol, Washington's farewell address was read in the senate and the house, a yearly rite for Feb. 22.

President Truman set out on his yacht, the Williamsburg, to cruise on the Potomac over the week end. He sent an aide, Lt. Col. James H. Batte, to place his wreath at the base of the Washington monument.

The day was a holiday for federal workers in Washington, who received full pay for it. In some offices which remained open, however, the workers were at their desks on an overtime basis, collecting pay for time and a half.

Yamashita Prays for Emperor As He Mounts 13 Black Steps

MANILA, Saturday, Feb. 23 (AP)—The executions of Lt. Gen. Yamashita and two other Jap war criminals today were in a weed-covered cane field southeast of Manila, near Los Banos, Laguna province.

The prisoners had been led quietly from a barbed-wire enclosed prison camp where they shed walked with thick, meshed invasion matting.

They were escorted away quietly so as not to alarm the 10,000 men of Yamashita's beaten army held in surrounding stockades.

The trap of the hastily-erected wooden gallows was sprung for Yamashita at 3:02 a.m. (2:02 p.m. Friday, Feb. 22, Eastern standard time).

Yamashita was accompanied to the scaffold by an interpreter and a priest, appearing calm and stoical. Asked if he had any last word, the general said:

"I will pray for the emperor's long life and his prosperity forever."

Yamashita's statement, written out by an interpreter, was given after the order of execution had been read to him.

"Carrying Out Duty"
"I was carrying out my duty as Japanese high commander of the Japanese army in the Philippine Islands to control my army with my best during wartime," he said.

"Until now I am believing that I have tried to do my best throughout my army."

Yamashita's chief crimes, as brought forth at his Manila trial, were the condoning of murder, rape and pillaging from October, 1944, down to the end of the Philippines campaign which found him bottled up with a small group of his once big army near Baguio, the summer capital.

Behaved Calmly
Ohta, executed at 3:41 a.m., behaved calmly.

His last words:
"I want to pray for the Japanese emperor and emperor's family and national prosperity. Dear father and mother, I am going to your side. Please educate my children."

Higashigaki, who had smiled and joked as witnesses described his brutal torture, was nervous as he went to the scaffold. He died at 4:17 a.m. after saying "Good-bye forever."

Yamashita was executed in a sector where his soldiers a year ago butchered 2000 men, women and children — every living being they could find — shortly after American paratroopers and Filipino guerrillas had rescued allied nationals at the nearby Los Banos internment camp.

3 Flood Lights
Yamashita walked up 13 black steps in the glare of three huge floodlights.

After the noose was tied, the trap sprung and the neck broken, his portly body was sewed into a blanket preparatory to being carried on a canvas stretcher to one of the waiting graves.

His grave will be marked by a white post, waist high, like that of 5000 of his men who died of dysentery and malaria after their capture. The cross will bear no name.
