TODAY'S RECIPE

JUST as whipped cream makes the plainest pudding into something quite festive and attractive, so very often a properly chosen sauce makes a cheap cut of meat or fish most appetizing.

The mission of any sauce is to accompany, and it must blend in both flavor and texture with the main dish. Sometimes it must add flavor to a food which is somewhat tasteless, and at other times the sauce must soften a too pronounced flavor in a food.

If more cooks would serve caper sauce with mutton they would find meat more popular.

Caper Sauce

Two tablespoons butter, 2 tablespoons flour, 1-2 cup water, 1 cup mutton broth, 4 tablespoons capers, 1 tablespoon minced parsley, 1-2 cup cream.

Melt the butter and stir in flour. Cook and stir until frothy. Add broth and water slowly, stirring constantly. Bring to the boiling point and add capers and parsley. Heat and add cream. Bring to boiling point but do not let boil. Serve at once.

A fish sauce often must supply fat, since some fish, such as the cod, carry all their fat in the liver. The sauce also must take care of the dryness of many varieties of fish.

Rich Fish Sauce

Three tablespoons butter, 2 tablespoons flour, 1-2 teaspoon salt, 2 cups milk, 1 tablespoon minced parsley, 2 tablespoons minced parsley, 1 hard cooked egg.

Melt butter and stir flour and parsley. Stir and cook until frothy. Add capers and parsley. Heat and add cream. Bring to boiling point but do not let boil. Serve at once.

Tomato Sauce

Four tablespoons butter, 2 tablespoons flour, 1-2 teaspoon salt, 2 tablespoons onion, 1 cup water, 1 cup sifted canned tomatoes, 1 tablespoon minced parsley, 2 tablespoons lemon juice, 1-4 teaspoon mustard, 1-2 teaspoon paprika, 1-2 cup cream.

Melt butter and add onion. Cook over a low fire for ten minutes, letting onion brown slightly. Stir in flour, salt, mustard and paprika sifted together. Cook until frothy and slowly add water, stirring constantly. Add tomatoes and parsley and simmer 20 minutes. Rub through a strainer and stir in lemon juice. Re-heat and add cream heated to the same temperature. Serve at once.

Orange Sauce

Two oranges, 1-2 lemon, 3 tablespoons currant jelly, 2 tablespoons salt, 1 cup water, 1-8 teaspoon white pepper, 2 tablespoons minced mint.

If cooking sherry is used, omit salt from recipe. Use grated rind and juice of oranges and juice of lemon. Combine all ingredients and heat with a silver fork until blended. Chill and serve.

Daily Menu

BREAKFAST—California grapes, cereal, cream, baked ham with tomato sauce, crisp graham toast, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON—Rice croquettes with cheese sauce, head lettuce with French dressing, apple sauce, milk, tea.

DINNER—Broiled sirloin steak, baked sweet potatoes, creamed onions, celery and apple salad, orange cream pudding, milk, coffee.

Apple Cups

Shiny red apples make lovely containers for Waldorf salad. Cut apples in half, horizontally, and scoop out the inside for the salad. Add nuts, chopped celery and mayonnaise and refill the half apples, after the edges have been pinked with sharp scissors.

Marked Handkerchiefs

Colored Puddings

Good old bread pudding, colored an enchanting pink or yellow with vegetable coloring, is much more acceptable to children.
