S. P. Help to Get Relief Loan Fund

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 13.—(AP)—The Southern Pacific Co. revealed today creation by its employees of an unemployment loan fund for needy employees laid off or working curtailed shifts as a result of business depression.

The fund would be controlled by committees on each division of the railroad under the supervision of a central board of trustees. It would be created by permitting officers and employees of the company, where their financial permit, to contribute one per cent of their monthly earnings beginning Jan. 1 and continuing six months unless the need passes in less time.

**50 Names Added
To School Census**

About 50 names had been added to the school census of district No. 4 by Saturday in response to an appeal sent out from the school office for names missing from the school census list. Mrs. E. A. Lundy, clerk of the district reported.

A check made by Mrs. Lundy and Superintendent H. R. Gould revealed the census for 1934 to have over 290 fewer names than that for 1933. Since the state allows the district about \$8 for each name on the census list, the shortage would represent a real loss to the district's income. A payment of \$24 for the name of each person of school age, from 4 to 20, was authorized Monday night by the school board.
