

### OBLIGATIONS OF DORMITORY FUND ARE BEING MET

University dormitories, now well filled with students residents, are earning sufficiently to meet obligations assumed when the university, under an enabling act of the legislature, constructed the \$400,000 new men's dormitory two years ago, according to information from the office of Paul J. Penza, controller.

The sum of \$14,000 semi-annually is required to meet interest and sinking fund obligations. The first payment for the current year has been met, and no difficulty in meeting the same is anticipated by university authorities. Now due on the bonds is \$237,500.

Dormitory finances at the university are outlined on the plan of merely meeting the necessary obligations, and the minimum otherwise, it is understood. Dormitory life at the university has changed somewhat since the construction of the new building, which has become the center of activities.

**Enters Third Year**

Filled almost to the limit, the men's dormitory is well launched upon its third successful year, under the management of Mrs. Genevieve Turnipseed, who came here this fall from the Eastern State Teachers' college at Madison, South Dakota. At the present time there are 265 men lodged in the six units of the dormitories, which leaves but seven vacant places, which Mrs. Turnipseed believes will probably be filled at the beginning of the winter term, although there will probably be a few of the present members who will drop out.

A well-organized social life for each unit of the dormitory is part of the plan of Mrs. Turnipseed to make the boys contented and at home. Each Wednesday and Thursday is devoted to dinner dances, so that each unit may have at least two of these a term. The boys may decorate their dining halls, secure an orchestra, and they are served an especially nice meal. This week the football team is housed at the dormitory during training season, are having a dinner dance.

**Eat At One Place**

The men of E lendor hall, and the girls who live in the three women's dormitories, Mary Spiller, Hendricks, and Susan Campbell, also have their dining rooms in the men's dormitory, so that the planning and cooking of the food for all these students may be concentrated in the big kitchen. Each dormitory and each unit has its own dining room, while there is another one for persons living outside the dormitory, and another smaller one for special group luncheons and dinners. At times of big all-campus banquets, the whole may be thrown open into one enormous hall, seating hundreds of persons.

Each unit of the dormitory has a sponsor, who is responsible for taking a lead in its organization. They are as follows: Alpha, Douglas De Cou; Gamma, Lester Johnson; Zeta, Roy Herndon; Sigma, Fred Hollenbeck; Omega, Eric Peterson, and Sherry Ross, James Mullins. All of these men are graduate or law students. Clarence Wick is the sponsor for Friendly Hall.

The men's dormitory is considered to be one of the most up-to-date and best built buildings of the kind at any institution on the coast. Its management is according to the most up-to-date lines, since Mrs. Turnipseed has had a great deal of experience in this line. For six years following her graduation from Columbia university, she was dean of women and in charge of dormitories at the South Dakota State Teachers' college. This work preceded her position at the Eastern State Teachers' college.
