Creswell Crusher Will Move South

The county rock crusher stationed near Creswell will finish getting out

rock for oiling Wednesday evening and will be moved to Cottage Grove, according to P. M. Morse, county surveyor.

There is enough work in the southern part of the county to keep the plant the rest of the year, Morse said. The plant must get out rock for oiling roads, rock for surfacing 1 1/2 miles of the London road, 1 1/2 miles of a road west of Cottage Grove and four miles in the Row river and Gaston vicinity.

FATHER AND SEVEN CHILDREN DIE IN OHIO CABIN FIRE

GALLIPOLIS, O., April 7.—(AP)—James White, 39, a squatter, and seven of his eight children, were burned to death today when fire swept their log cabin at Swan Creek, on the banks of the Ohio river, 10 miles south of here.

The dead, in addition to White, are: Mary, 20; James, 18; John, 14; Ira, 9; May, 5; and twin girls, Nora and Dora, aged 3.

The eighth child, George, 12, was burned so seriously he may die.

George, though semi-conscious from burns, escaped from the cabin and staggered and crawled to the home of Gilbert Lane, a quarter of a mile away for help.

The cabin was in ruins when Lane and other neighbors arrived and the heat was so intense it was impossible to rescue the victims.

The family moved into the cabin last Friday after being ordered to leave Gallipolis. They were extremely poor and occupied the cabin as squatters.

Cause of the fire was not immediately determined. George lost consciousness after summoning Lane, without saying how the blaze started.

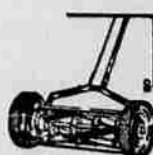
The fire broke out about 3 a. m., Lane said. The cabin, typical of farm structures in the Swan creek section, burned like dry tinder.

The children's mother died three years ago when the twins were born. First reports received here were that White had killed the children and committed suicide. County authorities, after an investigation, said they could discover nothing to verify this report.

Tower to Be Built On Wolf Mountain

A 70-foot lookout tower is to be built on Wolf mountain, on the divide between Salt creek and Hills creek, according to C. C. Olson, construction chief of the Cascade national forest. The tower is to be built of wood.

On the top of the tower a glass-enclosed lookout house will be installed. Wolf mountain is near Crater Lake.
