

# Homecoming Celebrates Anniversary of Founding of Thurston Church

## MANY OLD TIMERS RECALL BEGINNING OVER 41 YEARS AGO

THURSTON, April 7.—(Special)—The congregation of the Thurston church held its homecoming day services Sunday in commemoration of the forty-first anniversary of the building and dedication of the church building at that place. Many of the men of the neighborhood donated work on the building. The bell was added in 1883 and the bell purchased, and some remodeling was done by the church.

## 150 CHILDREN HUNT EGGS AT OAKRIDGE

For a while the weather was so cloudy it was doubtful whether or not the hunt could be held outdoors, but the rain held off until after the hunt was over.

It was hard to tell who enjoyed the hunt the most—the children or the parents. Standing room was crowded as the old ones gathered to watch the race and at times they became as excited as the children.

This is the first time a public Easter egg hunt has ever been given in this community and the American Legion men feel well paid for their efforts. The children are already looking forward to next Easter.
