## COUNCIL TRANSACTS MUCH BUSINESS AT MONDAY MEETING

COTTAGE GROVE, April 8.—(Special).—At regular meeting of the city council Monday night, two petitions relative to the removal of certain Postal Telegraph Co. poles on Whitaker avenue to the Southern Pacific railroad were presented and referred to the street committee and city attorney.

Action was taken regarding the partly burned buildings and a request for their removal will be made to the city attorney.

A special committee appointed by the mayor has found a suitable location for the city dump ground and has been authorized to construct a road that will be passable at all seasons of the year. A future announcement will be made.

The council authorized Chairman Hellwell of the street committee to have the macadam streets scarified and put in shape.

An adjourned meeting will be held April 20, to take action regarding the Booth-Kelly water shed in the Frayther creek district.

The question relative to suspension of the present ordinance regarding cement sidewalks and permission to repair board walks was discussed. The proposition was referred to the street committee for recommendation and report.

Clara Burkholder and a representative of the Foster-Kleiser company, again appeared before the council regarding the proposed sign to be placed on the Burkholder building. It was decided that the request be tabled until such time as the city has an ordinance covering this matter.

All officers were reappointed for the ensuing year. Herbert Lombard, city attorney; Dr. Frost, city health officer; G. B. Pitcher, chief of police; L. W. Colner, city engineer, superintendent of water department, city street commissioner, city purchasing agent, city light inspector and city building inspector.
