

GIRL TRAPPED IN CAR; RESCUE FAILS

BELLINGHAM, Wash., April 10.—(U.P.)—A girl, when her car skidded on wet planking and plunged into Marjorie's slough, north of here, Miss Marjorie Patterson, 22, an English girl, was killed, and her companion, Marjorie Tait, of 348 Olympic place, Seattle, narrowly escaped death today.

The young women were enroute to Vancouver, B. C., when their car skidded and crashed through the railing of a bridge, tearing out 40 feet of the railing and plunging into the slough.

Miss Tait managed to open one door of the car and rose to the surface, then submerged herself and attempted to rescue Miss Patterson, who was wedged into the sedan. She labored until nearly exhausted, then was dragged out by E. C. Fuller and James C. Lochridge, farmers.

Geary P.-T. A. Asks For New Building

A resolution asking that a new and modern school building be erected in place of the Geary school was adopted at a meeting of the Geary Parent-Teacher association Thursday afternoon and committee will go before the board at its next meeting to urge action, it was announced.

The Geary school building is the oldest in the city, being much older than the Patterson school building which was abandoned last year as being unsafe.

STATE LEGION HEAD SPEAKS IN EUGENE

Jack Biggs, of Hermiston, departmental commander of the American Legion, spoke to about 200 legionnaires of Eugene at a stag banquet in his honor at the armory Thursday night.

He urged that all legion posts speed up membership campaigns to get a large state enrollment by the time of the 1932 national convention slated for Portland.

"We have passed the 10,000 mark now, and are looking to passing the 15,000 mark by the time the convention comes," he said.

More than 100 new Eugene recruits greeted him at the banquet, and the state commander remarked that Eugene had been active in membership.

In his address he stressed service to the ex-service men as a leading duty of the legion.

The banquet was the first major affair held in the newly renovated armory quarters. Legionnaires say the various service organizations of Eugene have spent \$1000 in fixing up the new headquarters.

Monthly Total at Library 7361 Books

The total circulation for the month of March at the Eugene public library was 7361 books, according to the report made up. Of this number, 5294 were for adults and 2067 for children. The total is 390 more than for February but less than for January when the total reached 8140.

In jail, and was given instructions as to how to get in touch with Toose, or Holmstrom, the defendants, in case of trouble.

At the "Baker" ranch, Gilliland said, he found a large still and seven 120-gallon vats of mash. He testified he was put to work operating a large steam still machine.

While working there the machine blew up, burning him seriously. When he recovered he found the entire plant had been wiped out by fire.

The government took every opportunity to attempt to link Toose with the actual organization of the asserted ring, over strenuous objections of the defense.

It was apparent the defense claim will be that Toose was retained at times to represent some of the defendants, but acted in a legal capacity only.
