

## WEBFOOT GRIDMEN TO PLAY NODAKS

The University of Oregon added another intercollegiate football game to its 1931 schedule Thursday when it announced that a game with the University of North Dakota team would be played at Grand Forks, North Dakota, October 24. The arrangements were completed by wire early Thursday morning by Hugh Rosson, graduate manager of the associated students here.

The University of North Dakota team, coached by C. A. West, has 11 games on its schedule this year. The Nodaks have a strong team but will probably not be in the class with the University of Southern California and New York university whom the Webfoots will play the week preceding and the week following the North Dakota game.

## STATE EDUCATION STORY

Important since the board was created in 1929 and will excel in public interest many important meetings of the state board of higher curricula, which preceded the state board of higher education.

Possibility that the higher education turmoil will die down without noteworthy action seems precluded by the fact that the economy program is a certainty, and in it is wrapped up the necessity for some form of reorganization.

The actual savings which the schools are expected to make in the next 18 months total \$1,470,000. While the legislative appropriation is only \$1,181,000, it is for an entire biennium, and only 18 months of that period remain. In the first six months the schools operated on the supposition that they would receive the whole appropriation, so that in the remaining period they must reduce expenses even beyond the amount cut off from the biennial budget. The exact amount to save is thus \$1,470,000.

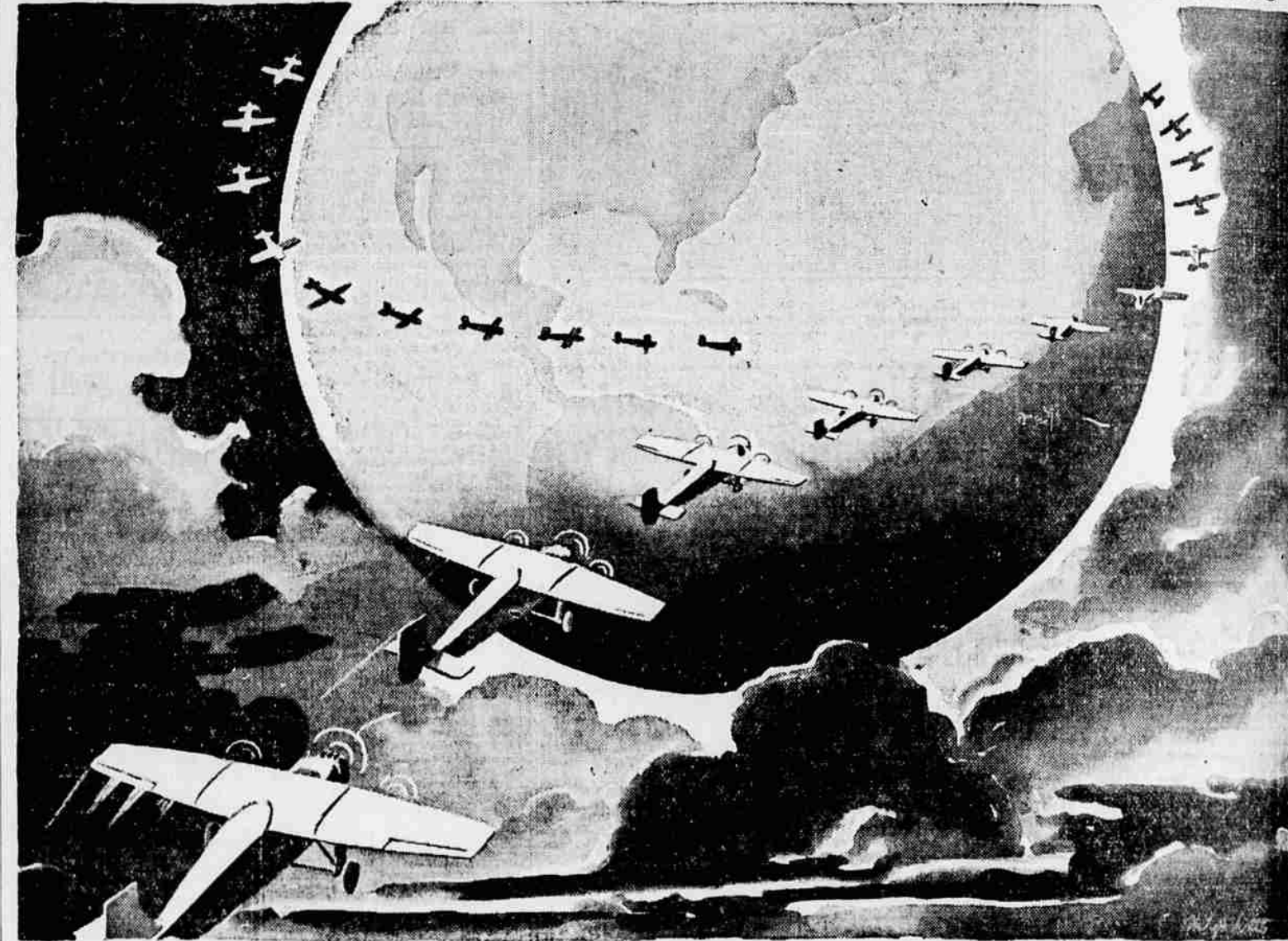
