

NEWER RELIGIOUS LEADERSHIP NEED SAYS WHITESMITH

What is demanded of religious leadership? That is the question which Rev. Ernest M. Whitesmith, pastor of the Community Liberal church, answered in his sermon Sunday. He took as his text the scripture, "Verily I say unto you, the publicans and harlots enter into the Kingdom of God before you."

"These words were addressed to the reputedly best citizens and religious leaders of the time; not because the speaker approved the lives of the publicans and harlots, nor because he disapproved the theological creed of the Pharisees, but because these reputedly religious leaders of the people lived lives of conventional virtue, self-righteousness, and because there was often to be found in the publicans and harlots more of that one essential to good living, the spirit of unselfish love," Rev. Whitesmith said. "When duty demanded that these leaders go ahead and take some risks they 'played safe' and, playing safe has always been the game of the selfish leader who is nothing more than an exploiter."

"He also accused them of being hypocrites—of insincerity; and that is the charge that can rightfully be brought against much of the religious leadership of our day. It parades under false colors. It uses pious phraseology that hides emptiness of real thought."

"He also accused them of being cowards and afraid of the mob which they exploited and despised."

"The times demand a religious leadership that shall have the courage and the enlightenment of conscience to lead the way to a better morality than that which has prevailed amongst us—the pharisaic morality which I have called a conventionally virtuous selfishness. Under it man is held in high esteem who is sober, industrious, self-disciplined, respectable and in every way fitted to take care of himself. As the Hebrew Psalmist bitterly said, 'When thou doest good to thyself, men will praise thee.' The rule of the old morality has been 'Take good care of yourself. Try to get the best for yourself out of this life and heaven for yourself in the next.'"

"Under that type of morality we are having a progressive breakdown of our civilization. Our courts are made the tools of unscrupulous barristers. Our entire professional life is being commercialized. Young men and women come to college to fit themselves, not for a life of public helpfulness, but usually to obtain greater efficiency in extracting a good salary and a comfortable living from the public. The signs of the dominant look-out-for-yourself morality may be seen in the vandals who break trees and shrubbery in the public parks and along the public highways and yet most of these are ranked among the numbers of the good citizens of our day."

"We need a new criterion of goodness and a new rationale of conduct based upon a very old standard: 'Look not every man upon his own affairs, but every man also upon the affairs of others. Bear ye one another's burdens.'"

Lasso Used to Catch Cougar

A cougar nine or ten months old and measuring five feet long was lassoed with a rope by William Clark and William McMahon, well known hunters of the upper Willamette country, several days ago and the animal is now being exhibited in a cage at Westfir.

Dogs which Clark and McMahon had with them in the mountains back of Westfir had treed the cougar in a clump of tall brush, according to Clark, who was in Eugene Saturday. The animal was not very high off the ground and the men, who had brought a rope for that express purpose, in case they treed a cougar, set about to capture the animal alive. The young brute, snarling and growling, fought off the rope for a long time, but finally it settled perfectly around the cougar's neck and it was then only a matter of a short time until the hunters had the animal securely tied. They had taken the precaution to first tie the rope solidly to a tree.

Clark a few days previous had lassoed another cougar after his dogs had treed it, but as he was alone he was unable to handle the animal and was compelled to kill it.

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REFUGEES ARRIVE FROM NICARAGUA

NEW ORLEANS, April 20.—(AP)—Thirty Americans, men, women and children, tragic and nerve-shattered, arrived in American waters aboard the steamship Cefalu today, refugees from the latest outbreak of banditry in Nicaragua.

Many of them penniless and with nothing left save the clothes they wore, they docked at New Orleans tonight, bringing with them tales of massacre and guerrilla warfare. The bodies of two of the nine Americans killed in the Nicaraguan bush during the past week, lay in the hold of the Cefalu, whose pennants flew at half staff as she steamed up the Mississippi river. SIAMESE MONARCH ON WAY EASTWARD

ABOARD THE ROYAL SIAMESE SPECIAL, Revelstoke, B. C., April 20.—(AP)—Canadians of the interior caught their first glimpse of a visiting monarch late today when King Prajadhipok of Siam made a brief halt on his journey to New York to undergo an eye operation.

It was the first public appearance of the king and Queen Rambai Barnai since their departure at midnight from Vancouver, where they came by boat from the Orient.

Prince Suvast, father-in-law of the king, will make a trip to Hollywood Cal. after he accompanies the king to New York, he said. He did not state the date of his journey to California.

The king and queen plan to return by way of Canada.

They will reach Calgary, Alberta, early tomorrow and enter the United States at Portal, N. D., tomorrow night.

SHOUSE DEMANDS PROHIBIT SUBSTITUTION

PORTLAND, Ore., April 20.—(AP)—The declaration that "some effective substitute for the conditions that prevail today under the eighteenth amendment" must be found by the democratic party, was voiced by J. J. Shouse, chairman of the national democratic executive committee, last night in addressing democratic leaders of the state.

He left later for Seattle and from there will proceed to Washington, D. C. His trip to the coast was in the interest of party organization. The party must, he said, "have the courage to deal with this issue."

He said economic issues, the power question and prohibition will form the

battleground upon which the 1932 presidential election will be fought. His remarks on prohibition eliminated criticism of republican administration, an outline of reasons for democratic optimism, and a framework for the democratic platform.
