

OREGON JEWELERS ELECT OFFICERS

SALEM, April 28.—(AP)—J. S. Zell, Portland, and A. A. Kene, Salem, were re-elected president and secretary-treasurer, respectively, of the Oregon Retail Jewelers' association, at the close of the 24th annual convention of the association last night.

Other officers elected were P. T. Bubar, Roseburg, first vice-president; Seth French, Albany, second vice-president; Larry Shale, Medford, third vice-president; Carl Greve and Frank A. Heitkemper, both of Portland, members of the executive committee.

Congressman W. C. Hawley addressed the association during the afternoon session, sketching briefly the economic conditions, their causes and effects. "If the people can be persuaded that economic recovery is in their own hands, that it is their own problem to learn to trade and buy to the extent that they are able, business can be brought back to a healthy normalcy," the congressman said.

More than 150 jewelers attended the convention.

U. S. TOLD TO MEET PRICES OF RUSSIA

DETROIT, April 28.—(AP)—Ray Long, magazine editor, last night warned delegates to the annual meeting of the Association of National Advertisers that serious consequences will follow American failure to learn how to solve the problem of meeting Russian competition.

"America's day as a wheat exporting nation is past," Mr. Long said. He added that the country can no longer compete in the world markets with cheap Russian wheat. "We shall never see dollar wheat again in the United States," he declared.

Long said American prosperity depends on export trade and Russia is the greatest potential market in the world.

"Soviet trade competition is becoming so serious that American business men must realize it and prepare to meet it if they are not prepared to lose many world markets."

Would-be Hubbies Turn to City Head

ELYRIA, O.—(AP)—Matrimonially-inclined swains of Elyria and hereabouts have turned to Mayor James A. Hewitt for aid in seeking mates.

Youth Owns Large Stamp Collection

CLINTON, Neb.—(AP)—Although he has only nursed his hobby for about seven years, Frank Lyon, 12, has one of the largest stamp collections in Nebraska.

There are 24,205 stamps, all different, in his collection. Nearly every foreign country is represented, but Frank is proudest of his 1,205 stamps of the United States. His entire collection is valued at many hundreds of dollars.

Most valuable in his collection is an 1857 two-pence Newfoundland, which is valued at \$350. He is an expert authority on stamp issues of many countries. Frank's father operates a curio store.

Old Steamer Said To be on Umpqua, Instead Siuslaw

The stern-wheeler river schooner pictured in the Register-Guard several weeks ago as having operated on the lower Siuslaw in early days did not run on that stream but instead operated on the lower Umpqua between Gardiner and Scottsburg and sometimes on Smith river, a tributary of the Umpqua, according to J. M. Nighswander, Eugene route 3, who formerly lived on the lower Umpqua.

The steamer was named the Restless, according to Mr. Nighswander, and it operated on the Umpqua in the early seventies. It was later dismantled and the engine was built into another stern-wheeler, the Eva, which ran on the Umpqua until about 1905. Its crew was headed by a Captain Caswell.

Jimmy Graham was captain of the Eva, Mr. Nighswander said. Finally the steamer was converted into a houseboat at Gardiner, and now its remains are on the bottom of the Umpqua near there.

Captain Henry Wade, at one time owner of the Lockwood hotel, the location of which was finally established as Gardiner, operated a screw-propeller steamer, the Juneau I, up Smith river from Gardiner for many years. His daughter, Miss Belle Wade, now resides at Gardiner, was also a licensed pilot and also piloted the Juneau I at times.

The pictures of the steamer and of the Lockwood hotel were from the McClanahan collection of old-time photos, a number of which have appeared in the Register-Guard.

CITY COUNCIL STORY

Beard, H. L. Looney and W. C. Clubb, city engineer. The ordinance provides that the board shall consist of one merchant, one sign maker and one engineer or architect.

The council received a petition from merchants on Willamette street in the vicinity of the intersection of Eighth avenue, asking that taxicab stands be removed from that locality, claiming that the cabs parked on the streets there prevented store customers from parking. Chief of Police Hall favored the move, claiming that some side street would be just as good a place for the taxicab stands and declaring that as 95 per cent of the orders for cabs come by telephone it was not necessary to maintain the stands on the busy business streets. The question was referred to the police committee for action.

Councilman Simon reported that he had interviewed wood haulers about parking on the streets and that while some were willing to contribute toward the rental of a lot where their trucks could be parked, others wanted to remain on the street. The councilman said that George C. Stanley, grocer, who had complained that the trucks barred customers' cars from parking near his store on Charnell street, was quoted as saying that he would be willing to help pay the rental on a lot in order to relieve the situation. It was suggested that the restrictions on the wood trucks be extended to the third zone but no action was taken. The matter was referred to the committee.

Cinders and smoke from smokestacks in the business district came in for considerable discussion after Councilman Zumwalt had reported that cinders blown into stores and offices were becoming almost unbearable. He suggested that some method should be employed to arrest the cinders but it was pointed out by Councilman Reid, who has a smokestack at his creamery, that it is almost impossible to keep the cinders from flying. He said that he has a contrivance on his stack but when he closes it the draft is practically shut off. It was suggested that the city attorney draw up an ordinance covering this alleged nuisance and the mayor advised no action until someone checks up with other cities to ascertain how they are handling the question.

Councilman Hendershott suggested that Chief Nisbaum of the fire department should be directed to make a thorough survey of the business district as to fire hazards and a motion was carried to that effect.

A report on the question of the assessment on a lot belonging to George Korn in Kincaid park for the paving of Victoria boulevard was made to the effect that the improvement greatly enhanced the value of the lot and the council voted to let the assessment stand.

The Hobi Airways reported that the total receipts of the airport were \$288.49 and that the city's share was \$14.42.

A petition to change the name of

Indiana avenue to Twenty-sixth avenue was read and referred to the planning commission.

The viewers reported on the matter of opening Fifth avenue and Mill street through the mill property on the race, assessing damages and benefits.

An ordinance was passed for a cement sidewalk in front of the M. O'Neil property on the east side of Washington street between Twenty-first and Twenty-second avenues.

Councilman Edwards suggested the purchase of cages for the light globes in Riverview park and the request was granted. He stated that the globes were often broken either through carelessness or maliciousness on the part of the public.

be established by which the will of the electorate might be set aside for partisan advantage or for personal advantage on the part of a legislative majority or an unscrupulous governor.

"The impeachment and removal powers were created primarily in order to meet conditions where a public official after election by the people betrays his trust by acts of corruption, criminality or incompetence.

"In the case before me the principal allegations relate to acts and

conduct of subordinate officials of the public officer complained against. When the charges are of this nature it must clearly appear either that the various acts and wrongdoings complained of on the part of the subordinate officials were known by the mayor and that he failed to take steps to correct or punish such wrongdoing or that he was negligent and recreant in failing to keep himself properly advised. 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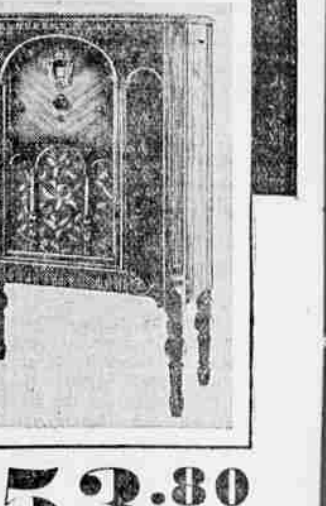

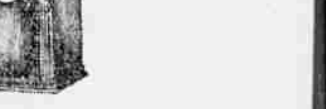
