played is cut 10 per cent through shorter hours and part-time work, the loss amounts to several more billions. Add to this great loss in power the retrenchment due to the fears and uncertainties of such a period and the total loss of purchasing power becomes a staggering amount.

Program Needed
A governmental program contemplating expenditures of as high as a billion dollars a year would be helpful, he said, but "could not materially affect the situation."

"I am enough of an optimist," Mr. Lamont said, "to believe that industrial history will again repeat itself and that the next fifty years will witness further displacement of labor, and the further development of many new products and services which will affect employment to those displaced and supply the ever-expanding wants of our people."

"But these bright prospects for the long-term future cannot obscure the fact that we are deep into one of the most severe depressions of our business history, and that labor and capital as well have suffered seriously from curtailed earnings and unemployment in spite of this I am sure it will not be denied that there has been less actual distress and less social disturbance than before labor under similar circumstances."

"Industry generally has shown an interest in its workers of a quality never before seen in this or any other country. Labor's attitude as well has been a most enlightened one. This voluntary assumption of the part of industry, involving as it has the finest type of cooperative spirit and collective effort, has been one of the most important factors in carrying us thus far without serious distress or disturbance through a major depression. And this attitude on the part of industry toward its common problems seems to me to hold out the best hope of the future."

HOOVER, COOLIDGE TO SPEAK ON AIR

WASHINGTON, April 29.—(AP)—President Hoover and former President Coolidge will be heard on the same radio program June 15, on the occasion of the dedication of the Harding memorial at Marion, O.

The exercises, from 2:00 to 3:15 p. m. E. S. T., will broadcast nationally by the Columbia Broadcasting company.

Joseph T. Frothingham of New Jersey, president of the Harding Memorial association, will open the program with a brief address. Mr. Coolidge then will speak, acting as master of ceremonies. He will introduce Governor White of Ohio.

White will turn the \$750,000 structure over to President Hoover, who will accept it in behalf of the nation, making the principal address. Vice President Curtis and Senator Davis, republican, Penn., who is a member of the Harding cabinet, are expected to attend.
