Water Use Increases— Eugene home owners are using a great deal of city water on their lawns. It is reported by the water department. Since the recent wind storm the ground has been exceedingly dry and the lawns have shown the need of irrigation. The wind dried the ground in two or three days more than a week of hot sunshine without the wind would, it is stated. It is not often that general watering of lawns begins in April as there is usually enough rain in that month to insure plenty of moisture in the ground.

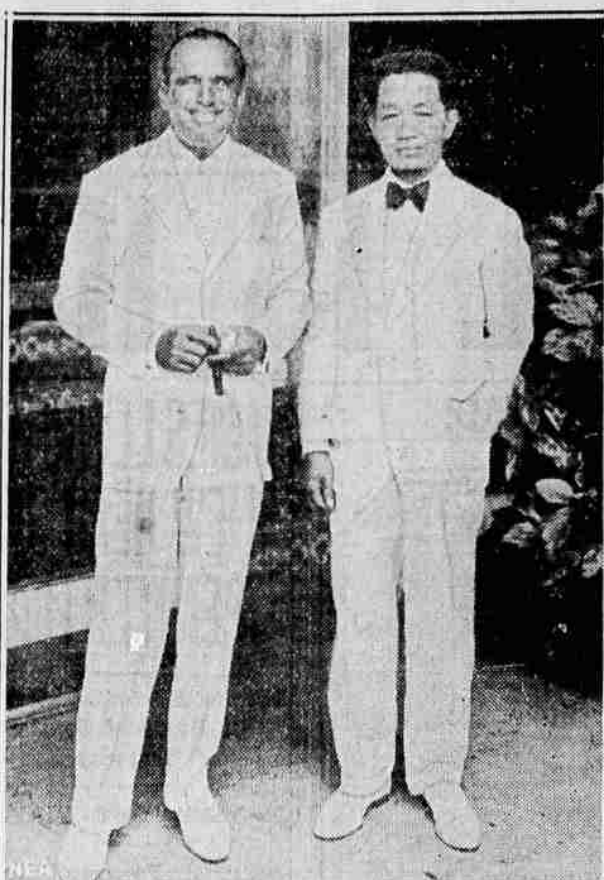
Miss Skow to Portland— Miss Gertrude L. Skow, county home agent, plans to go to Portland Saturday to attend a meeting of home economics extension agents.

Thursday afternoon Miss Skow conducted a meeting at the school building at Creswell on diets.

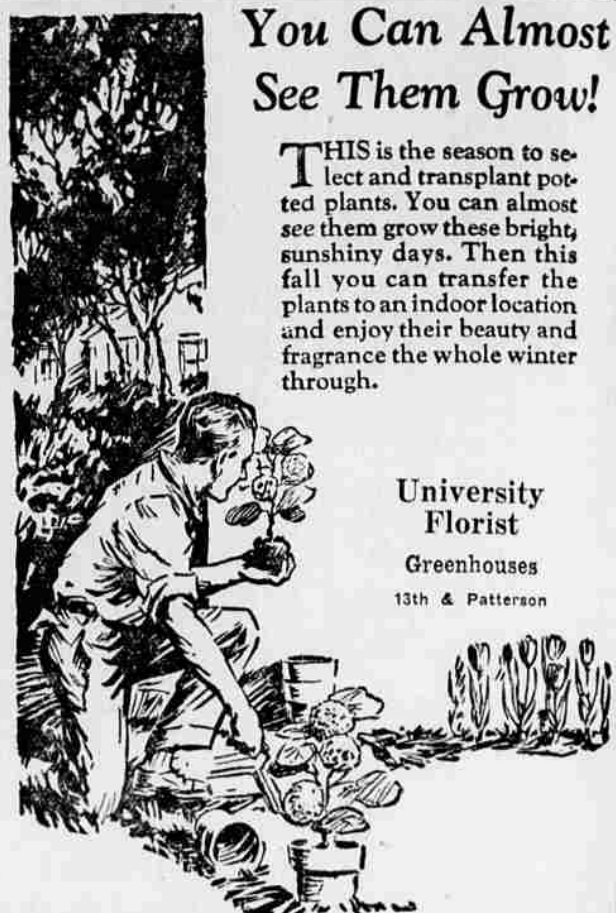
