

NEW CAPITOL PLAN NOT OBJECTIONABLE HOLDS GUY CORDON

ROSEBURG, May 1.—(Special)—Land grant counties in Oregon can make no objection to any arrangement that does not imperil their right to receive the equivalent of taxes upon reversioned lands within their boundaries. District Attorney Guy Cordon stated here today, discussing Senator McNary's proposal to amortize the state's equity in Oregon-California grant lands, for the purpose of building a new state capitol at Salem.

The state of Oregon has an equity of 25 per cent in the O. and C. fund after charges provided for in the Chamberlain and Ferris act and Standfield act are taken care of in accordance with the provisions of those two acts. Mr. Cordon stated, those two acts, Mr. Cordon said, he could not tell definitely how the land grant counties will be affected by Senator McNary's plan, until he is given more definite information as to the details of the proposition submitted.

"Press dispatches I have seen upon this matter have not been clear," Mr. Cordon declared, "and I intend to take this matter up with the effect will be upon the land grant counties. Senator McNary has apparently made a proposal, which has, in turn, been met by a counter proposal by the federal government. Just what the details are I do not know, as I have had no information other than press dispatches. I intend, however, to take this matter up with Senator McNary immediately upon his arrival in Oregon."

"The Chamberlain-Ferris act, by which these lands were reversioned to the government, provided that from the sales, after all charges had been deducted, the government should receive 10 per cent for administration, 40 per cent should go to the general reclamation fund and 25 per cent to the state and 25 per cent to the counties in which the lands were located."

"The Standfield act provided that the federal government should advance to the counties an amount equivalent to lost taxes, and should reimburse itself, with interest, of the proceeds of sales. This advance applies only to 25 per cent equity held by the counties and does not affect the state's equal equity, upon which no advance has been made."

"Provided Senator McNary's plan does not imperil the rights of the counties to receive the equivalent of taxes, the counties can have no objection."

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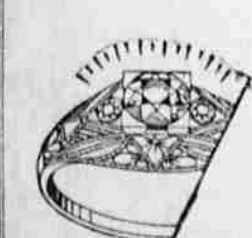

Operation for Cataract on King's Eye Described

NEW YORK, May 1.—(AP)—The cataract of the eye, the removal of which King Prajadhipok of Siam has come to the United States, while not presenting a serious surgical problem, is interesting from the medical point of view in that it should occur in so young a man.

King Prajadhipok is 38 years old. Cataracts among the aged are rather common.

Both eyes of the king are affected.

The cataract in the left eye, which has been developing for six years, is now ripe for removal. The cataract in the right eye is not ready for surgical treatment. There is no way of getting rid of cataracts, except by operation.

The operation will be performed May 10 at Ophir Hall, the West-church estate of the late Mrs. White-law Reid, where the king and queen

are making their home while in this country.

Dr. John Martin Wheeler, New York surgeon, assisted by Dr. Thomas H. Johnson, will perform it.

The term cataract is used to indicate a condition where the crystalline lens of the eye becomes clouded. In the operation the entire clouded lens is removed. After the operation the patient is equipped with a glass lens worn as spectacles on a frame, to take the place of the lens that has been removed.

The operation should result in normal, or nearly normal, vision.

The exact cause of uncomplicated cataract is unknown, but one of the causative factors is some interference with the nutrition of the crystalline lens.

As the king is also a sufferer from hay fever and asthma, he will undergo a series of tests and treatments by Dr. Robert A. ROOSEVELT RAPS BACKWARD PARTY IN CONTROL NOW

NEW YORK, May 1.—(AP)—A speech by Governor Roosevelt criticizing "the conservative and reactionary party now in power in Washington" was published today.

The governor spoke last night at a dinner of the Young Men's Democratic club of New York but omitted from his remarks references to Washington contained in the speech given to newspapers.

Asked if the omission was intentional, the governor said he did not realize there had been omissions and he stood behind the speech as it was distributed for publication.

"We have reorganized and modernized the whole machinery of our state government," read the prepared speech. "In many other places, even in Washington, the clogged and creaking, cumbersome wheels of government machinery are geared to the pace of 50 years ago. Timorous councils have permitted no more than constant patching, a new rivet here, an extra bolt there; interminable struts and props and additional parts without co-relation to each other, which have been added until the whole structure hesitates at every attempt to speed up in keeping with modern life."

"And as in this state, so it is in the nation—from the conservative and reactionary party now in power in Washington, from the timid councils of the aged, from the selfish grasping power of the powerful few who control action from behind the scenes, the people all over these United States are looking to our party to lead them into the broad road that leads to the real democracy of which our forefathers dreamt."

Governor Roosevelt had planned to go south for a vacation today but delayed departure when he received a message that his mother, Mrs. James Roosevelt, is ill in Paris.

Mayor Walker, who was cleared by Governor Roosevelt of charges filed against him by the city affairs committee, was invited to the dinner but did not attend.
