

BIG RELAY EVENT PLANNED MAY 30

Representatives of different Sunday schools in the city will meet at the Y. M. C. A. next Tuesday at 7:15 o'clock to discuss plans for a big relay race meet to be held on May 30, it was announced Friday by William Kidwell, boys' work secretary of the Y. M. C. A.

The place for holding the events has not been decided upon but it will probably be at the county fair track or at the University of Oregon, Mr. Kidwell said.

Among the events to be staged at the time of the meet are the following: Relay and shuttle standing broad jump; relay and shuttle running broad jump; relay and shuttle running mile; pole vault for distance, both shuttle and relay; running relays and throwing the caber. This is an old Irish game and consists of throwing a pole of certain dimensions.

The boys participating in the events will be formed into two divisions, one the Comrade division for boys from 15 to 18 and the other the Junior division for those from 12 to 15.

Thompson, county traffic officer, who said that Thurman, while plowing, tore up the county road adjacent to his field.

Justice Johnston continued Thurman's case 30 days for sentence after remanding him.

Former Boy King Ill; Parents at His Bedside

BUCHAREST, Rumania, May 1.—(P)—While his estranged father and mother stared coldly at each other from opposite sides of his sick bed, Michael, the boy who was king, today lay suffering with diphtheria, dread disease of childhood.

Two injections of serum administered by the royal physicians were believed to have averted serious danger of death, although it was said that anxiety must continue. The crown prince, who carries the title "Grand Voivode of Alba Julia," was running a high temperature.

The physicians warned Queen Helen, the mother of Michael, that she must not endanger her own life or run the risks of contagion by too constant attendance upon the patient, who is nine years old.

Helen looked at King Carol, who was standing near her in the sick-room and answered:

"What is life to me? I have only one child. I shall never have another. My place is at his side!"

Carol, breaking a near silence of

months in which he is said to have spoken to her only from over his shoulder, reiterated the physician's warning, and assured her that Michael had trustworthy nurses and attendants. But Helen only shook her head.

It is the second time this year that Michael has been ill, he having suffered from a chill and influenza in January. Some concern was felt by the royal family last year at his tendency to obesity. Recently King Carol instructed attendants to teach him everything about automobile mechanics.

Carol, called to the bedside of Michael at Helen's quarters in the Sinaia palace, was having his political troubles at the same time. Premier Jorga dissolved parliament and called new elections for next month against widespread popular protests. Crowds which shouted "long live the king" in answer to the shouts of other crowds which cheered the new Spanish republic ranged the streets of Bucharest during the night.

Sons marched in a May day parade, which passed without incident.

Suit to Condemn Brought By County

Suit to condemn certain property along the right-of-way of the Gate Creek-Nimrod section of the McKenzie highway was brought by the Lane county court Thursday against Nelson W. Coffee, Leona D. Coffee, and Edward J. H. Zimmerman.

This property lies in the path of the improvement work being done on the McKenzie highway, the complaint states. The county offered \$1,495.83 for the parcels of land involved, it is alleged, and upon refusal was forced to bring condemnation suit. The property belongs to Coffee and is being sold to Zimmerman on contract.

Of 707 arrested, 202 were released, police said. Thousands of ner-

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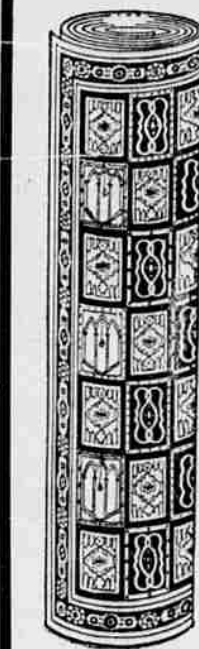
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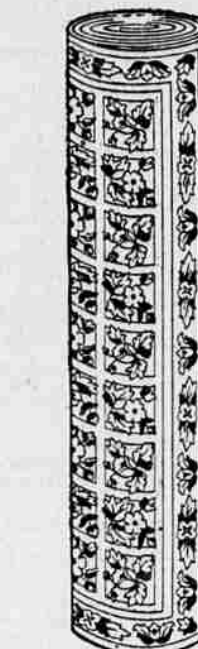
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
