

MOVE IS STARTED TO PUT GANGSTER IN JAIL FOR LIFE

CATSKILL, N. Y., May 1.—(AP)—A move to put Jack (Legs) Diamond in prison for life in event of his recovery, and a drive to learn whether county officials are involved in the racketeering here, were started today.

Attorney General John J. Bennett will go before the Greene county grand jury tomorrow and ask indictments charging the New York gang leader, who was shot down by enemies at the Saratoga Inn Sunday night, with violation of the Sullivan anti-firearm law and kidnapping.

The latter charge is based on accusations brought by James Duncan, who alleges he was kidnapped with Grover Parks, a farmer, when the latter was seized by Diamond and his henchmen while delivering a load of

hard cider. Parks claims he was taken to Diamond's garage at Acra and tortured when he refused to reveal the location of an applejack still in the Catskill hills.

Bennett said the gangster already has been convicted twice, once for desertion from the army and for assault. If the attorney general secures convictions on firearms violation and kidnapping charge he will send Diamond to jail for life under the Baumes habitual criminal law.

In the meantime, he has subpoenaed the bank accounts of nearly 100 persons in this county, some of whom are said to be county officials.

GANGSTERS ESCAPE
WILLOUGHBY, O., May 1.—(AP)—Three suspected New York or Chicago gangsters escaped from police here early today after they were arrested for speeding through the city. The trio fled toward Cleveland in a stolen auto, abandoning their own car, a large sedan. Police found six revolvers, 500 rounds of ammunition and New York and Illinois license plates in the sedan. The license plates on the car were stolen in Buffalo yesterday, police said.

Detectives said the three men have been implicated in the shooting of Jack (Legs) Diamond, New York hoodlum Sunday night and were en route to their hideout in Chicago.

SHOUSE ATTACKS HOOVER'S REGIME

FRANKFORT, Ky., May 1.—(AP)—Jouett Shouse, chairman of the democratic national executive committee, attacking the administration of President Hoover in address here today before the state convention of the democratic women's club of Kentucky, declared President Hoover "as utterly misplaced in the White House as any man could be."

"The American people have ceased to give credence to statements issuing from the White House," said Shouse. "The trouble is President Hoover can't deal with men on a basis of equality, although he does well where he has the authority of a czar."

Shouse predicted the democratic party would gain control of both houses of congress as well as the presidency in 1932 and said Kentucky had the opportunity "to lead the way this fall for a victory that would provide the basis for from 20 to 30 years of democratic rule in the nation."

Discussing prohibition, Shouse said: "I hope the democratic party will have the courage to make a constructive declaration on this vexing problem."

Shouse criticized President Hoover for what he charged was failure to give Senator Robert Wagner of New York credit for employment relief measures introduced by the senator in the last congress.
