

CONSERVATION OF FOREST LANDS IS OBJECT OF PLANS

Conservation of scenic and recreational values of forest lands is the purpose of new regulations reserving strips 400 feet wide along all federal and state highways, and strips 200 feet wide along county and community roads, in the national forests.

The rules are contained in new forest service regulations approved by Chief Forester R. V. Stuart of Washington, D. C., and the information is sent out from the office of Regional Forester C. J. Buck, of Portland, to the Cascade forest office here.

Forest roads in Oregon and Washington will become the most beautiful highways in America if citizens of the two states will assist forest officials in carrying out the new regulations for preserving the beauty of the highways, says Mr. Buck.

There are, he said, some 4,000,000 acres of privately owned lands within the national forests of Oregon and Washington, which may be used as the owners see fit. Much of this lies along the forest highways, and while the forest service will attempt to secure many instances to exchange this roadside land for government stumps, in order to preserve it, the co-operation of private individuals will be necessary to make the most of the new regulations.

The new regulation is expected to aid greatly in preserving forest highways in the country east and west of Eugene. The new rules for the management of lands along forest and mountain roads follow:

1.—The location of roads in national forests will no longer be viewed solely from the engineer's standpoint of speed and economy of construction, but recreational and scenic aspects will also be given the consideration due them. The cutting of timber and disposal of brush and debris along rights of way, the location of gravel pits, stock piles, and camps will be regulated so as not to impair the aesthetic qualities of lands abutting national forest roads.

2.—To conserve the scenic and recreational value of national forest lands, a strip 400 feet wide, or wider if necessary, will be reserved by the forest service along all federal and state highways, and a strip 200 feet wide along county and community roads within the national forests. No form of occupancy or use of such lands will be allowed except under permit from the chief forester or regional forester, and no permits will be issued that will sacrifice public values or services.

3.—The present forest service policy prohibiting the display of advertising signs on government land, which has been in force in the national forests of Oregon and Washington for over a decade, will apply to these reserved roadside strips and will be strictly enforced.

Southern Pacific would receive \$450 from the Oakland district and \$150.44 from the Lowell district.

Some question has been raised here concerning the validity of the objection to this figure. While the errors were confirmed by a study of the figures, it is pointed out that the people actually voted the total to be raised and whether their decision can be questioned on the basis of errors in addition is doubtful.

Considerable inconvenience is faced in connection with these situations in both districts, as the errors involve all assessments in the district. The Southern Pacific pays large shares of the taxes in both districts. Adjustment in both instances is expected by county officials.

Oregon's Wet Weather Is Envied By Californians

Western Oregonians who have been in the habit of apologizing for the protracted rains of their home land should take a trip through parched California, according to John Beardsley, who has just returned from a two-weeks jaunt into the Golden state.

Lack of water, Mr. Beardsley reports, is creating a serious economic problem throughout most of northern California, and the plight of the farmer is easily apparent to the visitor. Rainfall has been lighter for a number of years in many places, and while the residents are still hoping for a return to "normalcy" they admit that it has been eight or ten years since "normal" rainfall.

Mr. Beardsley visited a relative at Woodland, in the center of what has been conceded as the richest agricultural county in the country. Grain, which usually is thriving there at this time of year, was little above stubble height, and farmers who have stock

were using the grain fields for pasture.

Water from deep private wells seemed to be fairly plentiful, Mr. Beardsley said, but farmers who depend on irrigation systems are having a hard time of it. Reports of the green Oregon country have seeped into California, and Mr. Beardsley heard many Californians express a desire to pull up stakes and make for Oregon.

A spirit of determination to make the most of the situation was evident among the people, Mr. Beardsley said. A return of better conditions is hoped for within two or three years, and in the meantime the cue is to "keep a stiff upper lip."

Mr. Beardsley went to California with Walter Lewandor, manager of the Eugene hospital. The trip down set a record, the Eugene men believe. They left here at 8:17 a. m., crossed into California at 10:30 a. m., and were in Oakland at 8 p. m.

Storms were reported in the territory from Colorado to Iowa and from Kansas to Minnesota.

A Kansas hailstorm caused an estimated loss of 20,000,000 bushels of wheat. So severe was the storm that it virtually moved down thousands of acres of grain. Large stones shattered windows and killed jackrabbits.

Snow and rainstorms were reported in Colorado. Leadville reported two inches of snow and other cities in the north and eastern parts of the state were hit by rain and sleet. In Denver the snow climaxed a day of sunshine, rain, hail and strong winds.

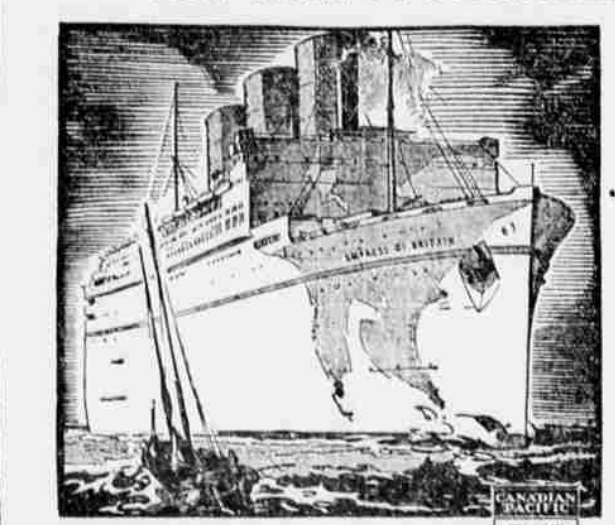

DR. F. E. ADAMS IS NAMED FOR OFFICE SCHOOL DIRECTOR

Dr. F. E. Adams, physician with offices in the Link building on Seventh avenue east and living on Grandy street in the southwestern part of the city, is being put forward as a candidate for school director of the Eugene district, a nominating petition having been filed in the office of H. K. Ginn, city superintendent, Wednesday.

"I did not know anything about the petition," said Dr. Adams, "but if the people in that part of the city want me to run I presume it will be proper for me to accept."

The annual school election will be held this year on June 15. C. H. A. Brechtel is the member of the board whose term expires this year. It is not learned whether or not he will seek the place for another term.

The petition nominating Dr. Adams for director contains the names of 52 residents of the southwestern part of the city, this number being far above the required number to make it legal.

E. H. Spencer, realty dealer, who was interested in having the petition circulated, said that the people south of Seventeenth avenue and west of Willamette street have never before had a candidate up for election on the board and they felt that this part of the city should be represented.

Residents of that section of the city have at different times expressed a desire that the board arrange for the erection of a grade school building on the lot owned by the district on south Washington street and in case their candidate is elected he may work to that end, but those who circulated the petition said the matter had not yet been discussed.

that truck competition will not kill the effect of the canalization.

"What can you do on the river when you have the competition of the truck lines?" he said engineers asked him. "We'll have to answer them," he said.

He pointed out that Oregon industry would be saved large sums by canalization by the government. There will be no looking charge or payment by the people for upkeep of the locks, he said.

"It will be transportation at no cost to the taxpayer," Mr. Hawley said.

In regard to the general depression in business, he said the American people expended \$500,000,000 more than they have coming in for various luxuries and necessary commodities. He said that every year for a long time seven billion dollars of foreign money came into the United States seeking investment. Because of the depression, only 4 1/2 billion is coming this year.

"The fact that people are buying government bonds in billion-dollar amounts is an indication that the people fear the future," he said.

Summing up, he said:

"We rely in this crisis upon the character of the American people. We can say that we've never been licked yet, and we won't be now."

SEEK SLAYER

JACKSON, Ky., May 6.—(AP)—A posse of sheriff's deputies and citizens today searched the hills south of here for persons who fired on a passing automobile last night, killing Miss Tessie Patton, 18-year-old co-ed at the University of Kentucky here.

George Daniels, Jr., driver of the car, and Thomas Meadows, another occupant, said a group of men stepped out onto the road and fired four or five shots at the automobile. One of the bullets struck the girl in the head. The youths took her back to a hospital at Jackson, where she died.

Daniels and Meadows, also students at the University, said they were on their way to Quicksands to get another girl and bring her back to a party at Jackson.

Sheriff Lee Combs said he expected to have those responsible in custody today. Bloodhounds were brought from Lexington to assist in the search. Bryan Burcham, 21, was arrested near the scene of the shooting and held in the Breathitt county jail for questioning but the sheriff said he did not believe Burcham had fired a shot.
