

Cougar Ball Team Pounds Out Victory Over Oregon Tossers 7 To 0

RABBIT'S FOOT IN IMPORTANT ROLE AS STATE GETS BLOWS

A lucky rabbit's foot, fondled at crucial moments by Buck Bailey, Cougar coach, started a six run batfist which defeated Oregon 7 to 0 and evened the series for Washington State Tuesday afternoon.

As the "lucky" seventh came around and Oregon tossers stood up and took a round for a rally, Buck came out of his dugout and burned incense on the altar of Goddess Fate. He went to the bat, crossed the bats "just so" and then pulled his rabbit's foot out of his pocket.

He marked his batters by crossing the lucky piece on their chests, kissing the bunny's toes, and rubbing the bat. When his players took the field after Oregon's 2 to 1 lead had been evened up, Buck "marked" his pitcher, Nelson, who let Oregon down with six hits in the game.

In the seventh, the rabbit foot still clicking, the Cougars recalled the bases three times and again crossed the plate twice in the fifth inning. Ken Seales, Webfoot pitcher, was a little wild in the early innings but managed to hold the Cougars down until the eighth.

Buck, his Cougars and his rabbit's foot will journey to Corvallis where they take the Beavers.

Bill Reinhart To Manage Eugene's Baseball Team

Billy Reinhart, University of Oregon baseball coach, will manage the Eugene baseball club again this season, Don Husband, business manager, announced Wednesday following a meeting of club officials.

The Webfoot coach has coached and managed the team for the past four years, winning at least one championship and placing high up the other years.

Under his guidance, the team is expected to be better than last year's. Reinhart is busy now with his University of Oregon tossers, who are making a bid for conference honors.

He will give as much of his time as possible to the Eugene team, and then in the summer will smash into it full time.

Couquille will come to Eugene Sunday, May 17, to open the home season for Eugene's independent club. The Bay team will bring along some fine players, some with a good reputation with the stick, and a tough reputation is expected.

The first practice for this game was to be held Wednesday evening at 5:30 o'clock on the University of Oregon freshman diamond.

The Eugene management is endeavoring to line up a good schedule. The plan is to bring some of the best ball clubs in the state to Eugene to perform. Games are being sought with Bend, Albany, Salem, some of the stronger Portland clubs, and the Longview, Washington, club may be brought here.

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Northern Division Golf Tourney To Start Here

The first annual northern conference golf championship tourney will be held on the Eugene Country club links Friday and Saturday. Teams representing Oregon, Oregon State, Washington, and Montana already have entered and Washington State is expected to send one or more players to compete for individual honors.

Each school will enter four men in the team championships, which will be 72 holes medal play. The team having the lowest score will represent the northern conference against the southern titlist. The golfer leading in medal play will represent the northwest in the individual play against the southern champion. These north-south play-offs will be held May 15 and 16 on the home links of the northern team chapter. The individual title will be settled at the same time, also on the links of the team sponsoring the tourney. If Washington should win the team championship and an Oregon man the individual title, the Oregonian would have to go to Seattle to defend his crown against the Southern titlist.

Next Thursday a four-man Oregon team will clash with a four-man

Washington team here. They will play under the Nassau system, counting one point for each nine holes and one for the match at the end of the 18 holes. In the afternoon the first and third men on each team will meet in the best ball foursome. These also will be played under the Nassau system.

The Oregon team will be led by George Will, captain in 1930, who at present is No. 1 man. Vincent Dols, captain, who won the coast conference individual championship last year, has dropped to position No. 2. Frank Shaffer is No. 3, and Harrison Kincaid, No. 4.

Oregon expects its chief competition from Washington. Last week the Webfoots played Oregon State, Oregon winning, 20 to 1. The Webfoots players made a remarkable score. Will shooting a 73, and Shaffer and Kincaid 74 each. Dols injured his hand and was unable to compete. Bob Adelsperger, who played No. 3, shot a 76, and Bob Hammond, No. 5, made a 75.

The Oregon team this year is without the services of its ex-captain, Don Moe. Although in school, Moe has foreseen golf until next season. Last year he left school in the spring semester to join the American Walker cup team. He is trying to catch up with his work so has forsaken golf. He has two more years of competition and should be an outstanding golfer on the Oregon teams of 1932 and 1933.
