

TEXAS GRAIN MEN OBJECT TO CUTS IN FREIGHT RATES

CHICAGO, May 7.—(AP)—Three federal judges sitting en banc late today granted 72 railroads a temporary order restraining for 60 days the application of reduced grain rates announced for June 1 by the interstate commerce commission.

CHICAGO, May 7.—(AP)—Texas grain shippers object to the reduced freight rates on grain promulgated by the interstate commerce commission for use on June 1. They believe the new schedule gives advantages to shippers of the Kansas City region, it was brought out today in a hearing in U. S. district court where the western railroads seek an injunction against the commission.

Frank A. Lettingwell of Dallas, representing the Terminal Grain company of Fort Worth, which has a separate suit pending against the commission, asked leave to consolidate that action with the railroads' suit.

He said the differentials between grain shipping rates in his territory and the Kansas City territory would give advantages to the latter which they did not enjoy. Judge Walter C. Lindley entered a judgment.

"Do you mean that Texas men want this injunction and Kansas City men do not?"

"Yes," replied Lettingwell.

Counsel for the government entered an objection to consolidation of the Texas case with that of the railroads, and argued that the terminal grain company had no right to file a separate suit, but should come into the railway injunction proceedings as an intervenor.

The court, three federal judges sitting en banc, reserved judgment on the Texas petition.

A request for a writ of habeas corpus was denied Ralph Merriam, attorney for the Kansas City board of trade. Merriam asked the recess in order to study the arguments advanced yesterday by Frederick Wood, counsel for the 72 railroads seeking to block the reduced grain rates.

united program with the oil and coal industries, as cited above.

3. A nation-wide program for construction, financing and ownership of homes.

4. Improvement of the export situation in the Pacific Northwest which brings 95 per cent of exportable lumber under control of four organizations.

5. Formation on the east coast of a number of sales agencies and organizations which tends to consolidate control for general benefit of the industry. There are now four great organizations, with others being formed.

Legislation Needed

With regard to the Russian lumber situation, Mr. Dixon is of the opinion that more legislation is needed to meet this competition, and cited the statement by Congressman Hawley here Wednesday regarding plans for introducing such legislation.

The Eugene man was on hand at the time the Russian shipment of lumber, sent as a supposed test on the steamer Auversole, was allowed to enter, and gave intimate details of that situation.

The vessel, he said, was dispatched from Leningrad on December 21, and was four months on the voyage. It was shipped from Leningrad, which is the south boundary of the area of convict labor against which the treasury department had set up a ban.

Views Lumber

The lumber was dry and had been in piles for a year at least. Mr. Dixon handled some of the lumber, and in view of logging conditions in Russia, is of the opinion that the logs were cut a year before the lumber was piled. All of this, he said, was long before there was any idea of making a "test" of this lumber, or before the latest moves toward prohibiting Russian lumber had been taken.

Just before shipment, Mr. Dixon learned a woman had been employed in stamping the lumber. She had stamped the names of four towns, all south of the sixtieth parallel. Fourteen days had been required to load the lumber on the ship, a job which would have been done in Portland in two days.

Two affidavits were submitted, one by the man in charge of the timber export for the Amtorg Trading company, and the other by the importers on regular United States treasury forms. In view of conditions, and the

possibilities for expansion," especially in cereal grain farming.

Russia Expanding

"Russia is eagerly utilizing the very latest of scientific knowledge to enlarge her agricultural possibilities," he said. "With feverish anxiety she is literally pouring millions into the expansion of her university research institutes, experimental stations and breeding farms. Her scientists are combing the earth for new crops and new methods."

As for farm tariffs, Russell said America had acted no differently than other countries, Germany having raised her duty on wheat over 230 per cent in the last sixteen months so that today it is \$1.62 a bushel, or nearly twice the world market price. He also recalled that the French duty had been increased by 400 per cent in less than four years.

"Under the guise of relief to agriculture, higher and higher tariff walls have been built," he said. "These tariff barriers, which have caused numerous reprisals on the part of other countries, making international exchange increasingly difficult."

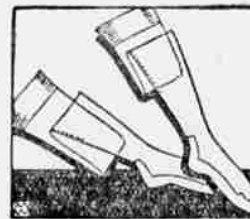
