

LEGION PREPARES TO BRING PASSION PLAY TO EUGENE

With a meeting of the Passion Play committee of the American Legion at the armory this week, plans for the presentation here of the great religious spectacle were definitely lined up. James C. Koopke, general chairman of the Legion group, will be in charge, and a number of legionnaires will soon be appointed on the sub-committees to start carrying out the work.

James H. Baker, legion commander, Van Straver, vice commander, and James H. Kink, post adjutant, are automatically members of the general committee, while Dr. G. F. Goldsager, Howard Freeland, Walter Banks, Arthur Moses and Charles Warnock are elected members. This committee will assist in the general work of preparations for the play.

The famous Freiburg Passion Play from Freiburg, Baden, Germany, will be presented for four days, June 28 to 30, inclusive, in Hayward field. Centuries of tradition and development are behind this great religious work, and forty players direct from Germany will present it. A Eugene chorus of 150 voices, and another 100 Eugene people who will appear in the mob scenes, will be used, but the play itself will be presented by the German actors.

The Passion Play is the culmination of years of preparation for the portrayal, with sincerity and reverence, of the greatest story ever told, the story of the sacrifice of the Saviour, Adolf Fasnacht, who plays the Christ, is steeped in the traditions of the Passion Play, for his fathers for five generations before him took the part of the Christ in the Freiburg spectacle.

EXPORT SALES OF LUMBER DECLINING

SEATTLE, May 8.—(AP)—A heavy decline in export sales of 222 mills reported to the West Coast Lumbermen's association for the week ending May 3, was announced today by the association, which attributed a decrease of about 15,700,000 feet under the previous week to the "generally depressed condition of world trade."

A total of 241 mills operated at 44.75 per cent of capacity as compared to 45.06 per cent of capacity the previous week and 69.57 per cent during the same week last year.

For the first 17 weeks of 1930 these mills have operated at 40.54 per cent of capacity as compared to 64.81 per cent for the same period in 1929.

During the past 22 weeks orders for 221 mills have averaged 11.75 per cent over production.

Quite a number of warrants called for redemption are still outstanding, says Mrs. Lundy, some of them having been called in November 23, 1929. One for \$401.35 called in last June is still outstanding, the interest having ceased at that time.

German Poultry in Increase Since War

WASHINGTON, — (AP)—Despite the usual destruction of farm crops and farm animals brought about by a great war, Germany now has more poultry—chickens, ducks and geese—than it had before the start of the World war, according to a census conducted last December and made public by the commerce department.

Steady increases are shown since 1925, resulting, at the end of last year, in 6,230,400 geese, 3,896,400 ducks, and 87,167,500 chickens. These figures represent a substantial gain over those obtained for 1913, when there were 5,850,800 geese, 2,089,300 ducks, and 63,070,900 chickens.

Imports of eggs into Germany increased materially until 1928, when a decline began, the commerce department announced. The 1930 imports were 219,048,830 dozen, about 20,000,000 dozen less than in 1928.

Mormon Shelves to Pretty Parish House

AUBURN, N. Y.—(AP)—Two marble shelves carved by Brigham Young, Mormon leader, will decorate a Presbyterian parish house.

The marble shelves are of marble, neatly chiseled. Together with timber from the house in which they were placed nearly a hundred years ago, they will become a part of the Second Presbyterian parish house, now under construction.

Brigham Young's birthplace was spent in Port Byron, in the heart of the Finger Lake region of New York.

March Storms Took Heavy Toll of Cattle

LINCOLN, Neb.—(AP)—March blizzards, which swept Nebraska and held the state in their icy grip for several days, took a toll of between 20,000 and 30,000 head of cattle, it was announced today by the agricultural department.

WOOD EXHIBITION REPORT IS MADE

After all expenses had been paid the second annual Lane county wood products show held at the Eugene armory April 23, 24 and 25 had a small balance on hand, according to a report on the finances and other details of the exhibition, made by H. J. Cox to the Eugene chamber of commerce. The balance on hand is \$27.25 after deducting the \$22.45 deficit of last year's exhibition.

Twenty-two lumber companies in Lane county contributed the sum of \$537.50. Mr. Cox's report shows, and expenditures were \$487.50. The expenditures include rental of the lumber, freight charges, publicity, labor, freight charges, cartage, labor and display cards for the exhibit, hire of a watchman, clerical work and incidentals.

There were 47 exhibitors at the show, the report states, and in addition to local newspaper publicity, articles and photographs describing the affair were sent to three lumber journals on the coast, one at St. Louis, Mo., and one at Chicago.

Advertising Bills Ordered Submitted

SALEM, May 8.—(AP)—Charles M. Thomas, public utilities commissioner, today ordered the Southern Pacific company, Oregon-Washington Railroad and Navigation company, Oregon Short Line Railroad company, Oregon Electric, the S. P. & S. railroad, the Great Northern and Northern Pacific Terminal company, all railroads operating within the state, to submit statements of money expended for advertising.

The commissioner requested this information be in his hands by June 10. Not only the amounts spent for advertising, but for what purpose and the necessity and reasons for it. The information is to be used in the commissioner's investigation of utility advertising.

Two Men Held in Confidence Game

OREGON CITY, May 8.—(AP)—Paul Tomich and Paul Bozone were under indictment of the county grand jury today, charged with running John Novak, mill worker, out of \$3000 in a confidence game. Police recovered the

money. The indictment was returned yesterday.

The two allegedly told Novak they were to distribute \$3000 to charity providing that in order to show good faith, he would show them that he had an equal amount of money. The hoary "box" trick then was called into play, and the two were declared to have attempted to escape with Novak's money as well as their own.

Expense of Bowles Murder Trial Told

HILLSBORO, Ore., May 8.—(AP)—A warrant from Multnomah county for \$5,064.95 covering expenses for the Bowles-Loucks murder trial, was received today by E. B. Sattington, Washington county recorder.

Nelson C. Bowles, Portland capitalist, and Miss Irma Loucks, his former secretary, were acquitted here of a charge of murdering Bowles' wife, who died from a knife wound.

Aircraft Repair Regulations Out

WASHINGTON, May 8.—(AP)—On the heels of an agreement for repair and upkeep of 35 Fokker ships, the commerce department today announced new regulations covering the repair of licensed aircraft.

The instructions will require a closer check on repair work, and closer scrutiny of the ability of operators of repair stations to do proper work.
