Obituary

Ford Parker
Ford Parker, life-long resident of Dexter, died Thursday afternoon at the Eugene hospital following a week's illness. He was 53 years of age and a brother of Ellis R. Parker, principal of the Geary school, Eugene.

Mr. Parker was born on the donation claim of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Parker, pioneers of '33, at Dexter and had lived there all his life. He was a farmer. He was born July 9, 1876. On Feb. 4, 1908, he married Ruth Gulley.

Survivors include the widow, one son, Eugene Parker, at home; two brothers, Ellis R. Parker of Eugene and Clem Parker, Cottage Grove; and two sisters, Mrs. Georgia Newcomb, Dexter, and Mrs. Cecilia Hansaker, San Francisco. Mr. Parker was a member of the Lovell lodge.

The funeral services are to be held Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock at the Walker-Poole chapel. Rev. Harry Benton officiating. Interment will be in the Pleasant Hill cemetery.

Thomas W. Munroe
Thomas W. Munroe, for 45 years a resident of Eugene and many years in the furniture and hardware business here, died at the Veterans' hospital in Portland Thursday at 8 p. m. He would have been 54 years old next November.

Mr. Munroe was born at Richmond, Wis., and came to Eugene with his

parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. George K. Munroe, in 1888. He had lived here ever since with the exception of the time spent in the Philippine Islands during the Spanish-American war and Filipino insurrection and a year at Grants Pass. He was educated in the local schools and previous to the beginning of the Spanish war he was employed in the pioneer grocery store of George T. Hall and son. After the war, during which he served as sergeant of Co. C, Second Oregon volunteers, he resumed his work in that store and was later employed in the S. H. Friendly store. Afterward he was in the furniture and hardware business for many years with his father and was seven years with the Applegate Furniture company, going to the Powers Furniture store when the two concerns were merged some time ago.

Mr. Munroe was a member of Helmet Lodge, No. 33, Knights of Pythias of this city, having served as keeper of records and seal of the lodge for 20 years or more. He was a member of General Lawton camp of the United War Veterans and of the Methodist church.

The widow, Mrs. Mary Owen Munroe, two sons, Owen and Kent Munroe, and a sister, Mrs. Myrtle Keeney, all of Eugene, survive. The funeral will be held at the Brametter chapel at 2:30 p. m. Saturday.
