

FREDERICK J. LIBBY TALKS ON PEACE AT LUNCHEON OF LIONS

Business interests of the United States will supersede those of politics and demand the entrance of the United States into the world court, Frederick J. Libby, executive secretary of the National Council For the Prevention of War, told members of the Lions club at their luncheon at the Eugene hotel Wednesday.

"Why not?" the speaker asked. "American business has 15 billion dollars invested in foreign countries. Business men will demand a right to sit in with other nations and determine the policy of countries where American capital is at stake."

World peace was given by the speaker as the answer to the unemployment situation. He said good business and consequent employment will come only when nations of the world have confidence in each other.

Libby said the action of the United States in the coming peace conference at Geneva will determine largely the affairs of the world for years to come. He said America must lead the way and swing to the side of peace.

He declared that Germany is trying to trick the nations of the world on trial at that meeting. In the Versailles treaty Germany agreed to disarm in order that other nations might disarm. Now the other nations are not yet disarmed and Germany feels she can wait no longer.

The speaker said France might offer the chief trouble in obtaining disarmament. England was declared to have the best organization in search of peace, the League of Nations Union.

J. J. Handsaker of Portland, introduced the speaker. He was introduced by Harry B. Johnson, president of the Lions club.

Rev. Clay Palmer of the local unit of the National Council For Prevention of War, announced that Mr. Libby was to speak at the Congregational church in the afternoon and will appear at the Methodist Episcopal church at 7:30 Wednesday evening.

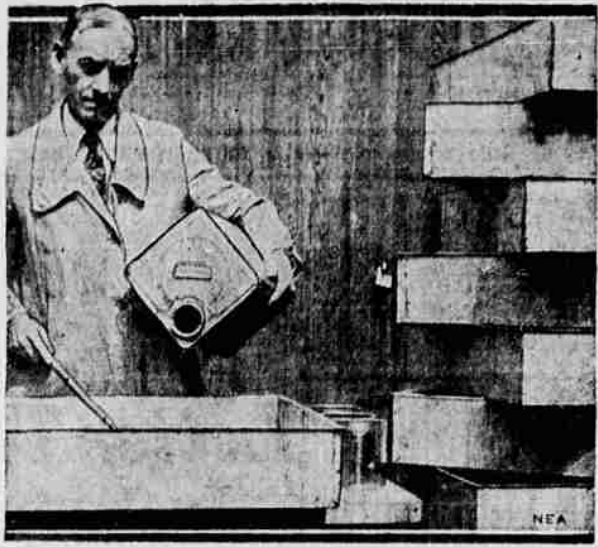

pleading for an adjustment on the basis of educational service. Pressed by Member Colt as to whether the state were not overserved by teacher training, the normal representatives declared it is not, claiming that the surplus of teachers is due mainly to the life certification of large numbers of people years ago who are not now considered properly qualified for service.

Kerr followed the normal presidents declaring that he had refrained from trying to suggest a plan for all the schools. Feeling that to do so would be presumptuous, he explained the principle of staff consultations and inquiries by which he had arrived at the cuts suggested, and said that even so he had lost four of his outstanding faculty members because of the uncertainty as to what might happen next.

On the basis of the voluntary offerings of the schools the total cuts in eight to date would not exceed \$600,000 leaving more than \$400,000 as the battle ground for future disputes.

President Hall was to make oral arguments late in the day. He said he had presented his plan for the system as a whole because in the present state of uncertainty it is almost impossible to discuss any school as a separate unit. He said that he had not presumed to say how much or where any school should make the savings suggested, that being a problem for each school board to determine.

"The problem before us," said Hall, "is whether we are going to get ac-

tion under the survey or whether we are going to ignore it entirely and believe the mandate of the law which created this board and the desires of the governor and the people require us to approach this problem courageously. The only way it can ever be solved is by functional readjustment as outlined in the survey."

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Senator Brookhart, republican, Iowa, said yesterday he had received many letters endorsing his recent proposal for a progressive candidate instead of Mr. Hoover. He said such letters had come from eastern as well as western states, and included in his list "every eastern state except New Jersey." He said he had received more from Ohio, Indiana and Illinois than from Iowa.

Senator LaFollette, republican, Wisconsin, criticized the president last night in a radio speech for refusing to permit use of federal funds to assist the 6,000,000 unemployed. He said its campaign to prevent revision, and also attacked the administration's farm relief program. The northwest, he said, "is just milling around like a herd of cattle," and he quoted a correspondent who said Minnesota was "anti-republican but not yet democratic."
