

Stanford Golf Stars Here To Meet Oregon Team For Pacific Coast Title

PORTLAND BOY AGE OF INVADING INDIAN MASHIE WIELDERS

Six Indian golf warriors of Stanford University, carrying brasses and moccasins instead of tomahawks, arrived in Eugene Wednesday to battle the University of Oregon team for the Pacific coast conference championship.

The Stanford team won the southern title last Friday and Saturday while the Oregon team was victorious in the northern playoff, which was held here. Although the conference rules call for a four-man team to represent each school, Stanford sends six men here, and it is likely that Oregon will play with a six-man team. It is proposed that four low scores should be counted in the team championships, but all of that will be worked out at a meeting of the Stanford coach and H. H. Robnett, the Oregon coach, tonight.

When the singles championship will be decided, two Oregon men will face each other, Malcolm MacNaughton of Portland, Ore., one of the Stanford team, who won the southern individual championship, and George Will, also of Portland, who won the northern crown, will tangle for the conference championship last year, will not defend his title, as he was eliminated in the northern tourney last week by his team-mate, Will.

Stanford has one of the greatest teams ever to represent a coast conference school. Besides MacNaughton, who is one of Oregon's great amateur golfers, all the other members of the Cardinal team have made a reputation in the golf world. Harry Eichenberger is the Southern California Golf association champion for 1934-35. Warner Edwards is the Santa Barbara county champion and also the champion of the La Cumbre Country club, Santa Barbara. Herman Hellman is champion of the Hollywood Country club of Los Angeles, while Stuart Hawley is junior champion of the Claremont Country club of Oakland.

Oregon is not without its champions. Vincent Dolp, who plays number 3 on the Oregon squad, was runner-up for the Oregon state title last year. Vincent has not yet hit his stride, but when he is on he should be a hard man to down. He ran a 68 in the field last year in the conference tourney. George Will, who plays number 1, is one of the most improved players on the coast. Only last week he shot a beautiful 68 in match play against Washington. Harry Kincaid, who plays number 2, and Frank Shaffer, who is number 4, are both experienced tournament players. Robnett will confer with Captain Dolp tonight in regard to selecting the number 5 and number 6 men.

The tournament will be held over the Eugene Country club course Friday and Saturday.

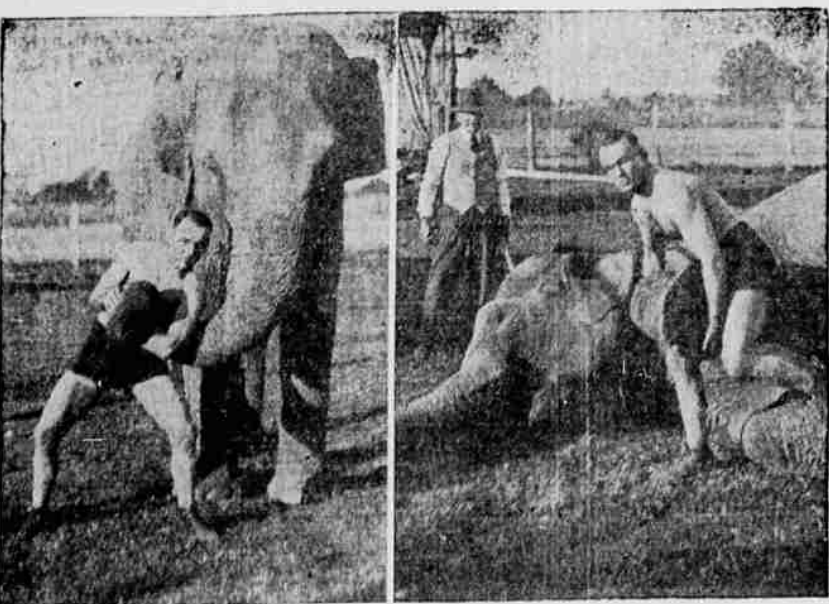
Eastern Candidates Picked To Win Big Kentucky Derby

LOUISVILLE, Ky., May 13.—(AP)—Eastern candidates remained heavy favorites today to capture the 57th annual running of the Kentucky derby by Saturday, despite the support which Pittsburgh, the west's leading entry, has won with his sensational workouts.

Pittsburgh, Theodore Mueller's hope to win the classic, stamped himself as the best of the western eligibles yesterday when he won the special derby trial race over a mile and one-sixteenth course. Spanish play was second, Sweep All third and Minor Lamplighter fourth. The Mongol and Prince D'Amour also ran. In view of the muddy condition of the track, Pittsburgh's time of 1:47.0 was considered good. However, horsemen predicted after the race that the western three-year-olds was not in the same class as any of the six eastern entries entered.

Athletics Due To Win If Old Bad Start Jinx Holds

If the 1934 baseball season follows the pattern set by two previous years, the Philadelphia Athletics are due to win their third straight American league pennant. Twice in succession the A's started badly and then breezed through to the championship. This year they were off to a bad start again.

In 1929, Philadelphia required five weeks to get into first place but never was ousted.

Last year, the A's dropped as low as fourth early in the season, climbed back to the top in May, dropped out again to regain the post on June 1 for all but two days of the remainder of the season. This season they have had plenty of troubles but finally are back in their accustomed place at the top of the standing.

Grove Holds 'Em
It took Bob Grove's pitching and all the slugging the A's are accustomed to give him to win first place, and some wet weather in St. Louis came as an added aid. While the New York Yankees were idle in St. Louis, Grove pitched a four hit game and Simmons, Sox and company, batted out a 5 to 2 victory over the Chicago White Sox to give the A's the lead by a few percentage points. Grove was a bit wobbly in the first half of the game, granting a pair of runs in the fourth when Carl Reynolds tripled but he breezed through the last four frames without giving a hit. Philadelphia scored early against Pat Caraway and

Simmons put in the finishing touch by hitting his fifth homer of the year in the ninth.

Pitchers Hot
Grove was not the only pitching hero of yesterday's games however, for every contest which escaped the weather brought forth a good mound performance. Vic Sorrell did the work in the second American league game, pitching Detroit to a 2 to 0 victory over the Boston Red Sox. Sorrell got into trouble several times but was able to pitch his way out. The Tigers made only six hits off the combined pitching of Jack Russell and Hod Lisenbeyer, but they put together a number of them in the fourth with Hayworth's double bringing in both runs.

Ed Brandt of the Boston Braves won his fifth straight victory by beating the Cincinnati Reds 4 to 2 in the first game of a double header, then Silas Johnson reversed the decision by a 3 to 2 count in a fine mound duel with Bruce Cunningham. Brandt's victory, gained through a three run rally in the first inning, was notable because it gave him one more game this year than he was able to win all last season. Cincinnati won the second game with the aid of a passing locomotive which sent forth a cloud of smoke to hide the ball from Berger's view. What looked like an easy fly was recorded as a double for Houch. Grove drove in two runs. Doubles by Hendrick and Heathcote in the eighth brought the deciding tally.

Three other National league games suffered the same fate as two in the American, giving way to cold and wet weather.

SALEM HIGH BEATS EUGENE NINE, 10-6

The Vikings of Salem high evened the count with Eugene high's baseball team Tuesday afternoon on the fairgrounds by taking the long end of a 10 to 6 encounter.

The Red and Black boys knocked Inman and McKittick off the mound by concentrating hits in two fatal innings, the third and eighth. The game was tied 3 to 3 in the fifth. Salem scored in the sixth on a number of times, but went the entire rout.

Salem scored in the first on a double, a sacrifice and an outfield fly. Eugene came back in its half to take the lead on a double by Teague and Bradway's homer, which traveled clear across the race track.

Salem scored another in the second and then opened the dynamite bag in the third, scoring three runs in that frame on a pair of doubles, a single and a walk. Eugene tied the count by scoring twice in the fourth and once in the fifth.

Then came the eighth, when the Vikings rapped out three hits and added by a walk scored four runs. Eugene came right back in the eighth inning after Salem's rally and filled the bags, but the heavy hitters were having trouble and only one run was chalked up.

50,000 Shivering Spectators See U. S. Boxers Beat French

CHICAGO, May 13.—(AP)—When 50,000 persons sit shivering and shuddering with cold to watch four hours of amateur boxing, they can't be wrong.

Last night at Soldier Field, on Chicago's lake front where a chilling breeze blew in from Lake Michigan, many spectators watched the Golden Gloves winners of New York and Chicago conquer five bouts to three, the prime pick of France's leather swingers. And not one of them left until 11 o'clock.

Stable 190 pounder, had beaten Yustin Sirutis, a New York university sophomore and Eastern Intercollegiate heavyweight champion, for France's third, and most stirring victory.

The crowd was the greatest that ever watched an amateur pugilistic event. No more suitable place could have been selected than the spot where three years ago Jack Dempsey and Gene Tunney attracted the greatest attendance ever to watch a fist show of any kind. At the ringside were Max Baer, heavyweight champion of the world, and W. L. (Young) Stribling, challenger, who will meet in Cleveland July 3. A few rows back sat Tony Canzone, light-weight champion.

The Americans were clearly superior in everything except courage. It was the gameness and sportsmanship of the Frenchmen that won the crowd. Not a backward step did a fighter take, unless it was because of a punch that drove him back. The French youths, however, by lack of experience, did not know the meaning of taking a count when knocked down. Whenever one of them hit the deck, and it occurred with regularity, he bounced to his feet swinging like a madman.

The ceremony at the opening of the spectacle was dramatic. The eight invading champions were escorted to the ring by a group of veterans of the French army. A similar escort of American veterans accompanied the defendants. The crowd stood as a band played La Marseillaise and a searchlight played on the triangle of France. Then the band played the

Thirteen four-man high school golf teams from practically all parts of the state were arriving in Eugene Wednesday to try to wrest the state golf championship from Eugene high school in the state golf tournament which starts Thursday on the Eugene Country club course.

CHRISTENSEN BOYS PLAN RODEO SUNDAY

Henry and Bobby Christensen, Eugene cow hands, are planning a rodeo at their ranch Sunday. The young Christensens, who have won a wide reputation for their exploits in riding bucking horses and bare-backed steers, are adding on to their rodeo corral and putting in a special chute for the calf roping and wild-cow milking contests.

The Christensen ranch is located about six miles from Eugene and is reached by taking the Alder street road past the riding academy and back of the Butte. The Christensens will have signs up along the road to point the way and expect to have the rodeo in good condition for the convenience of rodeo fans who drive out for the show.

Hutch's Bike club is planning to attend the rodeo en masse. The club members will meet at the bike shop Sunday morning and ride out together, and several members of the club plan to enter the steer riding contest. Eugene is developing quite a number of bareback riders, some of them barely along in their teens, and these youngsters will get a chance to work out at the rodeo Sunday.

A number of University of Oregon riders have signified their intentions of being present and taking part in the festivities, according to Henry Christensen. He says that all will be welcome and that they will round up fifty head or so of steers to ride in addition to some good bucking horses. Quite a number of bronco-busters from about the county will be present.

The rodeo will be held in the bucking corral built last year on the ranch. Chutes for the steers have been built and the new calf chute was built this week. The ground in the bucking pen has been worked over and will be the best possible shape, young Christensen says.

WILLAMETTE WINS WEST HALF TITLE

SALEM, Ore., May 13.—(AP)—Andy Peterson, Willamette university pitcher, allowed Pacific university three hits and one run while his teammates pitched up 20 tallies here yesterday, thereby clinching the western division championship of the northwest conference.

Before each bout, the French champion walked across the ring to present to his American opponent the medal won in gaining the title of his class in France. Victories by either side were cheered impartially.

The United States won the first three fights, Lea Rodak of Chicago, was too strong for Andre Pierre of France in the 112 pound class, Henri Brugere was unable to cope with the two-fisted attack of Nick Scialaba, Golden Gloves bantamweight champion. Gabriel Lerat made a gallant stand against Don Gonzales of Cleveland, but the decision went against him.

Marcel Essault, a sturdy, blond-haired Frenchman, scored France's first victory when he outlugged Scotty Sylvano of Chicago, in the 135 pound battle. Phil Dardell of New York was too clever for Jacques Le Lahayes in the welterweight division, but Jean Zigant gave France another triumph by defeating Fred Casserio of Chicago, captain of the American team, in the 150 pound class.

Jack Kraus, of Gary, Ind., easily defeated Alexandre Elias, the French captain, but Fernand Landrin, the French heavyweight, bested the most sensational performance of the program to defeat Sirutis. Outweighed 50 pounds, and a foot shorter than his American adversary, Landrin countered himself somewhat like Johnny Risks, firing punches from every where, to gain the decision.
