LOCAL LODGE WILL BE ACTIVE DURING STATE CONVENTION

Eugene will take a prominent part in the annual state convention of the O. O. F., which opens in Corvallis Sunday. There will be 5000 persons at the convention, headquarters to be at the Hotel Corvallis.

The state grand master, Dr. L. L. Bales, and some of the official delegates from the local branches of the order will go to Eugene, while the Eugene I. O. O. F. band and the ladies' orchestra of the Eugene Rebekah lodge will take part in the program.

The grand lodge sessions begin Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock at the Corvallis hotel with the annual church service and for the evening at the first Methodist Episcopal church, Rev. James E. Milligan giving the sermon. It will be a full dress occasion for the Canton and auxiliary. At 9 o'clock Monday morning the department council will open meetings. Monday will be given over to the Canton and auxiliary sessions. Tuesday is the grand encampment and Rebekahs will be in the parade to the grand lodge proper. On Wednesday afternoon the grand lodge sessions will be dispensed with in the month of the parade to be held at 1:30 o'clock. The drill competitions will be held on the lower campus of Oregon State college, Eugene Rebekah lodge, No. 33 and Canton Hovey, No. 4, entering. The local Rebekah orchestra is to play at the reception on Wednesday evening.

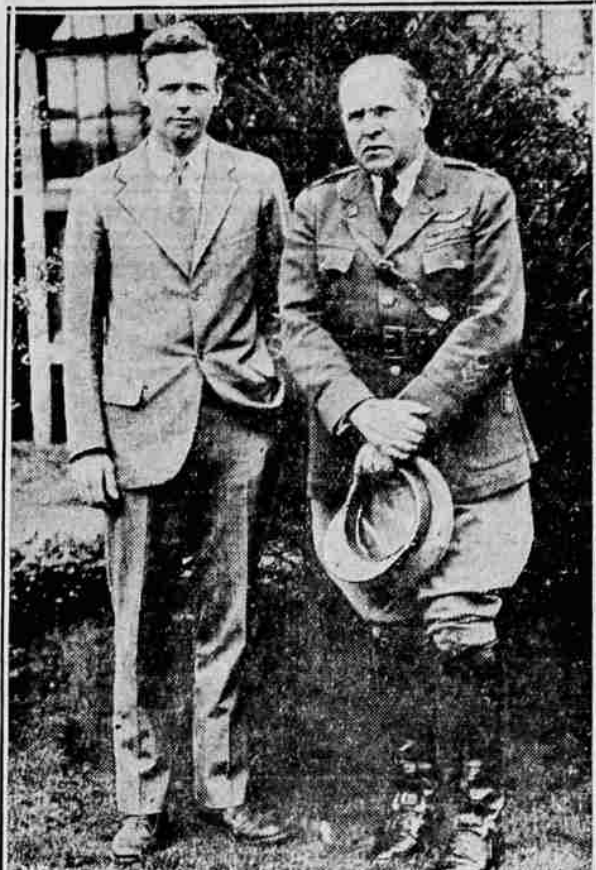

Homemakers Request Additional Instruction

Additional training in child development and parent education, food and nutrition, home management, clothing design and selection, recreation and dramatics, organization and administration, and landscape gardening are included in the proposed plan for home economics development in Lane county this year as worked out by a group of more than 100 homemakers at the first annual county-wide homemakers program planning day held in Eugene yesterday.

Cooperating with the homemakers in formulating this program were Miss Gertrude Skow, Lane county home demonstration agent; Miss Charbel Nye, state leader of home economics extension, Oregon State college; Miss Lucy Case, specialist in foods and nutrition; Mrs. Zelta Rodewold, home management specialist; Mrs. Marriet Sinnard, specialist in clothing and textiles; and Mrs. Sara Prentiss, professor of child development. The final program for the county will be drawn up at a meeting of the county home economics project committee to be held in the near future, according to Mrs. Ralph Laide of Corvallis, general chairman of the conference.

Delegates to the conference were local project leaders, representing 19 different communities of the county. Groups interested in each division of the home economics program met separately with a member of the county committee and the extension specialist concerned, to draw up the plans for that type of work. This was followed by a general meeting at which time each group submitted its recommendations to the entire conference for adoption.

Additional recommendations of the child development and parent education group were continuation of radio talks on this subject over KOAC, continuation of the radio club, the formation of study groups aside from the radio clubs, the extension of radio programs to include evening lectures at which father's might listen in, and the holding of school for parents. Mrs. Victor Bailey of Route 1, Eugene, was in charge of this group.

Additional work on planning of economic and well-balanced meals, greater emphasis on the home garden program, more weight-control work, supervised luncheon periods for school children, with hot lunches wherever possible, and more instruction on intelligent purchasing of foods were among the recommendations made by the foods and nutrition group, under the leadership of Mrs. F. B. Harlow, Route 2, Eugene.

MATHEMATICS CLUB AWARDED CHAPTER IN NATIONAL GROUP

A chapter of Pi Mu Epsilon, national honorary fraternity for mathematicians, granted to the Mathematics club of the University of Oregon, was announced here today by Professor E. E. DeCou, head of the mathematics department, and Miss Mildred Wharton, Portland, president of the club. Word of the granting of the chapter, by unanimous action, was received from Professor Louis Ingham, University of Missouri, director-general of the fraternity.

Pi Mu Epsilon, which was founded at Syracuse university in 1914, and with the University of Oregon now has 18 chapters located in the leading institutions of the United States. Other western chapters are at the University of California at Berkeley and the University of California at Los Angeles.

The University Mathematics club was founded here in 1916 and has always been one of the most active campus organizations. Its only qualification for a chapter is a high standard of scholarship and a high standard of mathematics, and a high standard of scholarship has always been its aim.

COUNTY ALFALFA TOUR PLANS ARE MADE BY AGENT

Plans for the alfalfa tour and meeting to be held in Lane county Thursday and Friday of this week have been completed by O. S. Fletcher, county agricultural agent.

On Thursday, May 21, at 9:30 a. m. those interested will assemble at George Gilmore's dairy farm on the east side Pacific highway a mile and a half north of Junction City and that afternoon at 1:30 o'clock at Elmer Harlow's farm a mile and a half north of Eugene near the Colburg road.

On Friday, May 22, they will meet at Clyde Wright's farm three miles south of Corvallis and at 1:30 p. m. at Walter Garretts place, three miles south of Cottage Grove in the Coast Fork community.

These four farms are starting places for short tours to other farms in these communities and the full itinerary will be announced later by Mr. Fletcher. Three or four other places out from each of the farms designated will be visited, he said.

The idea of the tour is not so much as giving information regarding the planting of the crops as data on when to cut it for hay and methods of handling for curing, maintaining the stand and cultivating the established stand, said Mr. Fletcher. Different types of soils will also be studied and as some of the farmers will not start planting until after the tour, problems of starting the crop will be discussed.

E. R. Jackman, extension agronomist at the state college, will assist County Agent Fletcher on the tour and at the meetings.

Mr. Fletcher said Saturday that 340 acres of Lane county have planted alfalfa during the past two years and that there is over 2000 acres of it growing in the county at the present time.

EIGHTH GRADES WILL GET FREE BOOKS NEXT YEAR

When the Eugene schools next fall the school district will be able to furnish all the text books for the eighth grades, according to H. R. Gould, city superintendent.

On April 20 the superintendent wrote to all patrons of the city schools regarding the new free text book plan. The plan is to furnish all the text books for the eighth grades in order to make the response has been very prompt. Mr. Gould said, and with the plan is \$1.50 per pupil, said that there are enough books to supply all pupils with a complete set of books without cost to the parents.

In a letter to be sent out to the patrons Monday the city superintendent says that he anticipates that the adoption of the plan will mean many more books will be used than at first indicated and asks complete co-operation in the arrangement.

The plan of furnishing books to pupils does not apply to school supplies or work books in same grade. Mr. Gould wrote out.

Archibald arithmetic, Beggs English lower book, Oral and Written English upper book, Junior High School Literature, First Course in New Mathematics, Second Course in New Mathematics, Gordy's History of the United States, Oregon History, Brigham-McFarlane geography, Gail speller, Music hour, Junior High school music book, Progressive math book; Other books, such as histories, geographies, etc., which can be used on reading tables and reference shelves.
