

STATE SETS LANE'S MARKET ROAD QUOTA \$74,637 FOR YEAR

Notice that \$74,637.84 has been appropriated for market roads in Lane county was received by the county court Monday from the state highway commission. Lane county's fund from this source is the largest in the state outside of Multnomah county.

To the appropriation from state taxes the county has \$25,899 to be used for market road purposes, making a total of some \$100,000 for this work under the current budget arrangement.

The first half appropriation from state taxes amounts to \$37,318.92. Market road money has been budgeted as follows:

- Maintenance, \$25,000; bridges, \$30,000; emergency, \$10,800; Alvord west, \$5000; Canby, \$12,000; Walker west, \$8000; Cottage Grove west, \$4000; Westfir, \$8000; Loran south, \$8000; Vaughn-Nott, \$4000; Briggs Hill, \$5000; Cantrell lane, \$5000; North Fork, \$10,000; Globe west, \$10,000; Wolf creek, \$5000.

Most of these projects are already under way.

Other counties which received large shares of the state market road fund are Multnomah, Clackamas and Marion. Marion has some \$74,000 appropriated, and Clackamas, \$71,000. Multnomah's total was well over \$100,000.

\$200 Fine Paid For W. E. McCracken

W. E. McCracken was fined \$200 by Police Judge R. S. Bryson Monday when he pleaded guilty to the charge of driving a car while intoxicated.

Monday and went right to work on his state police program with Governor Julius L. Meier.

BUTLER ARRIVES

PORTLAND, Ore., May 18.—(AP)—Major-General Stanley Darlington Butler, "old gimlet eyes" of the marine corps, "landed" in Portland today, a broad grin on his face, and a promise on his lips that "I will not swear while I am in Oregon."

The marine general will be here nine or ten days at the invitation of Governor Julius L. Meier who has asked him to assist in the organization of the state constabulary authorized by the last legislature. The consolidated police bill was urged as an economy measure.

Greeting Warm

"Damned glad to meet you, general," said Stanhope Pier, acting mayor of Portland as the giant marine swung down from the train coach. General Butler broke into laughter. "You know," he said, "I promised not to swear while in Oregon."

Acting Mayor Pier was the first to greet the general. George Joseph, representative of Governor Meier, was the second.

Major-General Charles H. Martin, Oregon congressman from the third district, was next to greet him. The two carried arms together in the boxer rebellion of 1900.

"Well, general, I haven't seen you since the battle of Newmarket," the congressman said.

"That's right," Butler replied, "and how are you?"

Butler Is Aide

Major Butler of the Oregon National Guard, detailed as aide for the general during his stay in Oregon, paid his respects to the marine, and then two small girls presented Butler with a bouquet of Oregon roses and a toy horse.

"Fine, fine," Butler shouted. "All marines like to ride horses."

Immediately upon reaching the city General Butler got down to business. After a stop of only a few minutes at a hotel here, he went up the Columbia river highway to Menasha, the home of Governor Meier, where he began the task of putting together the

pieces needed to make up a constabulary.

The car in which the general was being taken from the Union station to the hotel narrowly averted being side-swiped by another machine. In the general's car was Pier, Major Dutton and Leon V. Jenkins, Portland police chief.

Disapproves Plan

Later at the hotel the general expressed his disapproval of "police-men dashing through crowded streets with sirens blowing" as an escort for some visiting celebrity.

"I don't think that's a good idea," he said. "I never permitted it when I was chief of Philadelphia. It is not fair to the people of the city to make them stand on the curb while some prominent person files by under an escort of police, all blowing their sirens."

Likes Oregon Men

General Butler spoke highly of his two marine aides, Captain Johnny Heckett and Captain Elmer Hall, both of whom are graduates of Oregon football stars. Heckett is stationed in China, and Hall is at Quantico.

"I always keep one of them around," the general said, "they never get away together. I talk myself into a jam and they get me out of it."

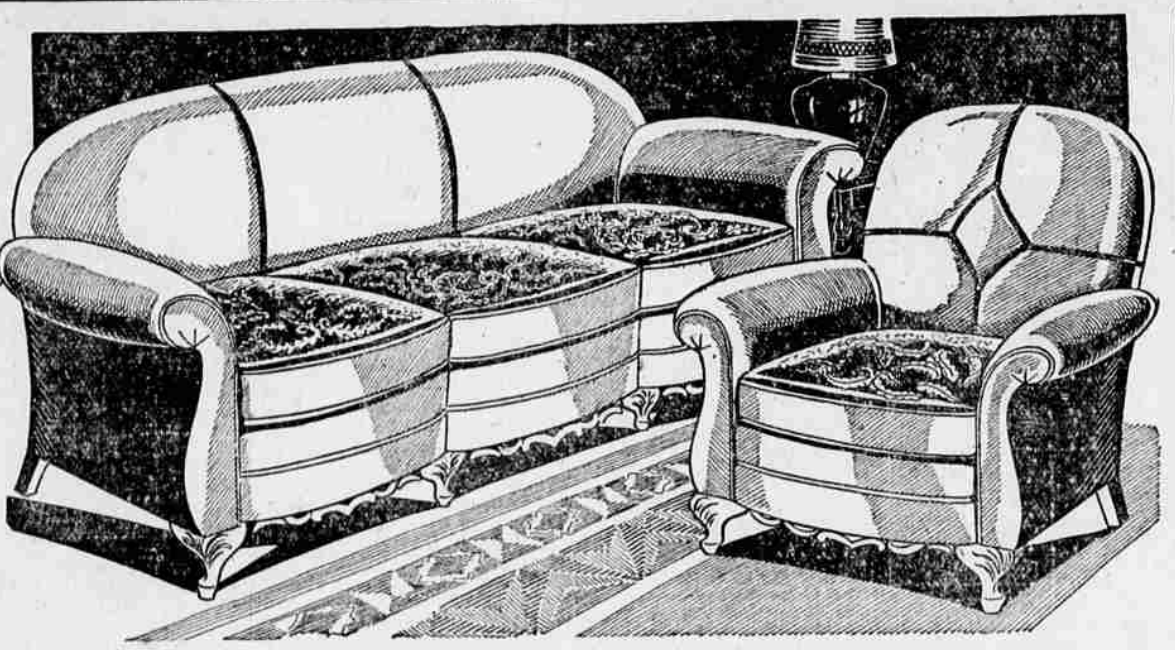
