

EUGENE GROUPS WIN HONORS AT I. O. O. F. MEET

Eugene made an excellent showing at the grand lodge of Odd Fellows and Rebekahs at Corvallis this week, according to local members of the two groups who have returned from the meetings.

Dr. L. L. Baker, of Eugene, grand master for the past year, was still at the sessions Thursday afternoon but a majority of the Eugene delegation have returned home. Dr. Baker received many compliments at the grand lodge session upon the efficiency of his administration during the past year. He will be succeeded by Homer D. Anzell, of Portland, who is a former football player of the University of Oregon and is now a practicing attorney in Portland.

The Eugene Rebekah lodge won the cup for having the best drill team at the grand lodge sessions and Canton Hovey, also of this city, won a cup for sending the best drilled team in that branch of the order. Mrs. Willis Wray is captain of the Rebekah team and Otto Nelson directs the canton group. The cup for the largest number of members present was given to Pendleton whose team put on the work of the order perfectly. It was reported that Huntington was the winner for having sent a delegation the greatest distance and a group of Corvallis Rebekahs was given the honors for having the largest representation in the parade.

The hospitality of the citizens of Corvallis and of the college authorities was notable, according to local members attending the sessions. The college ends took part in the parade and the visitors were escorted through the college buildings and shown over the campus.

BIG TIMBER TRACT BOUGHT BY COMPANY

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., May 21.—Purchase of 300,000,000 feet of pine timber from the Pickering Lumber Co. of Kansas City by the Shaw-Bertram Lumber Co., of Klamath Falls, was announced today by J. R. Shaw, president.

The timber is on what is known as the Tionesta tract, comprising about 24,000 acres about 50 miles southeast of Klamath Falls and adjacent to the Southern Pacific and Great Northern railroads.

It was announced that logging will be started this year and part of the timber will be milled at the Shaw-Bertram mill here.

W. R. Fickering, former president of the Pickering Lumber Co., died about a year ago and his death interrupted plans for operation of a large mill he constructed at Alturas, Cal.

NEW TIMBER ASSURED
KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., May 21.—(AP)—A successful program of reforestation which will insure a new crop of pine timber in 40 years—ten years before the present crop will have been cut—was announced here by R. R. McCartney, general manager of the Weyerhaeuser Timber company, here.

The experiment, he said, had been carried on for a number of years. It involves selected cutting, leaving of seed trees, and fire protection measures. Public aid in taxation, fire prevention, and other matters, will be necessary, however, he said.

French Honor General Dunlap For Heroism

TOURS, France, May 21.—(AP)—In the presence of three French generals, the body of General Robert W. Dunlap, U. S. M. C., who died attempting to save a French woman from a landslide, was removed from the mortuary chapel today and placed in a hearse for transportation to Paris.

As the flag-covered coffin was borne across the street, General Goubeau, commander of the ninth army corps, and Generals Loiseau and Mauren of the artillery corps, stood at attention, surrounded by their staffs. The prefect of Tours, Marcel Gregoire, supervised the arrangements.

A crowd of people who had come to show their respect for the American's heroism stood by the roadside, men and women crossing themselves meanwhile. Commander Calvin Cobb, of the American embassy, accompanied the body on the journey to Paris. Mme. Denis Briant, who was taken alive out of the wreckage from which the general's body was recovered, underwent a second operation at the hospital here today and her condition was reported extremely grave. Her leg was so badly crushed that part of it was amputated immediately after she was rescued.

WESTERN LANE ROAD PROGRESS REPORTED

Progress on roads in western Lane county was reported Thursday by County Commissioner Clinton Hurd following a trip into that area.

Hurd made a trip up Indian creek to the county quarry there, which is soon to be opened up to provide rock for the Indian creek road. This connects with the Ten Mile road which the forest service is pushing toward the coast.

Progress was observed on the Deadwood creek project, where a crew is widening the road. Work is also being pushed rapidly on the Canary market road, which connects Canary with the coast highway.

Oregon Strawberry Market Stronger

PORTLAND, May 21.—(AP)—In commenting on the Oregon strawberry crop and the bartering situation, the Journal said today "all offers to sell are reported withdrawn by distributors of strawberries."

Further, the article said "the barreled strawberry market is gaining strength generally but as local offers have been withdrawn, no quotations are now available here."

"Barreling has just started here and is expected to become general within a week."

A complete list of officers was not available but others chosen at the meeting were H. A. Tromp, John Beardsley and John Marsh, members of the council; F. C. Walters, junior vice-commander; Dr. W. E. Buchanan, guard; and W. Rivers, assistant guard.

Delegations from the Salem groups of the Sons and Daughters of the Union Veterans were present and E. W. Madison, division commander, of Grants Pass, had charge of organizing the camp. Included among the women visitors from Salem were Mrs. Madeline Neab, department president of the Daughters, and Mrs. Louise Horning, department secretary. Comrade W. H. Dryden was the only G. A. R. member present and he addressed the meeting.

The members of the camp have already made arrangements to participate in the Memorial day exercises here next Saturday and will march in the parade on the streets prior to the services at the graves.

The Sons of Veterans are the right hand support of the Grand Army of the Republic, while that organization remains in existence, it is pointed out by the organizers, and when the last of the group is gone it will fall to this organization to perpetuate the memory of their fathers in the minds of the younger generation and to see that Memorial day exercises are properly carried out and that the day is not commercialized but observed with reverence. It will be their duty to see that all graves of Civil war veterans are properly marked and that a flag is placed upon each for a Memorial day decoration.

This organization will sponsor patriotic programs from time to time and co-operate with other organizations of the city in promoting a keener patriotic spirit.
