

'JAKE THE BARBER' CALLED TO EXPLAIN INCOME TAX DUES

CHICAGO, May 21.—(AP)—While awaiting a decision as to whether he shall be extradited to England on charges of swindling, John "Jake the Barber" Factor was called today by the American government to explain why he had paid no income tax on at least \$500,000 it was said he had made on the stock market.

Factor was neither denied bail nor admitted to bail after he surrendered yesterday and ended the long chase which he had led detectives back and forth between England and America. His fingerprints were taken—for the first time in his life, he said—but he was not sent to jail. A deputy United States marshal "guarded" him last night at an expensive hotel, but interfered in no way with his freedom.

Factor was ordered to appear today before A. P. Madden, chief of the intelligence unit of the department of internal revenue, to discuss the income tax matter.

The man who quit cutting hair here at 15c a head to gain an international reputation as a dealer in millions, said that "practically all" the things printed about him were untrue. He admitted he won \$650,000 playing Chemin de Fer in Europe, and that he once played with the Prince of Wales, but denied cheating the Prince.

He also denied knowing Scarface Al Capone or Jack "Legs" Diamond and scoffed at the idea that he and Diamond ever had "tried to kill each other."

Charges that Factor swindled middle-class Englishers out of more than \$2,000,000 through sales of fake oil and mining stocks were said by him to be an attempt "to make a collecting agency of the American government."

State Department Not to Cut Wages
SALEM, May 21.—(AP)—Secretary of State Hal E. Hoss, announced today the state department did not contemplate the reduction of the wage scale of its employees. He made this announcement following the action of the state industrial accident commission yesterday in which the wage scale was cut on an average of ten per cent. Rumors had been circulated that other departments contemplated such action.

Hoss stated the salary and wage scale in the state department was as low as possible now, and that he could not reduce wages further. No other departments have announced any wage reductions or plans to that effect.

NEWSPAPER MAN DECLARES SLUMP BENEFIT TO U. S.

PARIS, May 21.—(AP)—In a realistic interpretation of the American economic depression Roy W. Howard, chairman of the board of the Scripps-Howard newspapers, told 300 businessmen at an American club luncheon today that the current slump has benefited the United States, that reconditioning of sound business is going on, and that Americans have not yet added a "yellow stripe" to their national emblem.

He predicted radical changes in the business and economic structure which will give Americans a quality standard of life not approached by any other nation.

"Five years hence," he said, "many businesses will be in infinitely better shape by reason of 1935. A lot of economic fire-traps have been swept away and quite a number of our economic slumps have been cleaned out."

"Much of the slump in business has naturally been due to the fear of much more difficulty, due to five or six million unemployed working men. Two tenths to the siren songs of each new installment salesman and using dollar bills for income to burn before the gods of pleasure."

"Now he is worshipping before the shrine of the savings bank. This thrift is a fear-induced requirement. Banish this fear and the buying will start."

"The money is there. When the money starts to come forth the whole aspect of the American situation is going to change."

Portland Council Opposes Walkathon
PORTLAND, Ore., May 21.—(AP)—Even though the much-discussed and cussed walkathon continued on its 13th week outside Portland today the

city council here decided that it would not allow a similar show. The council refused a permit to Antonio Neppach, owner of the lee coliseum, to hold a walkathon. Neppach answered critics, who said such contests cater to "persons of low-brow tastes" by declaring that "people want thrills." He said many women who smoke objected to women contestants smoking at the walkathon outside the city limits.

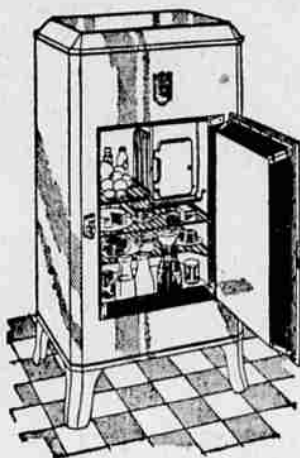
GEORGE M. MILLER TO ATTEND REUNION

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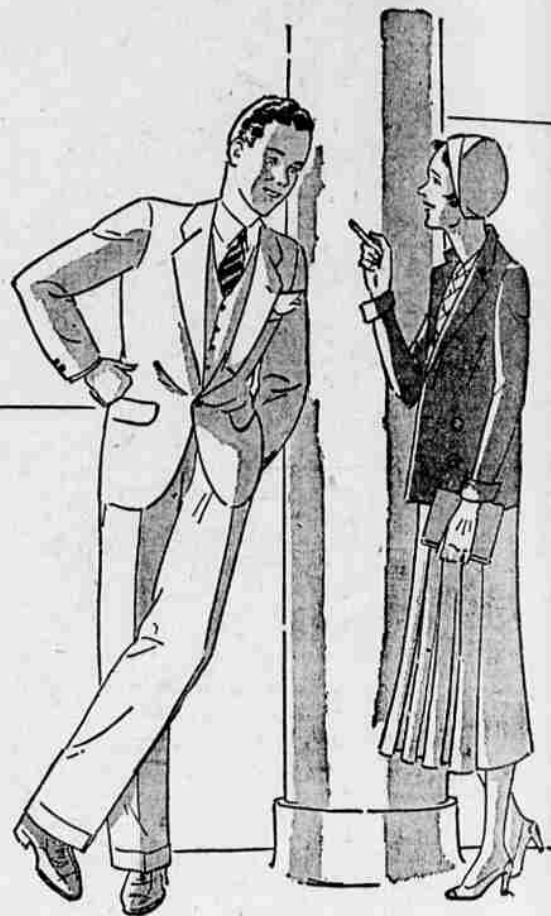

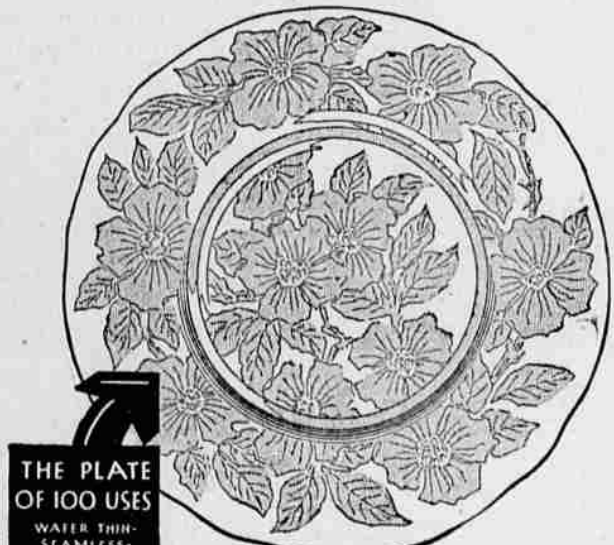
