

### CANARY MAN SAYS SQUIRREL POISON KILLS GAME BIRDS

W. H. Scott, rodent control supervisor of the Canby district, has raised the question of whether the spreading of poison bait does not harm game birds as well as get the rodent pests.

He states: "I think this district was 100 per cent poisoned for squirrels. I think I got some squirrels as we lost our bait a few days after. She looked like she had eaten a poison squirrel."

S. B. Holesapple reported that a few years ago they were not all experienced in the use of poison barley and they lost several sheep, all their chickens and one part of their ducks.

"Fred Kuesper reports that before he put out poison a flock of two quails lived near him but since that time he hasn't seen any quail or pheasants around. I used to have quails around here, too, but haven't seen any since April 2 (the poison was put out). Nor have I heard any pheasants drumming and I only heard one crow this year. It looks to me like if we keep putting out poison we exterminate the game birds as well as the squirrels and the law says we must poison one and not the other. We can't break both laws and wish to be law-abiding citizens. Will someone please tell me what to do?"

O. S. Fletcher, county agricultural agent, said Thursday that poison barley does not kill quails and pheasants.

"The California state game commission has given poison barley a clear bill of health," he said, stating that it will not kill pheasants which eat it and that quails will not touch it. The percentage of quail which might eat a barley grain is small. Of course if people put out wheat or other grain the quail will eat it. That is why barley is used. It is granted that does and cats which devour quails will die. But the California game commission tells us the use of poison barley is safe as far as game is concerned."

### \$3,000 DAMAGES ALLOWED BY JURY

OREGON CITY, May 21.—A verdict of \$3000 against Rev. A. E. Danley of Eugene was returned in circuit court here yesterday in favor of James Wagner of Canemah. The suit grew out of the death of Wagner's father, Rudolph Wagner, 63, who was struck by an automobile south of here last November.

Wagner had asked damages of \$10,000.

Kenneth Israelson and George Israelson, Portland warehouse operators, were named as co-defendants but the jury found in their favor.

Wagner contended the car driven by Danley forced the Israelson truck off the highway, striking his father who was walking along the edge of the road.

Rev. A. E. Danley is not known here.

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### CHERRY FLY TO BE FOUGHT HERE

The Lane County Horticultural society, in cooperation with the office of O. S. Fletcher, county agricultural agent, is arranging for a meeting to be held at the Eugene chamber of commerce rooms Tuesday, May 22, at 1:30 p. m. to discuss cherry fruit fly control.

S. C. Jones, assistant entomologist, and O. T. McWhorter, extension horticulturist at the state college, will be the principal speakers. It is announced.

Plans for the 1934 campaign against the cherry fruit fly will be laid at that time. This is the part of the regular work planned for the horticultural society for the year and it is hoped that there will be a large attendance. Mr. Fletcher said, as the question of combating cherry fly is a very important one in the state's fruit industry.

The collectors will tell the Lane growers at this meeting what is being done in other fruit areas in the way of fighting the pest.

### NEW ROAD SIGNS WILL BE PLACED

A new log of the roads of Lane county is being made by the Oregon State Motor association for the purpose of erecting new road signs. It was announced Thursday at the office of the association in Eugene. C. E. Hoaney has charge of the work and announces that it will be completed within the next two months.

The state motor group placed road signs at all important intersections in Lane county five years ago but the signs have become weather worn and some are down, necessitating their replacement with new ones.

This road program is carried on continuously by the Oregon State Motor association throughout the state and every county has these guide boards. Mr. Hoaney has just completed signing the roads in Klamath county.

### New Swim Tank Will Be Built

A swimming tank for small children will be built at once at the Anchorage resort on the mill race opposite Willard hall at the university. It was announced Thursday with the taking out of a permit at the office of the city building inspector, by D. T. Bayly.

The tank will be of concrete, 20 by 20 feet in dimensions, and shallow enough so that the children may play in it even if they are unable to swim. The permit calls for the expenditure of \$300.

at once and cause the court to pass on the wording of the title, after which no further appeal would be possible by those opposing the referendum.

It was explained that unless such a step was taken advocates of the consolidated police bill could take an appeal within 20 days and if the ballot title were even slightly changed the petitions would have been voided and whatever signatures obtained would be thrown out.

Averill said ranks of organized labor are supporting the referendum "warmly." Labor believes, he said, the state police might be invoked at some time to intimidate striking laborers.

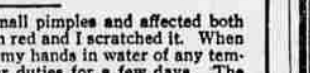
