

'Y' CAMP PLANS ARE BEING MADE FOR THIS SEASON

Extensive plans are being made for the annual Eugene Y. M. C. A. camp on Brice creek 30 miles above Cottage Grove and it is proposed to make the tract a permanent site for the camp, according to announcement at the Y building.

The members of the camp committee made an inspection of the site this week and decided to immediately install a water system and tentative plans were made for a new swimming tank. It is proposed to build the tank of Douglas fir lumber, but this has not yet been definitely decided upon, it is announced.

The camp will be held in two periods this year, the first beginning June 28 and ending July 12, while the second will begin on the latter date and end July 26. The cost will be \$12 for one period, it is announced. It is also planned to allow any boy who cannot be away from home during the full period to go for a week and in that time he will receive as much instruction and camp recreation in a week as the others do in the two weeks.

The first 50 boys to sign up for the camp will each be given a red felt hat, it is announced. Mrs. Dyer, who was cook last year, has been re-engaged and the boys who have heard of the announcement are very much elated. It was reported by Bill Kidwell, boys' secretary at the Y. The camp is located 50 miles from Eugene at a beautiful spot on Brice creek, near where it flows into Row river. It is in the Umpqua national forest and the forest officials are co-operating in every way possible to make the boys' outing a success.

Any boy in Eugene, from 9 to 18 years of age, whether he is a member of the Y. M. C. A. or not, is eligible to attend camp. Mr. Kidwell will be present at all times as camp director at the Y. Koshier, desk secretary at the Y, will be there during the last period as hike director.

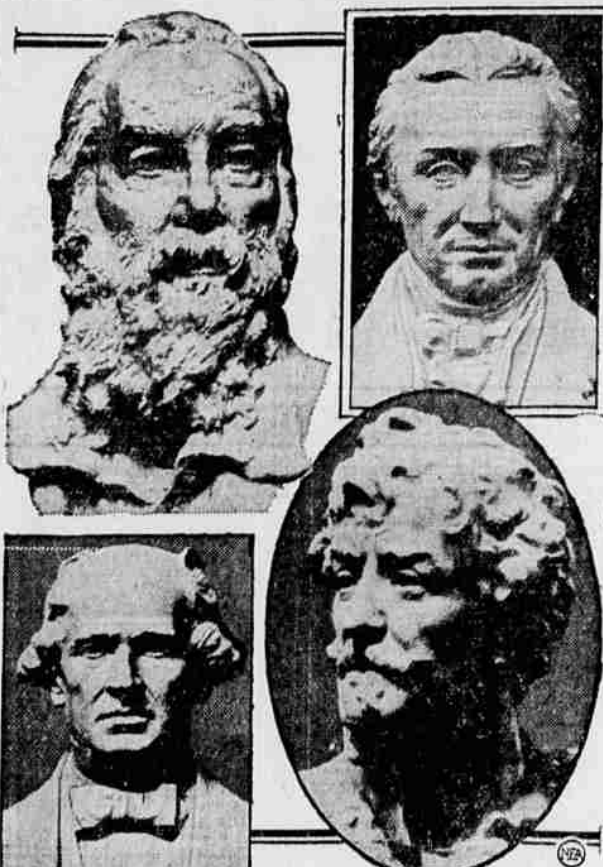
RANCH CHANGES HANDS
