

SPRINGFIELD ROSE SHOW IS TUESDAY; PARADE PLANNED

SPRINGFIELD, May 23.—(Special)—Roses in groups of three and six, in baskets, arranged with other flowers, and in single blooms will be entered at the annual rose show to be held in the community hall next Tuesday. Wild flowers may also be entered, according to the committee of the Civic club, which is sponsoring the show.

This is the 11th annual rose show to be given by the Civic club. Doors will be open at 8 o'clock for entries. From 12 until 1 the doors will be closed and entries judged. The hall will again be open from 1 until 4 p. m. for visitors.

Awards for first, second, and third finest displays in each group will be made.

Judges have not yet been announced.

Everyone is urged to enter roses in the show. The only stipulation made is that flowers be home grown. Containers will be furnished by the Civic club for blooms which will be displayed on tables, which will include those in groups of six, three, and single blossoms. Baskets for larger arrangements of flowers must be brought by entrants.

Another big feature of the day will be the annual children's parade, which will assemble at 7 o'clock at Seventh and A streets. The line of march will be from there to Main and then to Fourth. On Fourth street, special features will be given and the children will be given prizes. After the parade, the children are to go to the Eggman candy kitchen for their treat.

W. A. Elkin's art class will have a display of work at the community hall at this time. Miss Doris Girard and Miss Edna Swartz are in charge of this feature. A home-made rug exhibit will also be held, following the precedent set last year. Mrs. L. E. Baskford is in charge.

A luncheon for those in charge of the rose show and other displays will be held at noon. Any others wishing to attend may. The charge will be 35 cents. Lunch will be served from 11:30 on.

OLDEST CAR FOUND IN PENNSYLVANIA

HARRISBURG, Pa., May 23.—An automobile that was old when the "May Nineties" were young has been found by the Pennsylvania Bureau of Motor Vehicles.

The car, a roadster model, was built by James W. Hill, of Fleetwood. In an affidavit Hill declared that he constructed the "infernal machine" in 1898 as an experiment.

Licensed in 1905

He also asserts that about 1905 he received a state permit allowing him to drive the car. The machine was sold to Daniel S. Shade, of Fleetwood, in 1922, who is the present owner.

The bureau has declined to issue license tags for the car because its equipment fails to meet the present standard of safety as required by the state vehicle code. The tires are of iron while the head and tail lamps are but one candle power, due to the fact that there is only room for one candle in each of the lamps. A two-cylinder gasoline engine capable of 7.2 horse-power reposes under the hood of the car.

Hill said he was the stationary engineer back in 1898 and built the car for his amusement using a two-cylinder steam engine for power. Fear that the boiler would explode moved him to substitute a gasoline engine for the steam power. About eight different types of gasoline engines were used in the car between 1899 and 1908 when the present motor was installed.

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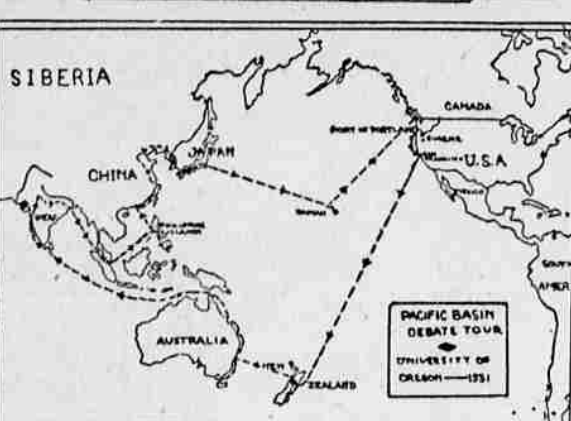

U. O.-O. S. C. DEBATE TO BE BROADCAST

Two-men debate teams representing the University of Oregon and Oregon State college have been scheduled to clash verbally over radio station KGW, the Oregonian at Portland, between 8 and 9:30 on the afternoon of Sunday, May 31. It is announced here by Dr. Ralph C. Hoebler, head of the university speech division.

The Oregon debaters for the first radio duel with college speakers will be Roger A. Pfaff and David G. Wilson, who are to sail from Portland June 2 with Robert T. Miller, also varsity debater, on the first leg of a 35,000 mile debate tour around the Pacific basin. Oregon State will be represented by Rex Robinson and Gordon Winks.

The question for the KGW debate will be, "Resolved: That the nations of the world should adopt a policy of complete disarmament, except for such forces as are necessary for police protection." The O. S. C. team had first choice of sides and took the affirmative of the question; the Oregon team will uphold the negative.

Widespread interest in the debate is expected among the radio audience in view of the prominent place that disarmament has taken in world problems during the past two years. President Hoover recently focused national attention on the cost of armament as a contributing factor to the present world-wide industrial depression.

Radio listeners will be requested by J. S. Lynch, program director for KGW, to send in their criticisms of the debate along with their opinion as to which team should get the decision.

EMOTION IS HELD GUIDE TO RELIGION

MADISON, Wis., May 23.—(AP)—Religion remodeled along the lines of emotion, devoid of dogma, is predicted by Dr. Evander Bradley McGilvary, leading philosopher at the University of Wisconsin.

First, scientists must forget their music and show the public how natural forces accounted for the phenomena that gave rise to dogma, McGilvary said today in an interview with the United Press. Their explanations, with convincing proof, would establish a religion of ideals rather than of mysteries.

But prove what they mean, scientists will not eradicate religion, according to McGilvary.

Says McGilvary is Religion "I know of no stronger anti-religious organization than Soviet Russia, yet the Soviet are intensely religious. But their religion is made up purely of ideals," he said in illustration of his point.

McGilvary was born of Scottish

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missionaries preaching the gospel in jungle-ridden Siam in 1894. His early days were spent near Bangkok, the only outpost of a ferocious, unnamed race.

Translated Gospels

He learned the English language from his parents, and by the time he was 30 years old had translated Matthew, Luke, John, and the Acts of the Apostles into Siamese Lao dialect. He received his first college degree at Davidson, N. C., college in 1884, and received later degrees from Princeton university and the University of California. He taught at Cornell university and the University of California before assuming the University of Wisconsin philosophy department chair which he has held since 1905.

Classical Program Set For Thursday

A program of music by classical and romantic composers will be offered the public and university students when the University of Oregon symphony orchestra and five student soloists appear in the music building auditorium Thursday night at 8:15.

Harold Ayres and Esther Wicks of Eugene, Gladys Foster of Portland, Agnes Petzold of Oregon City, and Nancy Thielens of Salem will be the soloists.

The program is being given for the instrument fund of the orchestra, and a small admission will be charged. Ayres will play the first movement of Haydn's piano concerto. Miss Wicks will play the first and second movements of the Concerto No. 4, in D minor, by Beethoven. Miss Foster will play the first movement of Schumann's concerto, "Ritornel." Victor from Verdi's opera Aida will be sung by Miss Petzold, and Miss Thielens will sing the aria "Casta Diva" from Bellini's opera Norma.

Garfield Grandson Commits Suicide

CLEVELAND, May 23.—(AP)—A bullet wound which Sheriff James Maloney said was self-inflicted, caused the death today of John Newell Garfield, 30, grandson of the late James A. Garfield, 20th president of the United States.

Relatives tonight said Mr. Garfield had been in ill health but there was nothing definite to explain the tragedy. The fatally wounded man was found by relatives last night at his home in Mentor, a Cleveland suburb. He had been shot in the head with a revolver, found nearby. He did not recover consciousness.

RELIGIOUS FREEDOM
