

GRADUATE NURSES STATE CONCLAVE OPENS IN EUGENE

About 100 delegates and visitors were on hand for the opening of the state convention of the Oregon Graduate Nurses' association meeting here Monday and Tuesday. Many more were expected to come in during the afternoon and evening.

The first business sessions were held Monday morning in the First Baptist church where all general meetings are being conducted. Convention headquarters are at the Eugene hotel. The Oregon League of Nursing Education took over the program at 11 o'clock.

At noon the visitors gathered at the Osburn hotel for luncheon and to hear an address by Miss Edith Bergquist, superintendent of the Emanuel hospital in Portland. Miss Madeline Glavin played violin numbers. Election of officers was slated for Monday afternoon.

The public was invited to attend the evening session held at 8 o'clock in the Baptist church when Dr. Edmund S. Conklin of the University of Oregon physiology department was to give an address on "Hypertension."

Business sessions will be continued Tuesday morning at the Baptist church with a big luncheon gathering at noon at the Eugene hotel. Dr. Edith Bryan of the University of California public health work is to be the speaker.

In the afternoon Tuesday a tea will be given from 3 until 5 o'clock in the Gerlinger hall for all visitors and delegates. All persons interested are invited to attend. Among Eugene women assisting in the program are Mrs. George P. Winchell, Mrs. A. H. Norton, Mrs. A. H. Ross and others. Miss Doris Helen Patterson is to play harp numbers and Miss Charlotte Winnard will sing. The visitors will be taken on a tour of the Murray Warner art museum. Miss Beanie Williams is president of the Eugene chapter of the association and Misses Minnie Goulet, Charlotte Winnard and Grace Robertson.

SECOND APPEAL ON BALLOT TITLE IN

SALEM, May 25.—(UP)—The second appeal from the ballot title of the referendum against the state police bill as prepared by Attorney General I. H. Van Winkle, was filed with the supreme court today by Custer Ross, Salem attorney, for J. J. McDonald. The suit is an unfriendly one, and sets forth virtually the same arguments as the first appeal, a suit filed by Chris Kuytitz, Salem attorney.

Hearings on the two appeals had been set for tomorrow morning, but the court has decided to postpone them until after the election on June 1. Ross, however, has requested of Chief Justice H. J. Bean, to set the hearing for Wednesday, delaying the hearing one day.

The chief justice had not announced any change in the date as yet.

Ross based his appeal on the grounds that the ballot title was insufficient, unfair, confusing and misleading, and fails to give a true and impartial statement of the purposes of the measure. He sets forth a new ballot title in his complaint.

Petitions for the referendum are already being circulated, the first ones appearing on the streets in Portland late Saturday.

BURIAL MOUND IS SELECTED AS SITE

MADISON, Wis., (UP)—Indian ceremonial and burial mounds estimated to be from 500 to 1000 years old form the site of the new Wisconsin State Forest Products laboratory soon to be built here.

Excavation of the last unexplored Indian mound has been completed by C. E. Brown, director of the Wisconsin Historical museum, and students in the University of Wisconsin anthropology department.

The laboratory site, about 10 acres in all, includes a hill known to be an important community center of Indians of comparatively modern times. Records show that a band of 100 Winnebago Indians were encamped here as recently as Civil War times.

The mound, a linear structure of a tapering outline, proved to contain a ceremonial fireplace of an unusual form together with symmetrically placed boulders. Other relics found by Brown were small deposits of ashes, bones of small animals, flint flakes, charcoal and fireplace stones.

SHIP SETS NEW RECORD FOR RADIO

MOSCOW, (UP)—A new attainment in the field of long distance radio communications has been announced here after the return of the ship Mikoyan from a 15 month cruise.

Radio operator Vostrovskoy managed to maintain uninterrupted communication with Moscow while cruising in the Red Sea, the Mediterranean, the Indian ocean, the Atlantic, and the Arctic.

This is supposed to be the first time that short-wave communication has been maintained with the mainland at distances that exceeded five and a half thousand kilometers.

Nearly a hundred thousand telegraphic words were exchanged between the Mikoyan and Moscow during the cruise.

As a result of this experiment, 10 points of the Soviet fleet, the Soviet Merchant Marine, will now be equipped with short-wave radio apparatus enabling them to maintain uninterrupted communication with the Soviet capital.

Because of this successful radio communication, the Soviet fleet is enabled to transmit much more business than it had expected, especially while the Mikoyan was in the tropics.

LABOR'S POLITICAL LEAGUE WILL MEET

The Rogue river referendum, the state police bill, school districting and school directorships will be considered by members of Organized Labor's Political League at a meeting Wednesday at 8 p. m. in the labor temple.

Portland labor has supported the referendum action on the police bill, but some laborers here expressed the opinion that Eugene labor would not support it.

Recommendations for the posts of school directors are expected to be made.

Many Eugeneans Attend Bulb Farm Open House

Over 500 persons of Eugene and vicinity visited the Jacobsen Bulb farm out Coburg way on Sunday when Mr. and Mrs. Fred P. Jacobsen held open house throughout the day.

Tucked in between the McKenzie river and a wind-protecting mountain on the north, the farm is a riot of blooms out to contrast with the green about and with the Oregon firs that form the massed background on the mountain. The mile and a half drive directly to the right across the Armitage bridge offers a stretch of beautiful McKenzie river scenery in addition to the sights of the farm.

Roses, peonies, some 50 varieties of them, poppies and iris, in addition to countless smaller flowers, like pansies, border plants, pinks, sweet peas, etc., were in bloom for the showing Sunday. Delphinium just starting to come out, gladioli plants, Shasta daisies, and many other plants and shrubs were shown in their long strips here and there about the farm.

A special feature that is especially attractive now is the pool and garden in the center of the farm. The garden is fenced in with a high lattice. A rock garden at one end and a lily pond in the center are featured. Hundreds of roses are in bloom in the garden in addition to the little border plants along all the paths that go here and there through the garden.

From 2 o'clock on, Mr. and Mrs. Jacobsen served refreshments. The Jacobsens have 80 acres in their farm, 15 of it in the rich river bottom section being under cultivation and most of the rest of it in heavy timber on the mountain. Bulbs are especially featured on the place, including daffodils, dahlias, gladioli, narcissuses, etc. Pansies are also featured.

They have practically all their cultivated land under irrigation. A real old-fashioned wind mill near the residence furnishes the power for the irrigation work, and adds a bit of quaintness to the scene. In addition to the flowers and plants, the Jacobsens also have many fruit trees, including pears, prunes, apples, and cherries, and several fine walnut trees. The Jacobsens have been in the Eugene vicinity since 1910 and their place is a demonstration of what judgment, hard work, irrigation, and good soil can do for Lane county gardens and farms.

ONE KILLED WHEN AUTO OVERTURNS

MARSHFIELD, Ore., May 25.—(UP)—Deloss Drullinger, 19, was injured, and Truman Hartley, 20, received injuries which may cause his death when a small automobile carrying seven young Myrtle Point residents swerved from the road early Sunday, crashed down a 150-foot bank and landed upside down.

The party was returning home from a dance. The accident occurred near Bridge Drullinger died an hour after the crash. Hartley received a broken back. At the Myrtle Point hospital today it was said his condition was critical.

Harold E. Berg, owner and driver of the car, was being questioned today. Berg suffered head and face injuries.

Hartley and two others in the party were in the front seat with the driver. Three others were in the rumble seat.

Two other boys and two girls were only slightly hurt.

Physicians said there was practically no hope for Hartley's recovery.

Salem Publisher Fishes in River

CHERRY MARKET IS SAID DEMORALIZED

PORTLAND, May 25.—(UP)—James Imbab, president of the Willamette Cherry Growers' association, is quoted in a Washington, D. C. dispatch to The Journal as declaring the cherry market is becoming demoralized because of renewed discussion of tariff adjustment.

The dispatch said: "Writing to Senator McNary, Imbab has the recent announcement of the tariff commission of a new investigation has caused disturbance, the growers having hoped that definite announcement would be made against any change in rates for one year."

"The board's announcement was to the effect that it would postpone action until a study is made of the returns on this year's crop," Senator McNary was informed that this probably means a year or more before any determination is made. He was promised that the commission at an early date will decide whether it should make a formal statement that a year's time will elapse before it is prepared to render a decision."

"Man cannot forget the price that was paid to secure the blessings of life we now enjoy," Dr. Childers said.

He spoke also of the fact that all the patriotic organizations are endeavoring to uphold the standards of citizenship and to uphold the cause of peace in their regular activities.

Woman Identifies Killer of Husband

CHICAGO, May 25.—(UP)—Mrs. Alice Costello stood last March 28 over the body of her husband, Patrick, and swore vengeance upon two bandits whom she had seen shot him to death without provocation during a battle.

Twice every week thereafter Mrs. Costello went to the detective bureau and watched long lines of men under the lights at the "abeyance" in an every known kind of charge.

Yesterday she sat in her small place watching the suspects file past. Suddenly she jumped to her feet and said: "That's the one. There's the man who killed my husband."

The suspect to whom she pointed was Dominic Pantaleo, 24.

Five men who also saw Costello shot identified Pantaleo later.

LIQUOR STATISTICS HELD UNRELIABLE

WASHINGTON, May 25.—(UP)—The board of temperance, prohibition and public morals of the Methodist Episcopal church and in a statement today that neither the association against the prohibition amendment nor any one else knew how much liquor was consumed by the American people.

"There are no statistics in regard to the consumption of liquor in the United States and can be more with any reliability whatever," it said.

"The association against the prohibition amendment has released a statement alleging that the people of the United States are now consuming \$2,848,000,000 worth of intoxicating beverages annually."

"It is surprising that this anti-prohibition body would risk its reputation for sincerity by the publication of a story which has appeal only to the gullible."

"The association against the prohibition amendment had said it believed its estimate 'conservative.'"
