WOMAN PLEADS NOT GUILTY OF PERJURY

Charged with perjury, Alberta Theaudeaus pleaded not guilty when arraigned before Circuit Judge George F. Skipworth Wednesday morning. Her trial was set for the jury term beginning June 1.

Testimony given in a justice court trial in the basis of the perjury charges against Mrs. Theaudeaus. Her statements regarding the circumstances surrounding a dry law raid on her home by officers are questioned by the state.

Mrs. Theaudeaus is free on bail set at \$1000.

were absent, but the other seven members were prepared to go right ahead with the business in hand and to extend the meeting over several days if necessary.

Here is a summary of the 18 major and minor points on which the schools are agreed:

Points Listed

1.—Dormitories—to be self-sustaining and charges on an equivalent basis.
2.—Student fees—General fees to be uniform; Oregon State to non-resident fees up to university scholar making an increase in revenue of \$12,000 to \$15,000 a year.
3.—Publications—to be uniform under guidance of board.
4.—Intercollegiate athletics—to be self-supporting.
5.—Labor wage scales—to be uniform.

6.—Student social expenses—to be on same basis.

7.—Personal departments—to be uniform in method.

8.—Health service, infirmaries—to be uniform in method.

9.—Printing shops—to be self-supporting from fees.

10.—Budgeting of self-sustaining departments—to be separate from departments which are state supported.

11.—Fellowships—On same terms.

12.—Administration expenses—to be on same basis.

13.—Faculty welfare, salaries, pensions—to be on uniform basis.

14.—Accounts and records—to be standardized.

15.—Traveling expenses—to be on uniform basis.

16.—Research—to be cooperative under direction of council of three, one from university, one from college and one from normals and to be conducted entirely in higher schools.

17.—Extension—to be on uniform basis with fees uniform so far as possible.

18.—Lower division work—to be on uniform basis with understanding that in professional courses specialized work might be begun in first two years in either university or college.

Mrs. Pierce Opposes

he be introduced in the management of the various state institutions and departments coming under the jurisdiction of the state board of control, particularly in the purchase of provisions, supplies, and equipment of all kinds; and

"Whereas, it is essential in the carrying out of this general retraining program that there be perfected a reorganization in the secretariat and purchasing forces of the state board of control;

"Now, therefore, be it resolved that the resignation of the secretary of the state board of control, together with the resignation of all assistants and employees be placed in the hands of the chairman of the board as of June 1, 1931."

18 Persons Affected

The resignation order affects 18 persons in the purchasing department. In addition to Carl Abrams, assistant state purchasing agent, Frank Myrdeth, auditor, and W. T. Davis, advisory engineer. The order affects 13 women who have been employed as secretaries, bookkeepers and stenographers.

"The resolution presented to the board of control today by State Treasurer Holman is in line with the general retraining program which I launched when I assumed this office," said Governor Meier in commenting on the action of the board.

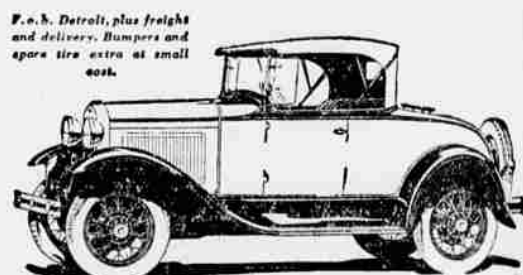
