

INDEBTEDNESS ON MASONIC TEMPLE TO BE RETIRED SOON

A plan to retire the indebtedness on the Eugene Masonic temple was outlined at a mass meeting of Masons Wednesday night. A debt retirement campaign will be inaugurated at once and Otto L. Ferris of Los Angeles has been employed to direct it.

A large group of Masons gathered at the temple and preceding the meeting the officers of Eugene lodge No. 11 and McKenzie River lodge No. 195 met for dinner. Stanley R. Stevenson was chosen chairman of the mass meeting.

After extended discussion of the matter, Attorney H. E. Slattery presented the following resolution which was adopted:

"Resolved by this mass meeting of master Masons held at the temple this 27th day of May, 1931, that we endorse the program outlined for the retirement of the indebtedness on the temple, and we lend it such support as may be possible both individually and collectively."

The history of the temple financing and the present necessity of retiring the indebtedness was presented by A. L. Williamson, chairman of the board of governors of the temple and chairman of the board of trustees of Eugene lodge No. 11. Mr. Ferris outlined the plan to be used and the organization that is being developed to present the privilege of subscription to the Masons of the community.

Thursday evening at a 6:30 dinner in the temple the committees will convene to complete organization and for a schooling in the plan, under the direction of Mr. Ferris.

Stanley R. Stevenson, as general chairman of the campaign organization, has recruited four divisions of 50 men each. The division chairmen and their respective team captains are as follows: Chairman of division "A," Percy W. Brown, with team captains F. C. Hoffman, Dr. R. T. Burnett, Howard A. Hall, Bryant G. Dehar, Frank I. Agule.

F. M. Hathaway as chairman of division "B" has as his team captains L. K. Shumaker, C. A. Huntington, D. Dotson, C. F. Hyde and B. F. Brown.

Edw. F. Bailey is chairman of division "C" and his team captains are W. O. Swan, Dr. Charles E. Hunt, Dr. E. L. Zimmerman, N. K. Hichens and H. E. Slattery.
