**Ohio Congressman Dies of Pneumonia**  
CLEVELAND, May 29.—(AP)—Congressman Charles A. Mooney, democratic representative of the 20th Ohio (Cleveland) district since 1923, died at his home today of lobar pneumonia.

Mooney, who was 52 years old, had been waging a losing battle against death since Wednesday. Oxygen was administered in the hope of rallying his stamina, but he steadily grew weaker.

The democratic chairman of his district was first elected to congress in 1919. He was defeated for reelection in the Harding landslide of 1921, but was returned to Washington in 1923 and since then his reelection had never been seriously doubted. He was particularly active as a member of the rivers and harbors committee.

Mooney was a supporter of the national law against child labor and a foe of prohibition.

CONTINENTAL AIR SERVICE SPEEDED UP AFTER JUNE 1

PORTLAND, Ore., May 29.—(AP)—More advantageous transcontinental air service will be available June 1, with change in eastbound air mail and passenger schedules, Leon D. Cuddeback, vice president of the Varney air lines division of United Air Lines announced today.

Later evening dispatches of air letters to eastern points will be possible, Cuddeback said. The Varney schedule revision will conform with changes to be made June 1 on other coast-to-coast routes.

On the night eastbound service, the plane will leave Seattle at 7:30 p. m., Tacoma at 7:50 p. m., Portland at 9:15 p. m., Pasco at 11:15 p. m., Boise at 1:35 a. m. and will arrive in Salt Lake at 4:55 a. m. Connecting service will reach Chicago at 1:15 that day.

The new morning schedule provides for leaving Portland at 8:15 a. m., Pasco at 10:30, Boise at 1:10 p. m. and arrival at Salt Lake at 4:10 p. m. the next morning and New York at 4:54 that afternoon.

The connecting Spokane-Pasco schedule for leaving Spokane at 8:30 p. m. on the night train, and arriving in Pasco at 10:15, leaving Pasco at 5:55 a. m., the plane will return to Spokane at 7:15 a. m.

**MRS. WYATT TAKES PLACE IN TACOMA**  
Mrs. Martha Wyatt, for one year and six months connected with the offices of the Lane county chapter of the American Red Cross, has been appointed executive secretary of the Tacoma chapter of the Red Cross, it was announced here Friday.

Mrs. Wyatt is leaving immediately to take over her work at Tacoma. A graduate of the University of Oregon, Mrs. Wyatt came here from Portland to do 18 months of preliminary training before taking an executive secretaryship.

There will be no appointment of a successor to Mrs. Wyatt, the work being handled under training arrangements for University of Oregon students with Mary Annin, executive secretary of the Lane chapter, in charge.

**Equipping Yachts With Electric Drive**  
BOSTON.—(AP)—Yachts are now being equipped with the modern electric drive, used successfully on ocean liners as a substitute for steam power.

What is said to be the smallest sea-going craft to be thus powered is a motor launch at a local shipyard for Alexander W. Moffat.

By means of a controller handle in the pilot house, the ship's electric drive can be operated by the skipper, much as a motorman controls a trolley car in his vestibule.

**RICE TO REPLACE WHEAT**  
SAIGON (Indo-China).—(AP)—The chamber of commerce has taken the initiative of seeking a decree by Governor General Pasquier, now in Paris, to substitute rice for wheat flour in bread making. This step is intended to solve the rice crisis, due to overproduction in Cochinchina, and to avoid the costly importing of 8,000,000 quintals of wheat.
