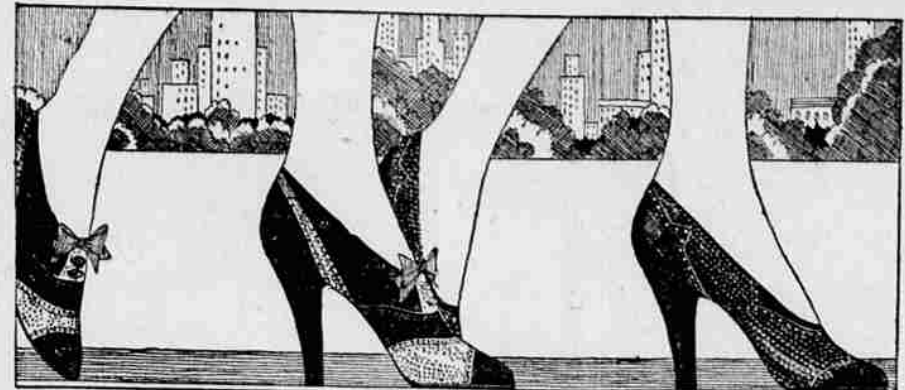

TODAY'S RECIPES

If you are a June bride, perhaps a few pointers on menu planning will prove a decided help.

To begin with, there are a number of important factors to consider. The age, occupations and sex of those invited are of prime importance. To begin with, you are to serve influence the choice of foods to a great degree. The amount of money you can afford to spend, the ability of the cook, whether it be you yourself or someone else—and the amount of help in the kitchen also determine what you can have for dinner.

More than this, the needs of the body must be supplied in every meal of the day. The well-balanced menu contains, first, fuel foods to furnish heat and energy for the activities of the body. Foods rich in starch, starch and fat come under this head. Second, growing foods to provide material for the building and repair of body tissue. These are the foods rich in protein. Third, "protective" foods containing mineral salts and vitamins and adding bulk. Vegetables, fruits, milk, and whole grains make up this group of foods.

When it comes to actually making out menus, variety, economy and personal likes and dislikes enter into the problem.

You will find that you achieve greater variety and do your planning and ordering more competently and economically if you outline your menu several days or a week in advance.

A good way to do this is to decide on the meats for the week. Then fill in with potatoes cooked in various ways and suitable ways and other seasonal cooked vegetables.

Next, work out lunches for the week, using up left-overs as much as possible and favoring the use of protein food—other than meat—providing a protein was not served for breakfast.

Then plan the breakfast fruits and cereals. Take care to avoid repetition. It won't cost any more to keep several different kinds of cereals open, using first one kind and then another, than to open one box and use it all up before trying another kind.

In order to include two servings of fruit daily, plan fruits for luncheon and dinner in the form of cocktails, salads and desserts.

Finally decide on the salads and desserts, breadstuffs and relishes. All the time you are planning menus pay special attention to contrast of color and texture. Avoid using colors that clash, as beets and carrots. Take care not to repeat a food that has a distinctive flavor in the day's menu.

In working over left-overs it's a good plan to skip a day between their original and second appearances. This prevents monotony and makes meals more interesting.

Go to market yourself. You will find the trip more than repays for the time it takes in the inspiration it gives you.

THIS is something to remember: Praise for the good goes much farther than blame for the bad, from infancy on. If you praise a child for being good and tell someone else how good he has been, he is good.

Some people may raise their brows at this statement and declare skeptically that it is just another of those pleasant creeds that does not mean anything, but there is truth in every word of it.

Like many stated facts, it may bear qualifying, depending on the child, his age (particularly his age), and the conditions under which the admiring is done. If a mother praises a child with insincerity in her voice he will know it. If she tells him he is a fine boy when he has done something deliberately naughty his quick sense of the fitness of things will be likely to refute it. Or if he is set in his bad habits and past that impressionable age before six, praise may not perform the miracles expected.

**Must Have Incentive**

There is a psychological principle involved in all praise, be it young or old, bad or good. The minute we feel that we have a reputation to live up to, we have an unbeatable incentive, for one of the real pleasures in the human breast is for the good opinion of others. Once that is lost, few care what they do.

And children are embryos of their elders. We must get over thinking that small people do not react as we do—they react almost precisely the same as we do. If we analyze our own feelings a bit more we would be better guides of child behavior.

**They Want Praise**

Little children hunger for praise, and even if they do misbehave why can we not be intelligent enough to concede that they are human beings? Childhood is the time for learning and impulse, experiment, accident, and even disobedience usually have a strong urge behind them prompted by natural causes.

Our own attitude of mind is half the battle. Expect good behavior a little more, take it for granted, stop worrying too much. Scolding comes from a feeling of over-responsibility—largely. Accept parenthood as a pleasant thing, and let the sun in on the family. And don't please, forget the praise.
