Temporary braces were placed beneath the sagging city hall roof Friday and definite action on permanent repairs probably will be taken at the meeting of the city council next Monday night, it was announced by R. S. Bryson, city recorder.

A state inspector is expected here from Salem to look the building over before any action is taken by the city council. City Recorder Bryson Thursday telephoned to Secretary of State Hoss, asking that an inspector be sent and the secretary promised to take the matter up with the proper state department.

At the meeting of the council Monday night it is expected that the actual facts as to the condition of the building will be brought out.

NEW LEGISLATION STORY

aped limit, but provides for the three-arm signal system, and uniform provisions for observation of traffic regulations generally. One phase of the new traffic code, providing for driver's license applicant's examination, does not become operative until July 1.

Three of the 386 new laws are repealing acts. Two repeal the so-called Eddy acts of the 1920 session, placing property qualifications on voters at elections involving bond issues or tax levies. The other repeals the "certificate of convenience and necessity" act relating to the operation of public utilities.

Another important law changes the personnel of the state emergency board and limits the amount of money that can be appropriated by this body during the biennium.

To taxpayers the outstanding piece of legislation is perhaps the intangibles tax act. This is largely a re-amending of the act of 1929 said to overcome the legal objections to the former act. This tax is estimated to yield \$1,500,000 to the state treasury as an offset to the present tax paid by real property. The tax to be collected this year will be on interest and dividends accruing during 1930.

The income tax law which the people must pay along with the intangibles tax by June 25, was an initiative measure passed by the people last November.

The people's utility district bill, sponsored by the state senate, and regarded as a part of the administration program along with the utilities commission bill and the hydro-electric act, also becomes effective at this time. The other two laws carried the emergency clause and have been operative since February. The grant utility bill provides for the organization of districts, somewhat similar to super-highway districts, for the promotion of power plants financed, owned and operated by the people of the district.

The free text-book bill is another measure of state-wide interest to go into effect with the lapse of the 90-day period of grace. Under this act school districts throughout the state will be required to undertake a program which will ultimately provide free text books for all students in the elementary grades.

New Fishing Code
Fishermen generally will be interested in the new fishing code, as well as separate statutes closing certain portions of the McKenzie and Deschutes rivers to boat fishing.

The scenic highway which spans the state along its western border, will be officially now as the Oregon Coast highway instead of the Roosevelt coast highway, effective tomorrow.

The law repealing the one-mill market road tax also becomes operative. This bill was designed to save the

taxpayers of Oregon more than \$1,000,000 annually. This law establishes a secondary system of state highways which will be improved through the cooperation of the state highway commission and the counties.
