TODAY'S RECIPES

CRISP, cool salads add immeasurably to the interest of summer meals, and prove beyond question that the "eye does half the eating."

Colorful fruit and vegetable salads provide an effective and inviting means of adding minerals and vitamins to the diet. Hearty salads made of meat, fish or eggs supply protein calories and make an ideal main dish for summer luncheons. Fruit salads may answer for dessert, and as salad and are particularly alluring for summer meals.

Of course, there are certain sharp distinctions made in the use of salad chosen for definite purposes. The dinner salad served between the meat course and dessert must be light and well seasoned. Its mission is to prepare the way for the dessert and it must provide contrast by texture, flavor and color.

In certain meals the salad is of equal importance with another dish. The menu a Sunday night supper or informal luncheon salad usually shares honors with some other viand. When this is the case the purpose of the salad is to complement and enhance the other dish.

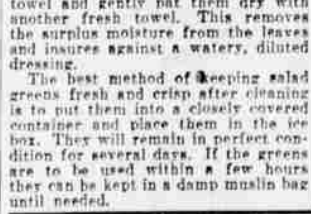
The double-duty fruit salad can be served in a number of ways. The fruits can be molded in a jelly, frozen in ice cream, or served as a salad in their natural state cut in neat dice. The dressing is of utmost importance. While it should not be over-poweringly tart it must be pleasantly piquant. Whipped cream may be added to any fruit salad if desired and it should never be used as the one and only dressing. Use it as a garnish or add it to the mayonnaise or dressing if you will, but don't put a spoonful of whipped cream over a mixture of diced fruits and consider the result a fruit salad.

There are general directions for making fruit and vegetable salads that are an aid in achieving dainty and delectable effects. Don't combine too many ingredients. Be sure the materials are cut in dice or marbles of uniform size. Guard against crushed materials and mushy texture. Let all salad materials, meats and fish included, stand in a marinade of some well seasoned dressing on ice for at least 30 minutes before serving. Then drain and arrange on beds of crisp dry salad plants.

Rules governing the salad plants are iron-clad and must be observed if perfect results are obtained. Salad plants, whether they are the heads of the salad or merely a garnish, must be cold, crisp, dry and perfectly clean. After careful washing use a lettuce basket to swing the leaves dry or put them in a clean towel and gently pat them dry with another fresh towel. This removes the surplus moisture from the leaves and insures against a watery, diluted dressing.

The best method of keeping salad greens fresh and crisp after cleaning is to put them into a closely covered container and place them in the ice box. They will remain in perfect condition for several days. If the greens are to be used within a few hours they can be kept in a damp muslin bag until needed.

YOUR CHILDREN

BE sure that the college or school you are choosing for your son or daughter this spring is suitable.

One has to shop for schools as one has to shop for anything else, and it seems strange that so many parents choose them for almost every reason but the right ones.

Why do you want John to go to Oakleaf? It is because John's father or grandfather went there? I like the sentiment and is a fine reason, but not enough. Perhaps Oakleaf is better than the other men admirably. We'll say for instance that they were cut out for law and it is well known that 50 per cent of the students there go on to be lawyers, or to go into something that needs the same foundation that a law course needs.

But if John is a born engineer, or thinks he wants to be a doctor, or if he is creative and has a leaning toward the arts, not only is Oakleaf not the right place for him but Oakleaf doesn't want him.

Perhaps the boy next door is going to a certain college, or a whole group of young fellows John knows are going to the same place. Well, it would be nice for John to know so many people when he goes away. Again that is a good reason, but still not good enough.

If possible, go and visit some of the places you have in mind. Write to the deans of admission or the registrars of the different schools, and find out their trends of training, what they accept, what type of student will fit and who will not. It is only fair if you want your boy or girl to be happy in his school life and to succeed in his work, fair to him and fair to the school.

There is one motive that governs the placing of so many girls nowadays and I feel that I must speak of it. Many mothers seem to become extremely ambitious for their daughters in a social way when it becomes to choose a last school. Certainly we want our daughters to have nice friends and to make more, but I know of nothing more cruel than to place a girl in an environment where she cannot keep up with the dressing, spending, or general rate of living of the other girls. True, in many of our best schools there are regulations so that there is no class distinction, but in some there is less effort made to reduce the difference. Will your daughter fit in such a school? Will she do her best work there?

Be sure that she will be happy, that she will develop, and make real friends instead of cardboard ones wherever you send her. And please her where her natural choice of work will get its greatest inspiration.

CHILD RESPONSIBILITY

It is a good thing to give children something to do, and that they are traveling. A little bag with their own tops, or a little grip with a few things in it that wouldn't be a great loss if they misplaced them.
