

CHRISTIAN SCIENCE ELECTS OFFICERS FOR COMING YEAR

BOSTON, Mass., June 10.—Growth of the Christian Science Movement throughout the world, as indicated by formation during the past year of 70 new branch church organizations, was reported here at the Annual Meeting of The Mother Church, The First Church of Christ, Scientist, Six thousand members from many nations gathered beneath the lofty church dome to hear of new publications and wider charitable and healing work.

The Mother Church now has 2519 branch churches and societies, in addition to 40 colleges and university organizations. For the first time Poland has a branch church. Another has been added to those already in Africa and in Asia, four more to those in Australasia, two more in South America, 45 more in North America and 25 additional in Europe outside of Poland.

Christian Science lectures addressed total combined audiences of about 3,300,000 during the past 12 months, it was reported. In addition to the 3732 regular lectures, a number were broadcast in the Philippine Islands, China, Japan and the West Indies, more natives than ever before are stated to have attended lectures.

Robert E. Buffum, LL. B., of Belmont, Massachusetts, was elected President of The Mother Church for the ensuing year. Edward L. Ripley of Brooklyn, Mass., continues as Treasurer and Ezra W. Palmer, also of Brooklyn, as Clerk. George Shaw Cook of Chicago and Mrs. Elisabeth F. Norwood of Brookline have started the last year of their three-year term as First and Second Reader, respectively.

Mr. Buffum is a native of Keene, New Hampshire, where he received his early education. He received the degree of Bachelor of Law from Boston University Law School. For many years he has been a practicing attorney in Boston, Massachusetts, and is a member of the law firm, Abbott, Dane, Buffum and Howe. He was one of the attorneys for The Christian Science Board of Directors in various lawsuits of several years ago.

Rothwell Wins Prize In Definition Event

C. E. Rothwell, University high school faculty man, has won a prize in the Forum magazine's definitions contest. Mr. Rothwell's winning definition was in answer to the question, "What is a Hero?"

"A hero," says Rothwell, "is one who wins the plaudits of his fellows for conspicuous and successful service to a cause with which they are sympathetic; who compensates the desires of less fortunate or less ambitious men and women by surmounting in actuality obstacles of which they are acutely aware but conquer only in imagination; whose loyalty to an accepted cause is at least unquestioned; and whose achievement results from superiority of force, skill, persistence, courage, intelligence, faith, luck, publicity, or a compound of these elements."

Since the proposed three-day visit to the garden of France has been reduced to one day the mayors will return to Paris tonight after seeing nearby chateaux.

CLUB TO CLIMB MT. JUNE SUNDAY

Mr. June will be the next objective of the Obsidians for their hike next Sunday. It will be reached from the new Willamette highway at Hardesty creek, about 35 miles from Eugene. Parties will go out Saturday evening and camp at the start of the trail, or early Sunday morning, it is announced.

The hike will be about 16 miles, taking in Mt. June, Sawtooth Rocks and Hardesty mountain on the return. The leaders scouted the trip last Sunday and found the rhododendrons at their best and innumerable varieties of wild flowers along the trail.

Highway Surveyors At McCredie Springs

A crew of engineers employed by the federal bureau of public roads was at McCredie Springs Sunday and expected to locate a camp at or near the springs, according to Louis Borde, manager of that resort, who was here Tuesday.

The engineers are surveying a route for the Willamette highway up Salt Creek and over the summit by way of Waldo lake.

The route has not been definitely decided upon and the bureau is said to be considering both the Salt creek and Willamette passes over the summit.

CHARGE OF LAXITY IN ENFORCEMENT OF DRY ACT MADE

NEW YORK, June 1.—(AP)—Major Maurice Campbell, former prohibition administrator in New York, awaited reaction in Washington today to his public announcement that he had filed charges with President Hoover alleging that Seymour Lowman, assistant secretary of the treasury formerly in charge of prohibition enforcement, had been "derelict" in duty.

His charges also included an allegation that Andrew W. Mellon, secretary of the treasury, "had taken advantage of his official position to conceal facts and thus shield a government official who is derelict in his office." Major Campbell's charges have to do mainly with alleged use of prohibition enforcement for political purposes.

The former administrator here said he submitted eight specific charges against Lowman more than a month ago and that the President turned the charges over to Secretary Mellon. On May 12, Major Campbell said, Mellon wrote him, saying the charges "are summaries of allegations contained in a series of syndicate press articles written by you last year," and that he had investigated "the allegations and conclusions" in those articles "and found them at that time to be so ill-founded as not to require an answer."

Mellon contended that "inasmuch as your letter states no new facts, there does not appear to be any occasion for further action on my part."

In another letter dated May 16, Campbell renewed his charges in a letter to President Hoover, and accused Mellon of shielding Lowman.

He asserted in that letter that he had documentary evidence not yet published with which to support his case.

The charges purported to show that Lowman had urged Major Campbell to relax prohibition enforcement during the 1928 presidential campaign.

Major Campbell, who is editor of the anti-prohibition magazine "Repeal," said today he felt justified in making public the correspondence because Mr. Hoover had not replied to his second letter. He said that "never in the history of national prohibition in the United States has federal enforcement been as ineffective and indifferent as it is today."

Beginning this week the Eugene postoffice will be closed every Saturday at 2 p. m. for the remainder of the day and the mail delivery service in the city will be curtailed each Saturday, it was announced Wednesday by D. E. Moran, postmaster.

The shorter hours and curtailment

of delivery service on Saturdays is made necessary on account of the passage at the last session of congress of an act establishing a 44-hour week for all postal employees.

Under this act it will be necessary to eliminate the afternoon letter delivery on Saturdays. There will be one complete delivery that day and all letters will be delivered by 11 a. m. There will also be only one parcel delivery and this will be completed in all parts of the city by 1 p. m. on Saturday, the postmaster says.

All departments of the postoffice will remain open on that day until 2 p. m. when everything will be closed.

However, all mail that arrives on the last train prior to that hour will be distributed to the lock boxes and will be available to all box renters by the time the office closes.

Mail delivery service on other week days will remain the same as at present, according to the postmaster.

WEDDING FEATURE OF MASONIC PICNIC

A public wedding will be one of the big features of the annual Masonic picnic to be held at McCredie Springs Sunday, June 21. It was announced Tuesday by Louis Borde, manager of the springs resort, who was here on business. He received a telegram from the prospective groom who lives outside the city, stating that he and the young lady had agreed to appear at that time for the nuptials. The identity of the couple is being kept a secret by Mr. Borde. Any Mason desiring to present gifts to the couple may communicate with Mr. Borde, he said.

Mr. Borde has been busy for a number of days placing the grounds at the resort in condition for the picnic. He has erected tables for the dinner and has recently added an archery court to the many attractions and a bowling alley is in operation.

The swimming tank which is filled with naturally heated water from the springs will be open to the picnickers. The tank is 30 by 70 feet in dimensions and is said to be one of the best on the coast.

War Minister of China Is Attacked

TOKIO, June 10.—(AP)—General Ho Ying-ching, war minister of the China national government, was attacked and seriously wounded at the city of Nanchang yesterday by communist handbills, according to word received today by Japanese government authorities.

News of the attack on the Chinese official first came from Tokio, presumably because of a rigorous press censorship recently laid down by the

China national government in its campaign against revolutionary movements.
