

CATHOLICS URGED TO DEFEND THEIR RIGHTS AT POLLS

TOLEDO, Spain, June 12.—(AP)—A daring message to Catholics throughout Spain calling on them to "defend the rights of the church" was being circulated today, signed by leading church authorities.

The message was issued with the consent and collaboration of Cardinal Segura, primate of Spain, despite violent anti-religious riots in many sections of the country that followed his recent similar appeal. The cardinal was forced to flee the country during the riots when mobs sacked convents and churches.

The republican government demanded Catholics henceforth refrain from political activities. The message today ignored that demand, and asked Catholics in the forthcoming elections of a constitutional assembly to "defend the rights of the church and the social order."

The message said that, while the church held itself apart from politics, it was necessary to remind Catholics that they should intervene actively in the elections, uniting themselves to bring about the triumph of candidates who will defend the rights of the faith.

The Catholic church had no desire to create difficulties for the government, the message said, and it was hoped that the rights so deeply cherished would be respected. However, considering that silence might be interpreted as acquiescence to republican efforts to separate church and state permanently, the message said a direct statement would be made to the government in connection with "the most grave acts which have occurred."

Piscatorial Controversy Racks Diplomatic Circles Following Capture Of Fish

WASHINGTON, June 12.—(AP)—Tall tales about Tobey, the pet fish of the Rapids, have now become post mortems written by members of the president's official family.

Hugh Gibson, ambassador to Belgium, caught it and it was eaten at the president's own table the night of June 6.

Tobey was a big rainbow trout and was widely reputed to be the particular pet of Peggy Ann, the president's pretty granddaughter. Gibson did not know this and hooked it. Immediately he became involved in a diplomatic correspondence.

Assistant Secretary Jahneke, much upset, reported the matter to Ambassador Davies saying Captain Joel T. Boone had made an official inspection of the fish and identified it "as though it were an old acquaintance."

"The assistant secretary of the navy's only interest in the incident—or rather accident—is that he was almost compelled, without knowing it, to consume the fish," Jahneke wrote Davies, "and he objects to eating any kind of a trained animal, particularly one of Peggy Ann's pets."

Gibson wrote Davies in answer to Jahneke's charges that "I dislike a controversy as much as you do, but there are things that even a diplomat can't stand for."

Gibson said he had been asked by report on his observations and tell what effect the chemicals used in spraying has had on the different weeds, which include morning glory, Canada thistle, blackberry vines, poison oak, wild rose and quack grass.

CITY HALL REPAIR WORK IS STARTED

Work was started Friday on repairs to the west end of the city hall. Mayor Wilder and members of the city council decided that it would be better to do the work by day labor under a superintendent than to ask contractors to bid upon the job and an earlier start could be made than by letting it by contract.

Five or six carpenters were employed and they are working under the direction of John Hunzicker of the firm of Hunzicker and Smith, architects, who were employed to draw the plans and specifications. Lumber was delivered to the city hall Friday forenoon and the carpenters at once began the work of placing supports to hold the roof in place. Upright timbers will be used instead of a truss. The old truss placed when the addition to the west end of the building was erected had broken, loose, causing the roof to sag and the brick walls to crack and spread.

The work is expected to be completed in about a week's time, according to R. W. Rundlett, city building inspector.
